Program Justification

We propose to establish a Master of Science (MS) in Global Studies program. This builds upon the Center for Global Studies' (CGS) successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, the Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGPP) Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus through support from the Center for Global Studies (CGS), the Program in Arms Control & Domestic and International Security (ACDIS), and WGPP. It provides a professionally oriented graduate program that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies B.A. program and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This program will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing global governance and civil society organizations.

The MS in Global Studies curriculum includes three tracks: 1) Global Security; 2) Gender and Public Policy; and 3) Global Governance. The tracks involve a practicum or capstone project and demonstrated competency in a second language. The Illinois Global Institute (IGI) will provide administrative support, while day-to-day administration will be done by CGS. The division of labor between the sponsoring programs and the IGI is described in the attached Memorandum of Agreement.

Over the past decade, Global Studies has emerged on campuses around the United States and the world as a field that focuses interdisciplinary research and teaching on issues that affect the world's diverse populations at local, national, regional, and global levels. Governments, businesses, NGOs, trade groups, academic institutions and not-for-profit (NFP) organizations in the United States and worldwide have increasing needs for individuals with specialized training that will enable them to navigate, engage, and help to resolve some of the important issues challenging societies today. This program will help fulfill the demand for individuals with the interdisciplinary skills required to analyze global issues and work within the global arena.

The MS in Global Studies program combines theoretical and professional skills coursework with professional training. In this way, the program expects to provide a unique opportunity for students to prepare for careers in the private as well as public sectors, including national and global governing institutions, NGOs, and international business. By combining Illinois' nation-leading strengths in international and area studies with fields such as the data sciences and global health, this program will enable graduates to engage in focused interdisciplinary studies to address global issues with the contextual and cultural knowledge required to better inform and improve decision making.

Intellectual Coherence of the Field.

Global Studies is an interdisciplinary field concerned with understanding the historical

Global Studies is an interdisciplinary field concerned with understanding the historical and contemporary contexts that surround humanity's increasingly interconnected and overlapping technical, governance, security, and ecological systems. This field combines social science and humanistic approaches to understanding the cultures, histories, and contemporary contexts that contribute to understanding issues at a global level. According to US News and World Report, there are currently over 1,000 International/Global Studies degree programs at the undergraduate level. Fourteen of those programs are local to Illinois, ranging from Northwestern University and the University of Chicago to Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington-Normal and the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

These programs are also increasing at the graduate level. Internationally, there is a robust network of 37 graduate programs from 18 nations collaborating through the Global Studies Consortium (<https://globalstudiesconsortium.org/>). The consortium promotes and facilitates graduate teaching programs in global studies and fosters collaboration and development of best practices in graduate Global Studies education. This network of programs will provide key elements to support student mobility, curriculum development, and expansion of the field. In addition, a growing number of peer-reviewed journals support the growth and exploration of the field. However, no Illinois public university offers a graduate program in Global Studies (GS). Among our Big Ten University peers, only four institutions offer similar programs: Indiana University, the University of Iowa, the University of Michigan, and Rutgers.

Graduate programs in GS exist within research universities and provide professionally focused degree concentrations that promote interdisciplinary problem-solving by leveraging campus strengths and expertise. The MS in Global Studies builds upon the multiple GS-focused courses that CGS, WGGP, and ACDIS faculty affiliates have developed over the past two decades, many through funds from highly competitive U.S. Department of Education Title VI National Resource Center (NRC) grants (Title VI). These courses draw upon the university's unique strengths that span the physical sciences, humanities, and social sciences to form coherent yet distinct tracks in policy studies well suited for students who wish to engage in and study issues of global security, governance, or development.

Expertise of Campus Faculty and Staff.

Combined, CGS, WGGP, and ACDIS engage a large and interdisciplinary group of faculty and staff on campus, cooperating with 90 campus units and 370 faculty affiliates from 14 colleges and schools at Illinois. Throughout the long tenure of these programs, faculty have been able to draw upon resources in the form of networks, expertise, and external funding to develop and maintain interdisciplinary courses and activities that fall within each center's area of focus. The program will draw upon the expertise of this faculty network and an extensive history of course development to initiate and maintain this unique graduate program. Working in conjunction with faculty affiliates in all three programs, the partnering programs have developed a rich set of core courses, which constitute the required courses for the program. Like similar professionally oriented degree programs, the MS in Global Studies also leverages the existing strengths of the campus, providing access to numerous relevant courses from

across multiple units as elective course options available to supplement required courses. With advisor approval, students will be able to select such courses as electives toward the degree.

Global Studies is a field that focuses interdisciplinary research and teaching on issues that affect the world's diverse populations at local, national, regional, and global levels. The MS in Global Studies program is designed to produce broadly educated and well-trained scholars, practitioners and professionals. Our aim is to capitalize on scholarly synergies across campus, provide new educational pathways across disciplines, and develop students who will be future leaders with global impact. Every program graduate should:

1. Draw on the literature to develop an understanding of globalization and the framework of Global Studies;
2. Think critically about how globalization impacts global order, welfare and legitimacy;
3. Become familiar with the historical, ethical and philosophical questions underlying research in the field of Global Studies;

5. Observe the analysis of and solutions to research problems that may arise when conducting research that is global in scale and scope;
6. Gain practical experience based on the understanding and application of theoretical knowledge in the field of Global Studies;

The MS in Global Studies program will follow a three-step approach to assessing and improving student learning.

4. The MS in Global Studies program will plan to write at least three questions the units will pursue to better understand student learning at the degree level. This process will include describing the information needed to answer the questions and a timeline for what it would take to answer the question. Not every learning outcome needs to be assessed every year, but the program will target to assess all over a 5–8-year period. The expectation is that assessment (collecting evidence, interpreting evidence, or implementing changes) takes place every year.

Master of Science in Global Studies

The Center for Global Studies (CGS), Program in Arms Control & Domestic and International Security (ACDIS), and the Women & Gender in Global Perspectives (WGPP) Program offer a Master of Science (MS) in Global Studies. To be admitted to this degree program, students apply through a joint application process through the Program in Global Studies and the Center which houses their chosen area of focus: 1) Global Security (ACDIS); 2) Gender and Public Policy (WGPP); and 3) Global Governance (CGS). Admission requirements follow in the next section. More detailed information may be obtained from the ACDIS (<https://acdis.illinois.edu/>), CGS (<https://cgs.illinois.edu/>), and WGPP (<https://wgpp.illinois.edu/>) offices.

Admission

Applicants for admission to the MS in Global Studies program should hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education. Each Global Studies student will be required to demonstrate knowledge of a second language through at least the level of a third year of instruction, with non-native English speakers exempt from this requirement. For students not admitted with this level of second language knowledge, this requirement can be completed through an elective language course and/or reading and writing activities in association with meeting the professional development or professional skills requirement. The Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores (verbal, quantitative, and written), or other post-secondary examinations such as the Law School Admission Test (LSAT), Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT), Medical College Admission Test (MCAT), are recommended but not required. International students are required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL), with minimum scores set by the Graduate College. All admission requirements of the Graduate College also apply.

Applicants must submit the Graduate College application for admission, certified transcripts of all undergraduate and graduate work, a writing sample, and three letters of reference. Applicants must also submit to the Program in Global Studies a statement of purpose showing how the MS in Global Studies degree fits into their educational and career plans. This statement must show that the interdisciplinary nature of the MS in Global Studies, and their chosen track, will serve the student better than a disciplinary degree. Student applications will be assessed by the program administering their track through the joint-application process. Admission is ordinarily limited to the fall semester, but exceptions are made for spring and summer admission.

Describe the use of this delivery method:

The program is designed to allow students to choose face-to-face and online course delivery options as available. On campus students can take any of the course options, but online students will only be able to choose online course options. Instruction in all required GBLB courses (GLBL indicating the course subject) will be delivered online and in a hybrid format. The program is designed to allow some students to complete the degree off campus while employed or on an internship. This option allows for up to eight credit hours of GBLB 572, Global Studies Practicum. Students with transfer credit or accessing another online course could complete the degree with a normal academic load during one semester on campus. Students in consultation with their advisor may select existing online course options for their electives, which constitute only 16 credit hours.

The MS in Global Studies program will be administered by a Program Coordinator, who will manage admissions, financial aid, and advising. Program coordinator duties will be integrated into the CGS' current fully funded Outreach Coordinator position. This will become a separate position once tuition revenue and workload demand become sufficient to justify a new position. Additional program coordination required will initially be managed by the units responsible for the three tracks in cooperation with the LAS Global Studies B.A. degree, providing support for advising and practicum supervision. The tuition revenues from the initial cohort of 15 students will cover the costs of one Program Coordinator. As the program grows to 60 students, another Program Coordinator can be hired. Teaching of the core courses will be the responsibility of CGS, ACDIS, WGGP, and LAS Global Studies.

The figures below represent budget estimates for instruction, advising, and administration for the first year. This is an estimate based on the lowest end of our projected enrollment of 5 students in each track for a total of 15 students.

Based on an estimate enrollment of 15 students, the available revenue to the program will be \$208,973 to be applied towards program instruction, advising, administration, and the provision of scholarships.

The MS in Global Studies will be a self-supporting program as described by the Graduate College Handbook (<https://grad.illinois.edu/gradhandbook/costrec-selfsupport>). The self-supporting designation will provide multiple advantages to both students and the units administering the degree. Tuition generated from this program is not aimed at compensating for losses in other programs, since this is the only graduate degree offered by the collaborating units. Tuition will benefit directly the students enrolled in the program by funding instruction, providing access to high quality experiential learning experiences through faculty guided independent projects and practicum learning, and supporting the advising services required to ensure students receive a quality education and are placed for the job market. In addition,

tuition generated by the program will enable the units to provide both need and merit based funding to qualifying students through the creation of scholarships. At the departmental level, the self-supporting classification will allow courses currently funded by grant and endowment funds to be paid for by hard, tuition funding. In addition, it will allow the units to move grant funded aspects of positions into more solid sources, allowing the units to sustainably shift activities towards student centered learning, mentoring, and support. Courses developed for the program, however, will be open to all graduate students to pursue a graduate minor in either Global Studies or Gender Relations and International Development.

Financial Resources

How does the unit intend to financially support this proposal?

Oversight for the program will be provided by the Center for Global Studies (CGS) in collaboration with the IGI, WGGP, and ACDIS. As noted previously, Title VI funding for the period of 2022-26 is seeding course development, program design, and the advising position. These external funds will carry the program to 2026 when it will be fully funded by tuition revenue.

With current U.S. Department of Education (USDOE) Title VI funding to seed the development of the program and future tuition income from fee-paying students, a need for additional state funding is not anticipated. Operations for each of the units proposing the major are presently funded by a combination of endowment, external and state funds through the IGI. Initial funding for CGS to develop the program was provided by the USDOE Title VI National Research Center (NRC) and Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship programs. Since 2003 the USDOE has designated CGS a Title VI National Resource Center (NRC) and Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship Program and awarded the Center, for the 2003-2006 period, \$718,612 in support of its NRC programs and \$354,000 in FLAS Fellowships. CGS was successfully awarded renewal of this status in each of the subsequent award periods with the most recent a total of \$1,910,000 for the 2022-26 cycle. This near-doubling of USDOE-awarded resources indicates the DOE's confidence in CGS' stewardship of its programs and funds. As part of its application to the USDOE programs, CGS committed to establishing an MS in Global Studies program.

Although students in the MS in Global Studies program will be able to apply for a non-waiver bearing fellowship through the Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) program, the MS in Global Studies will not rely on FLAS tuition revenue as the core of student recruitment. The units anticipate dedicating a percentage of tuition revenue to additional scholarship to be offered on a need and merit basis.

Master of Science in Global Studies.

We propose to establish a Master of Science (MS) in Global Studies. This degree program builds upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGGP) Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus through support from Center for Global Studies (CGS), Program in Arms Control and International Security (ACDIS), and WGGP. It provides a professionally oriented graduate degree track that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies B.A. degree and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This program will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing global governance and civil society organizations. The MS in Global Studies curriculum includes three tracks: 1) Global Security; 2) Gender and Public Policy; and 3) Global Governance, with additional details provided in the next section.

Global Security: Students aiming for careers in government, and non-governmental commercial or non-profit sectors and interested that deal with matters related to national, international, and global security will gain preparation for work in interdisciplinary settings on issues related to prevention, conduct, and ameliorating effects of conflicts and potential conflicts in arenas involving conventional or unconventional weapons, environment stresses, natural disasters and disease, or interactions thereof.

Gender and Public Policy: The Gender and Public Policy track prepares students for leadership in international and domestic careers in government and non-profit agencies that focus on gender and policy issues.

Global Governance: This track will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. This track is based on interdisciplinary and professional knowledge, as well as the conceptual frameworks, analytic tools, and methodologies from multiple fields. This track integrates students' specialized skills within the broader interdisciplinary, intellectual, and public policy demands of the challenges confronting the world's populations.

The MS in Global Studies builds upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, WGGP Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus through support from the Center for Global Studies, Program in Arms Control & Domestic and International Security, and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives Program. Support in this context is defined as both funding and leadership in advancing ideas that impact the curriculum. This MS in Global Studies provides a professionally oriented graduate degree option that supplements the LAS Global Studies B.A. degree and ACDIS Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security.

The graduate major is designed to complement, not compete, with graduate degree programs associated with the other international and area studies centers. Because the degrees from area studies centers are defined by geographical area, they do not generally overlap with or compete with global studies. The MS in Global Studies will also complement Ph.D. programs in many departments, especially the social sciences. Like the core courses in the GRID and Global Studies graduate minors, required courses will be open to students both in the program and those outside of it, providing opportunities for fertile interactions between students pursuing thesis research and professional development. The MS in Global Studies may also provide an opportunity for some students to pursue two degree programs, especially in fields such as law, business, education, architecture and planning, library and information science, and veterinary science.

The MS in Global Studies program will provide opportunities for allied and complementary master's degree programs, such as those in Russian and East European Studies, African Studies, and European Union Studies, to develop joint-degree programs. In addition, this MS in Global Studies program will provide future opportunities to recruit and retain undergraduate students through articulation with the LAS Global Studies BA program to allow students to earn a Global Studies bachelor's and MS in Global Studies degree within the University of Illinois.

While the University of Illinois has impressive degree programs, courses, and faculty engaged in a wide spectrum of global studies, notably in addressing global issues, it has only one advanced degree program in global studies. In 2005, CGS and the College of Education cooperated to create the Global Studies in Education concentration for the M.Ed., Ph.D., and Ed.D, all of which are currently thriving as both online and traditional degree programs. These degree programs focus on educational leadership, policy formation, and pedagogy, so they will remain quite distinct from the proposed MS in Global Studies degree.

There is a broadening spectrum of graduate programs in Global Studies across the U.S. as well as internationally. In January of 2019, UC Berkeley launched a new Global Studies program, joining campuses such as Arizona State University, University of California-Santa Barbara (UCSB), Rutgers, and University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill (UNC) to name a few of the domestic programs. The Illinois program is distinct in its focus on developing professional leadership and policy expertise in partnership with rich programs such as ACDIS and WGGP. This innovation distinguishes Illinois' approach to Global Studies by situating it within programs that receive broad faculty support. Undergraduate Global Studies majors and minors are increasing in number in the United States and abroad as well. An informal survey of the members of the Global Studies

United States and abroad as well. An informal survey of the members of the Global Studies Consortium, the major professional organization in the field, shows that there is a high to moderate increase in interest in Global Studies at their institutions. The Illinois LAS Global Studies BA degree has attracted some 250 majors in 2020-2021. Universities like the University of Indiana, UNC, and UCSB have even larger numbers of majors. By last count, Indiana had over 800 majors, North Carolina had over 800 majors, and UCSB over 1,000 majors. Developing the MS in Global Studies will position Illinois to both recruit students from these programs while bolstering its own undergraduate degree in Global Studies to keep pace with these peer institutions.

University of Illinois

Briefly describe how this program will support the University's mission, focus and/or current priorities. Demonstrate the program's consistency with and centrality to that mission.

The MS in Global Studies program leverages multiple areas of distinction at the University of Illinois to create an interdisciplinary degree program aimed at developing professionals with the ability to engage global issues that challenge humanity on local, national, and international levels. The program thus supports both the traditional land-grant mission of providing knowledge and technical expertise to Illinois residents, and serving more contemporary conceptions of a global public that benefits from and engages with the University. Guided by principles of the new campus strategic plan, this program capitalizes on scholarly synergies across campus, provides new educational pathways that enhance current programs to foster education across disciplines, and develops students who will be future leaders with global impact.

Measures to assess the program will follow the objectives of the IGI and focus the MS in Global Studies' ability to (a) provide transformative learning experiences, (b) make a visible societal impact, and (c) foster scholarship and innovation. Those measures will be collected and analyzed by looking at enrollment, learning objectives, and learning outcomes of the students in the program. Specific questions will follow campus self-study review guidelines and include:

What are the enrollment trends in the program, and to what degree will enrollment change over time?

How do the faculty associated with the program support student professional development?

To what degree are students successfully placed upon graduation?

To what degree are the learning objectives being achieved?

To what degree do learning objectives reflect student needs?

The MS in Global Studies builds upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, WGGP Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus through support from the Center for Global Studies, Program in Arms Control and Domestic and International Security, and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives Program. The MS in Global Studies combines theoretical and professional skills coursework with professional training. In this way, the program expects to provide a unique opportunity for students to prepare for careers in the private as well as public sectors, including national and global governing institutions, NGOs, and international business. By combining Illinois' nation-leading strengths in international and area studies with fields such as the data sciences and global health, this program will enable graduates to engage in focused interdisciplinary studies to address global issues with the contextual and cultural knowledge required to better inform and improve decision making.

Each of the three programs involved in the MS in Global Studies (Center for Global Studies; Program for Arms Control, Domestic and International Security; Women Gender and Global Perspectives Program) have a rich history of developing and supporting degrees, minors, programs, certificates, and courses that position Illinois graduates for productive public engagement and success in their careers. Graduates of these programs have founded multiple NGOs, are leaders in public institutions, and

These programs have founded multiple NGOs, are leaders in public institutions, and excel in the private sector. The MS in Global Studies will provide value added to the disciplinary and professional credentials of students. Their advanced academic certification will increase their competitive positions and opportunities to be hired by agencies in academia, business, corporations, government, foundations, international organizations, and national and international NGOs. The combination of the specialized expertise that they bring to a post, and an understanding of how their expertise and the organization which hired them is situated in a globalizing world, makes their candidacies for these posts more attractive. Compared to those entering the employment field with only an undergraduate preparation suitable for admission to the MS in Global Studies, completion of the degree will provide a cost-effective alternative for graduates seeking employment. In addition, the program will offer people in fields that focus on global issues options for career advancement. The Society for Human Resource Management (2018) reports that in 2018, 54 percent of US employers offer tuition assistance to their employees. Within the military, programs such as the Advanced Civil Schooling (ACS) provide tuition funding for officers and officer candidates to earn advanced degrees. The MS in Global Studies program will provide an important resource to employers by enlarging a pool of graduates with specific skills and topical area knowledge relevant to global challenges.

As described in the Market Competitiveness section, there is strong need in both the private and public sector for graduates with skills to engage global problems and expertise in language and culture. The William and Mary University's 2014 conference on the future of international and foreign language studies documents the imperative for universities to develop programs and initiatives that promote U.S. global competence (Internationalization of U.S. Education in the 21st Century: The Future of International and Foreign Language Studies, April 11-13, 2014; <https://www.wm.edu/offices/revescenter/globalengagement/internationalization/index.php>). Multiple studies cited in this research conference point to the need for organizational leaders to have a greater capacity to work within global and inter-cultural environments. Another study notes evidence that U.S. businesses need employees with international expertise. The authors point out that in a survey with 836 respondents from "U.S. executives who have supervisory responsibility or are involved in human resource decisions," 43% of the respondents believed that "their overall business would increase a great deal if more international expertise was available among their staff," and a further 43% "indicated business would increase somewhat" (Daniel, S., Xie, F., Kedia, B. L., & Lodge, W., 2014. US business needs for employees with international expertise. Center for International Business Education and Research. University of Hawai'i at Manoa, p. 23). Fifty percent of respondents noted that "understanding global interconnectedness and country socio-economic knowledge was of great importance" (Daniel, S., Xie, F.,

and country, socio-economic knowledge was of great importance (Eaton, S., Xie, H., Kedia, B. L., & Lodge, W., 2014. US business needs for employees with international expertise. Center for International Business Education and Research. University of Hawaii at Manoa, p. 21). The MS in Global Studies addresses these points directly. In addition to the resources provided by the career center, the MS in Global Studies Program Coordinator will work with students individually to provide career advising and help place students with internships and job opportunities. Currently, the combined programs of ACDIS, CGS, and WCGP position Illinois graduates for productive public engagement and success in their careers. Recent program graduates have successfully entered the workforce in the Foreign Service, medicine, international career service events and outreach that involves industry, education, and engineering and many other essential public and private enterprises. A focused graduate program will expand upon the expertise required by these and similar organizations that support areas of national need; each workshop averages 75 undergraduate/graduate students and includes representatives from the Peace Corps, Department of State, Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the United Nations (UN) as well as a variety of NGOs. Visiting CGS lecturers, like the Director of the U.S. State Department Office of Opinion Research in the Bureau of Intelligence and Research, meet with groups of students to encourage them to consider government service as a career path. These activities evince CGS' commitment to student career development.

No Illinois public universities offer a graduate program in Global Studies. Only two comparable programs in Illinois exist, and those are at private universities in Chicago: DePaul University's International Studies program and Loyola University's International Affairs MA. However, unlike the Global Studies program, the program at DePaul emphasizes social theory, independent research and writing grounded in social and cultural theory and international political economy. DePaul's program also prepares students for future doctoral studies, whereas the proposed Global Studies program aims to prepare students for future careers through specific thematic tracks. Thus, both the International Studies program's theoretical grounding and student outcomes are different from the proposed MS in Global Studies, and no real impact is expected on DePaul's program. While the Loyola University program has similar goals toward career advancement, its program is directed towards working professionals in the Chicago area through evening courses rather than serving potential students from throughout the state of Illinois.

Institution-level plans: Access, progression, completion, and attainment.

At the System level, the University of Illinois prioritizes closing equity gaps among the citizens across Illinois, within our urban and rural communities, and beyond. While the fundamental needs that will drive greater economic vitality vary greatly across zip codes in the state, it is clear that closing equity gaps among our citizens remains crucial to achieving the mission of the University of Illinois System.

Supportive of IBHE's A Thriving Illinois plan and aligning its Equity Strategy #2, the UI System's Access 2030 Strategic Plan is a comprehensive initiative designed to increase the number of graduates from underrepresented groups by 50 percent by the end of the decade. This will include students from disadvantaged backgrounds – ethnic and racial, rural, and urban. This initiative will strengthen the University of Illinois' bedrock commitment to the public good, ensuring that as we work to improve life in our state, we are not leaving communities behind. It will build on ongoing efforts to create more opportunities for Illinoisans of all backgrounds. The initiative is being tooled to close equity gaps throughout the pipeline, working from Kindergarten through Grade 12 (K-12) through college, including our community colleges. Access 2030 embodies Equity Goal 2 of A Thriving Illinois, providing a framework for and supporting the three institutions' equity plans.

At the institution level, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign's (UIUC) diversity, equity, and inclusion work is led by the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (OVCDEI). The OVCDEI's goals, ongoing assessments, and initiatives impact students as well as faculty and staff, and student-focused programming sets the tone for the institution's efforts as they relate to all of A Thriving Illinois' equity strategies. In the 2022-2023 academic year, the institution launched a campus-wide climate assessment instrument to understand the degree to which students feel safe, accepted, and valued. The goal is to provide a quantitative sense of how individuals feel about their campus experiences. This assessment will include students' perceptions of the quality of their interactions with peers, faculty members, and administrators, including their sense of the campus as a place where they belong and are treated with respect. The university is partnering with the Association of American Universities (AAU), external organizations, and peer institutions to ensure the survey instrument is state of the art, has questions that shed light on multiple axes of diversity, and generates data that can be shared and benchmarked against peer institutions to tease out challenges that are unique to the UIUC campus as well as those that are common to peer universities.

In keeping with the institutional framework led by the OVCDEI, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is engaged with a number of efforts to strategically support and

at Urbana-Champaign is engaged with a number of efforts to strategically support and bolster equity on campus. For example, in July 2020, the university pledged \$2 million annually for the Chancellor's Call to Action to Address Racism and Social Injustice to focus the intellectual and scholarly talent of the university to examine two of the greatest challenges facing society and seek new solutions. The 2021 submitted proposals underwent a vigorous and scholarly review that included pre-proposal submission, evaluation, a request to prepare a fully proposal, further assessment from both internal and external evaluators, and funding notification. Ninety-two proposals were submitted and 22 were funded, for a total of \$1,630,373. The remainder of the funds will support a symposium and other programmatic operations. Principle Investigators leading the funded proposals represent eight colleges and two administrative units across 17 departments.

A significant number of Illinois graduate students also did their undergraduate studies at Illinois, thus increasing access and attainment for undergraduate degrees can support increased access for graduate degrees. Looking at the last four years, campus graduate programs have been able to successfully recruit and enroll between 700 and 800 students from UIUC undergraduate programs, which is approximately 19% of UIUC total new enrollments each year. Looking specifically at those from domestic underrepresented populations, campus has been able to successfully recruit and enroll between 100-130 students from campus undergraduate programs, which accounts for approximately 30% of UIUC total new enrollments for these underrepresented populations each year. Accordingly, although targeted at the undergraduate population, the campus' Student Success Initiative (SSI) indirectly impacts graduate students too. Goals of the SSI are to: 1. increase access (reduce cost of attendance, increase aid, consider time to degree); 2. eliminate equity gaps (increase retention and graduation rates for underrepresented and minoritized students); 3. improve the Illinois experience (abandon "sink or swim" mentality, identify and broaden campus programs, support services, and opportunities for engagement). In February 2022, SSI hosted the inaugural Student Success Symposium, which engaged over 200 faculty, staff, and students. A variety of other projects emerged from SSI that have enabled the university to provide greater focus on recruitment efforts. United with the university's Mental Health Working Group, a comprehensive wellness website was implemented, the Faculty and Staff Mental Health Ambassador Program was piloted, and a Mental Health statement for syllabi was implemented. SSI members contributed to the planning of a UI System-wide Mental Health Symposium and received a \$5,000 grant to create Wellness Spaces on campus. Working toward a more streamlined Learning Management System (LMS) experience for students, SSI team members helped faculty migrate materials to Canvas. An SSI implementation team reviewed Article 3 of the Student Code on Academic Policies and Regulations with an equity lens, provided findings to the Provost's office, and recommended policy changes were implemented in the 2022-2023 Student Code.

Finally, the university hosts a series of outreach, recruitment, and transition programs on their Diversity, Equity and Inclusion website to improve access and successful outcomes in graduate education for students from historically underrepresented groups. The Summer Research Opportunities Program at Illinois brings highly

competitive undergraduate students for a nine-week introduction to graduate study. Participants conduct research under the mentorship of a faculty member in their chosen field of study, explore careers in research, attend workshops, and take part in team activities that prepare them for graduate study. ASPIRE Illinois recruits talented students from backgrounds typically underrepresented at elite institutions to consider attending graduate school at Illinois. Toward this aim, campus fosters a webinar series to guide students through the process of selecting a graduate program and submitting competitive applications. In addition, ASPIRE applicants are supported through direct contacts with Directors of Graduate Studies and faculty as well as through campus visits. The Community of Scholars visit weekend unites newly admitted students with their admitting graduate programs and with prospective peers. Through networking and orientation to the campus, students are able to better understand how graduate study at the university can support their short and long-term goals.

To support the graduate school application process, application fee waivers are provided for Illinois Promise students, Summer Research Opportunities Program participants, McNair Scholars, ASPIRE scholars, individuals with US military service and FreeApp applicants through a Big Ten Academic Alliance program to increase access to graduate education for diverse applicants.

College, Department, and Program-level plans: Access, progression, completion, and attainment.

CGS's equity plans to implement systemic solutions to increase access and opportunities for underserved communities closely align with the Illinois system's programs to foster Equity Strategies 1 and 2. Among the tools referenced are high-impact practices which CGS specializes in, specifically through study abroad programs and courses of language study. In Academic Year (AY) 22, CGS was awarded a 4-year Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) grant that provides nearly \$1.4m in student awards, supporting approximately 56 research, travel, and language study fellowships, student research awards, and tuition scholarships for study away and study abroad. The FLAS fellowships support the study of critical languages for students' research and professional development. FLAS fellows are selected based on a combination of merit and need, ensuring that the program encourages and supports advanced language and international studies among students of need. Students in the MS in Global Studies will be able to apply for these as non-waiver fellowships, furthering the proposed program's ability to address gaps in equity.

In addition, CGS programs are open to the public which extends to traditionally underrepresented groups, including ethnic minorities, seniors, veterans and rural populations. All CGS in-person outreach activities are held in wheelchair accessible facilities. CGS virtual events are close-captioned, recorded and permanently archived. The CGS website and all streaming videos comply with accessibility standards, including American Sign Language (ASL) interpretation upon request and support access for users with screen readers. CGS disseminates info through campus organizations that target historically marginalized populations and co-sponsors and helps disseminate info about their events in turn.

In the administration of the MS in Global Studies, CGS will extend these practices toward recruiting and retaining students in order to close equity gaps. Working with the graduate college and the admissions office, CGS will monitor the success of its efforts through metrics of applications, admissions, and graduation rate in order to gauge progress and improve performance.

Describe program and institution-based high-impact practices and wrap-around student support services ensuring equitable access and success for students enrolled in the proposed program.

Institution-level high impact and wraparound support services.

Access 2030 demonstrates the University of Illinois' commitment to supporting "the ongoing learning renewal of students and systemic implementation of evidence-informed student support practices." This equity-focused plan includes emphasis on the three universities' summer bridge programs, proactive advising, and high-impact practices to support retention and to ensure equitable access and success.

In addition to Access 2030, the System supports students through the President's Research in Diversity Travel Assistance award. This competitive program, primarily for graduate students, has been established for the purpose of promoting diversity and the understanding of diversity within the University. Recipients are provided a certificate and funding up to \$600 to travel to a professional conference related to diversity or identity (such as those conferences involving race, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, disability, and national origin) to present papers, posters, or creative work in service to the University's interest in a diverse learning community.

At the institution level, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign prides itself on the array of high-impact practices and services offered to students. These student support practices support the ongoing learning renewal of students and systemic implementation of evidence-informed student practices, which align with Equity Strategy 1 of A Thriving Illinois. The Counseling Center, Office of the Dean of Students, McKinley Health Center, and Student Assistance Center are accessible to all students via in-person or remote options to facilitate student wellness and retention. All students are encouraged to participate in workshops hosted by the university's Writer's Workshop and are eligible to receive assistance on writing projects through their writing assistants. For students with disabilities, Disability Resources & Educational Services (DRES) has helped thousands of students earn college degrees and Urbana-Champaign has been recognized as a national leader in the area of post-secondary education for persons with disabilities. Indeed, as the oldest post-secondary disability support program in the world, DRES has been associated with many programmatic innovations including:

- The seminal research which led to the development of the first architectural accessibility standards that would become the American National Standards Institute Standards;
- The first wheelchair-accessible fixed route bus system;
- The first accessible university residence halls;

- The first university service fraternity and advocacy group comprised of students with disabilities, Delta Sigma Omicron; and
- The first university to receive the Barrier-Free America Award from the Paralyzed Veterans of America (2012).

Additionally, poised at the crossroads of academic and student affairs, the Office of Minority Student Affairs (OMSA) is one of the oldest and most comprehensive student support programs in the nation. The OMSA has embodied the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign's land-grant mission by championing access for all students and providing a comprehensive array of college preparatory and support services to bolster students' success since its inception. Programs such as AMPS (Academic Mentoring, Programs, and Services) through OMSA also align with A Thriving Illinois Equity Strategy 8 with the use of near-peer mentoring and staff as mentors/coaches. Graduate students serve as program assistants/mentors in the office. OMSA currently houses six departments.

The Office of Student Affairs, particularly through their Office of Inclusion and Intercultural Relations (OIIR), supports numerous programs aimed at supporting diverse groups of students including working adults, students of color, and transfer and low-income students (just a sampling of which are provided in this document. OIIR houses UIUC's cultural and resource centers and a variety of high-impact programs, such as programming, support, and services geared toward African American students, Latino/a students. Veteran support is provided through the Chez Veterans Center out of our College of Applied Health Sciences, which includes individualized academic and career coaching to support progress and address barriers, peer and professional mentoring to foster community and networking, and health and wellness services to promote psychosocial adjustments and well-being.

Other support services for graduate students include the Sloan University Center of Exemplary Mentoring and the Summer Predoctoral Institute. The Sloan University Center of Exemplary Mentoring at Illinois, funded by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation is designed to broaden participation of Black, Latinx and Indigenous doctoral students in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) while catalyzing institutional change for student success. In addition to studying in highly ranked, world class programs, the program emphasizes mentoring, professional development, and social activities to help build a community of successful scholars who are well-prepared to become leaders in the workforce and in academia.

The Summer Predoctoral Institute is a nine-week program for incoming graduate students who have accepted their offer of admission to an Illinois graduate program. The Institute provides an advanced opportunity for graduate students to become quickly prepared for the rigors, culture and expectations of graduate school during the summer prior to the start of their graduate studies. The Institute offers an orientation, a series of seminars, and time to work with a research adviser in the student's academic unit.

Finally, the university has a robust Career Center which offers coaching and support

Finally, the university has a robust Career Center, which offers coaching and support students and connects them to opportunities, as they make career decisions and learn lifelong career management skills. They serve as leaders of the UIUC career services community.

College, department, and program-level high-impact and wraparound support services.

Explain institutional strategies being implemented to increase and retain faculty, staff, and administrators of color and the implications for the proposed program. Explain how progress will be monitored.

Institution-level efforts to recruit and retain faculty, staff, and administrators of color.

Aligned with Equity Strategy 3 (Implement equitable talent management to increase and retain faculty, staff, administrators, and trustees of color), the University of Illinois (UI) System and the UIUC Campus support efforts in this area, particularly in supporting underrepresented minority faculty. The Distinguished Faculty Recruitment Program has a stated goal of increasing underrepresented minority faculty. Since 2017, the System has committed \$20 million to this program, the recruitment of tenured, star, or rising faculty from a range of disciplines who can transform our universities by their exceptional scholarship and teaching. One criterion is that the faculty member "will enhance diversity in the unit and in the college." The Public Voices Fellowship is a year-long program open to tenured faculty to join a cohort of leaders, the majority of whom will be underrepresented (including women) and provide them with extraordinary support, leadership skills, and knowledge to ensure their ideas shape not only their fields, but also the greater public conversations of our age. The Leadership Initiative for Women Faculty brings together women faculty from across the UI System who are leaders and/or potential leaders to identify barriers to and facilitators for advancement of women. Finally, the System will also be providing funding in support of each university's faculty recruitment plans which will also emphasize the recruitment of underrepresented minority faculty.

As a campus, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign is committed to investing in strategic hiring of faculty to maintain our academic strengths, respond to student demand, and capture opportunities. Investments from the Office of the Provost in faculty hiring, retention, and development are critical to maintaining and enhancing the academic excellence of our campus, especially at a time when the competition for top talent is intense. The Next 150 strategic plan identified a major hiring initiative to expand faculty hiring in key areas over the next five years, with the goal of expanding the overall size of the faculty. While the COVID-19 pandemic slowed that initiative, the University remains committed to hiring with the goals of enhancing faculty diversity and meeting student demand.

Though all faculty hiring is a department and college-level decision, the campus has devoted significant resources to incentivize hiring activities that support diversity, recruitment, and retention goals. Prominent among those programs are the Targets of Opportunity Program (TOP) and the Dual Career Academic Couples (DCAC) program.

The TOP program provides recurring funds for salary support for hires that enhance campus diversity, including faculty from underrepresented groups and women in STEM fields. Nearly all of these hires are identified through a traditional search process. The Provost invests ~\$1 million per year in this recurring salary support for TOP. The Office of the Provost, in conjunction with the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion also announced a temporary modification to the TOP program to recruit more faculty of color. This initiative made an additional ~\$1 million available to units to support hiring in this area. For the DCAC program, the Provost provides recurring matching funds (i.e., 1/3 of the initial salary) if the partner is hired into a tenure track position through the DCAC program. Several years ago, the Provost modified the DCAC program to provide only non-recurring funding (1-3 years) for non-tenure track partner hires which has helped to reduce the overall cost of the program.

The campus also continues to fund postdoctoral fellowships targeted to underrepresented scholars in ethnic studies programs (e.g., Latina/Latino Studies, American Indian Studies, etc.) and through the Diversity Realized by Visioning Excellence (DRIVE) program. These programs are intended to help provide postdocs with an opportunity to build a foundation of scholarship that will prepare them for tenure track positions. While the ethnic studies postdocs are selected through a specific advertisement, the DRIVE program identifies candidates through a search process for open faculty positions.

Finally, through a partnership with the University System Office and departments, the Provost's Office also supports the Underrepresented Faculty Recruitment Program in making available non-recurring funds for research to enhance offers of employment. Awards up to \$20,000 per year for each of the first three years of employment were made available for those hired in the 2022-2023 academic year. The Provost's Office funds the additional search expenses incurred by bringing an additional candidate to campus if that person is from an underrepresented group.

Additional retention efforts include programming and development activities for executive officers and faculty members across ranks. Programming and resources for unit executive officers (EOs) equip them with the knowledge and skills necessary for leadership including ways to enhance their ability to support and mentor faculty within their units, particularly faculty members of color. The Office of the Provost also coordinates several leadership development programs to increase the pool of potential academic leaders on campus with intentional focus on supporting faculty members from marginalized and underrepresented groups to explore campus leadership and administrative roles.

The Office of the Provost also invests in faculty development. From recruitment to onboarding, through promotion, and retirement, faculty members have access to programming and resources designed to meet them and address their careers needs. The office also supports several institutional memberships that provide external resources to our faculty, such as the National Center for Faculty Development and Diversity (NCFDD) to ensure faculty members' continued access to NCFDD's resources.

To monitor progress of our efforts to recruit and retain faculty members of color on our campus, we collect, manage, and report annual data through the Division of Management Information and Office for Access and Equity. Additionally, we release a yearly report on hiring and retention of women faculty of color through the Women at Illinois report (e.g., 2020-2021 report and 2021-2022 report).

College, department, and program-level efforts to recruit and retain faculty, staff, and administrators of color.

As a unit of the Illinois Global Institute (IGI), CGS works closely within this structure to complement and implement institutional strategies to increase and retain faculty, staff, and administrators of color. The IGI and its units have an excellent record of recruitment and retention of faculty, staff, and administrators of color. As units deeply invested in building understanding about the Global South, among other world regions, at UIUC and its communities, the IGI has prioritized building connections between global communities and themes and underrepresented minority communities in the United States. The units are also attuned to experiences of ethnic, racial, gender, and religious minorities in world regions as well as the experiences of international students

Sustainability

Describe strategies and initiatives the institution plans to implement that makes the proposed program and college more generally affordable for students and their families, including those who have been historically underserved.

Institution-level affordability plans.

The University of Illinois and the University of Illinois System have been committed to implementing strategies to make college “more affordable, particularly those who have been historically underserved.”

The Graduate College Fellowship program provides financial support through fellowships and tuition and partial fee waivers to students from historically underrepresented groups. These awards include \$20,000 annual stipends for 1 year for master’s degree students and a \$25,000 annual stipend for 3 years for doctoral students along with additional funding commitments from their academic program for the remaining years of their studies. Annually, \$3.5 million dollars of campus funds are allocated to these fellowships.

In an effort to acknowledge financial constraints that may impact retention, in March 2020, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign raised the threshold that previously prevented course registration due to holds placed on student accounts resulting past-due balances of over \$200. The change now only impacts students whose past-due balance is over \$1,500. This proactive institutional response is an example of alignment with the Sustainability Goal, Strategy 3 of A Thriving Illinois.

College, department, and program affordability plans.

Tuition generated from this program is not aimed at compensating for losses in other programs, since this is the only graduate degree offered by the collaborating units. Tuition will benefit directly the students enrolled in the program by funding instruction, providing access to high quality experiential learning experiences through faculty guided independent projects and practicum learning, and supporting the advising services required to ensure students receive a quality education and are placed for the job market.

Importantly, tuition generated by the program will enable the units to provide both need based funding to qualifying students through the creation of scholarships. Further, students enrolled in the program will be eligible for other grant funded scholarships administered by Centers in the Illinois Global Institute through longstanding programs such as the US Department of Education's Title VI Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowship. These scholarships support the education of historically underserved students by taking into account financial need in their assessment of applicants.

Provide tuition
cost analysis for
comparable
programs and

When analyzed against comparable programs in Illinois, tuition for the MS in Global Studies program is favorable. Among Illinois' public universities, this will be a unique offering and will provide significant cost advantages to Illinois residents.

For residents, annual tuition for the MS in Global Studies is \$13,776. Programs such as DePaul University's Master's in International Studies exceed this rate at \$17,832. Loyola University's MA in International Affairs tuition is currently \$20,344 for graduate programs.

Growth

Provide a supply and demand analysis for the proposed program that, at minimum, does the following: a) Provides evidence of student interest in the proposed program including any strategies to incentivize students to stay in Illinois. b) Identifies and provides evidence of a high-quality credential with viability for future careers.

Drawing on repeatedly renewed U.S. Higher Education Act Title VI support and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGPP) endowment income, the Center for Global Studies and WGPP have a long history of outreach programs that have expanded from nearby audiences to broader availability, within the State of Illinois and beyond. For the ACDIS program, outreach includes U.S. National Laboratories including the one at Argonne, Illinois. Graduates remain in touch with the ACDIS program, including via a LinkedIn network. A particularly important feature of the MS in Global Studies program is its emphasis on academic credit for a range of 4–8 semester hours for a mentored external practicum program. Such assignments will be offered in industry, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and in government with particular emphasis on the U.S. military. ACDIS has decades of experience of interactions with the U.S. armed forces undergraduate and graduate students on campus, a decade of supervision of U.S. Air Force National Defense Fellows, briefings of senior military officers, and a stint of the current ACDIS Director on the campus Military Education Council.

There are over 150,000 U.S. military officers at a rank where obtaining a master's degree is strongly encouraged and useful both for promotion and for employment after discharge. The MS in Global Studies curriculum is particularly well suited for this cohort. The U.S. military provides tuition support and some opportunities for on-campus study; and sufficient online courses and practicum opportunities will be available for those who need to complete all of the program off campus. The State of Illinois is fourth in the per capita number of military reserve personnel, with Ohio and Pennsylvania having only marginally more. Although active duty personnel are often assigned to some of the larger military installations elsewhere in the United States and abroad, they do show tendency to settle in Illinois after active duty.

Explain how the program engaged with business and industry in its development and how it will spur the state's economy by leveraging partnerships with local, regional, and state industry, business leaders and employers.

Illinois has historically been globally connected via transcontinental railways and inland waterways, including since St. Lawrence Seaway improvements in 1887 and 1932. O'Hare International Airport was the world's busiest from 1963–1998 and remains amongst the top 4. Aside from petroleum exporting states Texas and Louisiana, Illinois has the largest per capita export sales of any U.S. state, at over \$5,000 per capita in 2021. That \$65.9 billion in exports is diversified. The agricultural component, albeit important at \$11.2 billion, is nevertheless only 1/6 of the total. For example, recent reorganization of Caterpillar, with \$51 billion total sales and 57% of that outside North America, retains over 17,000 Illinois employees, with over 12,000 in the Peoria area alone and an innovation center working with the University in Champaign. In brief, international engagement and Illinois go hand in hand. The MS in Global Studies program will augment the already extensive interactions between the University of Illinois and these sectors of the Illinois' local, regional, and state business leaders and employers.

Describe how the proposed program will expand access and opportunities for students through high-impact practices including research opportunities, internships, apprenticeships, career pathways, and other field experiences.

As the program progresses, it will open up new educational opportunities. One of these should be expansion of opportunities for taking a broader set of elective courses online. This would help address the needs both of students who spend one semester on campus and those who complete the degree requirements fully online. Also expected is increased interest in a new course dealing with security analysis applications, building on the Global Security course that satisfies a core requirement in the Global Security track. Such an opportunity would be broadly useful, and particularly so for military officers pursuing the degree.

Explain how the proposed program will expand its models of teaching and learning, research, and/or public service and outreach that provide opportunity for students to succeed in the work of the future.

The MS in Global Studies program is designed to be fully integrated into the overall campus emphasis on excellence in education and research. All of the courses satisfying core degree requirements are planned to be open, without restriction, to students pursuing other campus master's and PhD degrees. For example, an interdisciplinary master's degree concentration in Energy Systems has the majority of its required core course student enrollments drawn from students pursuing other degrees. Approval of the MS in Global Studies program will also open up new graduate teaching assistant opportunities for students pursuing Ph.D. degrees.

The MS in Global Studies program will address three important aspects of international engagement. These are understanding global and regional contexts, addressing to pressing regional security challenges, and attention to particular impacts related to gender. Considerable groundwork has been done on campus both at the undergraduate and graduate education levels. That includes an undergraduate Global Studies Major with over 100 students, a Global Studies Graduate Minor currently at 19 students from its start in 2016, a Gender Relations in International Development Minor, and a long-standing undergraduate certificate in Global Security. While our undergraduates who go on to a Ph.D. often move to other institutions for variety of educational experience, the MS in Global Studies is well suited to host a stimulating interactive mix of our own undergraduates and enrollees from other states and abroad. The early target enrollments envision about 15–20 students. As those students graduate and the program becomes widely recognized for its unique mix of study tracks, it is reasonable to expect that its enrollment will more than double. That will allow for the original target numbers to be nurtured as retained campus undergraduates and enrollment of a comparable number of students with other and complementary backgrounds.

Beyond workforce need, describe how the program broadly addresses societal needs (e.g., cultural or liberal arts contribution, lifelong learning of Illinois residents, or civic participation).

The pressing problems of global and regional physical and food security exemplify a broader class of challenges where globally focused education is important for addressing societal needs. This program enhances knowledge base and understanding of, and as byproduct empathy for, people's lives globally. The importance of this is brought out in a curriculum component on climate change, where valuing welfare of people in developing countries turns out to be a necessary condition for a stable and effect international agreement on limiting greenhouse gas emissions. This concept applies more broadly to areas such as broader global environmental issues and tension between profits and ethics in international business connections. A key purpose of the MS in Global Studies program is to provide a focused education that brings together students with interest in and developing understanding of different aspects of these complex problems.

A central theme of the MS in Global Studies program goes beyond preparing students for employment opportunities, as central as that goal is. The World Health Organization has estimated that the number of people affected by hunger in 2021 was 828 million, an increase by 150 million from 2019. The University of Illinois played an important role in the Green Revolution, innovations that facilitate total production food if it reached a global population of nearly 8 billion. While more technical innovation would be helpful for feeding a UN extrapolation of 11 billion by 2100, a technological solution alone has not been not proving sufficient. With limited arable land in regions with still growing populations dealing with weather variability and climate change, other challenges are income distribution and security. All too often, women are left without adequate support to provide for some of the nearly 150 million inadequately fed young children and 45 million suffering from severe malnutrition. For so many millions of people, this is an ongoing and potentially avoidable crisis that predates its augmentation reflected by growing concerns about additional impacts of climate change. Food insecurity and conflict have contributed to growth of UN High Commission Refugee estimates of forcibly displaced persons to over 100 million by mid-2022.

To try to address these problems, over 230,000 people work for humanitarian organizations and UN programs, and also some of the estimated 300,000 who assist Red Cross and Red Crescent. These people, along with many others who are sovereign government employees, face a complex set of challenges. Needed to meet these and other security challenges are (a) an understanding of the regional contexts in which they unfold, (b) an appreciation of the gender component of their effects on adults and children, and (c) competence in analyzing and helping to implement solutions to the security problems that get in the way of solutions. The MS in Global Studies program provides a professionally oriented graduate degree track that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies B.A. degree and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This program will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing global governance and civil society organizations.

The MS in Global Studies curriculum includes three tracks: 1) Global Security; 2) Gender and Public Policy; and 3) Global Governance. The tracks involve a practicum or capstone project and demonstrated competency in a second language.

The program is designed to allow students to choose face-to-face and online course delivery options. Instruction in the required GLOBL courses will be delivered online and in a hybrid format. Existing courses that will support the degree such as GLOBL 500 and 501 have already been converted to hybrid online formats in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, adding to online options for the degree. The program is designed to allow some students to complete the degree off campus while employed or on an internship. This option allows for up to eight credit hours of GLOBL 572, Global Studies Practicum. It is also facilitated by offering an online option the core requirements spring semester course GLOBL 580, Energy and Global Security. Students with transfer credit or accessing another online course could complete the degree with a normal academic load during one semester on campus. Students in consultation with their advisor may select existing online course options for their electives, which constitute only 16 credit hours.

GLOBL 500, Global Society (4 hours): Students will examine three propositions: (1) the existence of a global society; (2) the flaws of its principal, global institutions – the state, markets, and democracy; and (3) absent their reform, whether the global society is at risk. Prerequisite: Instructor Approval Required.

GLOBL 570, Methodologies of Global Studies (4 hours): Explores research methodologies within the social sciences and humanities that are often used for research concerning global and globalized problems. Examines both qualitative and quantitative methods with the aim of introducing students to tools and techniques that can be used in professional settings. Focuses on modeling, geographic information system (GIS), statistics, and other quantitative methods and also examines qualitative research methods. Rather than mastery of any one technology or method, this course seeks to build conversance with a variety of methods. 4 graduate hours. No professional credit.

GLOBL 520, Institutions of Global Governance (4 hours): Provides students with a conceptual and practical understanding of the scholarly and societal debates that relate

conceptual and practical understanding of the scholarly and societal debates that relate to the interdisciplinary study of global governance and the challenges faced in achieving fair and sustainable outcomes. 4 graduate hours. No professional credit. Prerequisite: GLBL 500 or consent of instructor.

GLBL 580, Energy and Global Security (4 hours): Explores the intersection between energy resources and global security by examining a broad range of modern security threats both globally and regionally, including the Middle East, East Asia, and Russia. Students will improve their quantitative and qualitative analysis skills through relevant problem sets and security-related simulations, analyze climate change projections with different policy choices and their economic and human security implications, and develop cross-disciplinary technical communication skills through project assignments requiring collaboration and communication between students having different backgrounds that emphasize qualitative and quantitative analyses. 4 graduate hours. No professional credit. Credit is not given toward graduation for GLBL 580 and NPRE 480 or GLBL 480 or PS 480. Prerequisite: Credit or concurrent enrollment in ENG 571 or GLBL 570, or consent of instructor.

WGGP 581, Gender Relations & International Development (4 hours.): Interdisciplinary seminar examining theoretical and empirical research on gender and the transformation of social and economic structures. Students will develop a comparative perspective on issues of women and public policy by contrasting and comparing such policies in North and South America, Eastern and Western Europe, Asia, and Africa. Same as GWS 512 and SOCW 581.

At least one professional development course:

GLBL 572 Global Studies Practicum credit: 1 to 8 Hours.

Awards credit for professional field experience combined with faculty-driven inquiry and reflection. Designed to provide students with experience of professional-level duties in an approved organization, in the form of internship, work, or volunteer service. This opportunity allows students to integrate the theory and knowledge of course content with the application of principles and practices in a work environment. 1 to 8 graduate hours. No professional credit. May be repeated in separate terms up to a maximum 8 graduate hours. Prerequisite: GLBL 500 or consent of instructor.

GLBL 573 Global Studies Project credit: 1 to 8 Hours.

Students will consult with a Global Studies faculty member approved by their program advisor to select and develop a project on a topic of their interest. Students and their faculty advisors will agree on the topic and scope of the project, which take the form of a policy analysis and proposal, system-level or conceptual design studies, feasibility studies, experimental work, detailed numerical simulations, or detailed theoretical analyses. 1 to 8 graduate hours. No professional credit. May be repeated in separate terms up to a maximum 8 graduate hours. Prerequisite: GLBL 500 or consent of instructor.

Students are also required to take 4 to 8 credit hours of professional development coursework that takes the form of a guided practicum or project. Each student will also select 16 credit hours of elective coursework in consultation with their advisor. There is no thesis required with the student's professional development work serving as a functional equivalent.

The program will be fully supported by student tuition from MS in Global Studies students brought by the degree opportunity, thus there will not be a need to financially support the program beyond this.

The proposed teaching responsibilities will be met by the existing core faculty affiliates and staff of ACDIS, CGS, WGGP, and LAS Global Studies. Instruction within the core degree requirements will be provided directly by each of the co-applicant programs. The MS in Global Studies also leverages the existing strengths of the campus, drawing upon 79 regularly offered courses from across 22 units. MS in Global Studies students will have access to these courses to complete their interdisciplinary tracks.

Please address the impact on faculty resources including any changes in numbers of faculty, class size, teaching loads, student-faculty ratios, etc.

No immediate impact on faculty resources is foreseen as a result of the new graduate major. Anticipated enrollment for the program is expected to grow over three years to between 45 and 60 students who will be spread across the three tracks. Aside from the core courses, students will be enrolled in graduate courses that traditionally do not exceed class-size caps. Students enrolled in the major will take an average of at least 50% of their course requirements within the units managing the degree, with the remaining courses being electives. This program is comparable in its ratio of electives to required courses to other, established interdisciplinary professional master's degrees at Illinois. Based on the requirements of a comparable selection of nine other self-sufficient or cost-recovery Illinois degrees, electives that may be taken outside of the department range from 20% to 75% of credit hours. The MS in Global Studies will be administered by a Program Coordinator, who will manage admissions, financial aid, and advising in consultation with the CGS, ACDIS and WGGP Directors, and faculty advisory board sub-committees. Initially, this will be integrated within an existing Program Coordinator position, becoming full-time once enrollment will fully support a position.

Additional student advising and support will take place within each specialization by the Assistant and Associate Directors of ACDIS, WGGP, and CGS.

In addition to the resources provided by the career center, the MS in Global Studies Program Coordinator will work with students individually to provide career advising and help place students within practicum and internship opportunities. In addition, the programs within the IGI carry out a robust program on international careers that will be available to program students. Each year the Illinois Global Institute sponsors international career service events and outreach that involves industry, education, and the US government, resulting in successful placements. In addition, CGS collaborates with Illinois' Career Services and other NRCs on workshops for public service careers that support areas of national need; each workshop averages 75 undergraduate/graduate students and includes representatives from the Peace Corps, Department of State, CIA and UN as well as non-governmental organizations.

Are the unit's current facilities adequate to support the program when fully implemented? Will there need to be facility renovation or new construction to house the program?

The program will be housed in the Illinois Global Institute, which is in Coble Hall, 801 S. Wright St., Champaign, IL 61820.

Library Resources

The program will not require further library resources. The program was organized in close conjunction with the Head of the International and Area Studies Library and Global Studies subject specialist, who is also the faculty sponsor for the program. The program will be supported by a Global Studies subject specialist librarian, who already supports CGS and ACDIS programming, and a Gender Studies subject specialist librarian. In addition, under its 2022-26 Title VI grant, CGS currently provides funding for a 0.50 FTE graduate assistant plus \$10,000 annually for the purchase of materials to support global studies. Since its inception, CGS, has provided approximately \$150,000 for the global studies collection support, which ensures students will have access to a deep collection to support coursework and research.

Summarize information about library resources for the program, including a list of key textbooks, a list of key text and electronic journals that will support this program, and a short summary of general library resources of the University that will be used by the program's faculty, students, and staff.

The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Library is the U.S.' 2nd largest public academic research library with over 14M volumes and 24M items in all formats and languages. This includes 9M microforms, 270K print serials, 200K electronic serials, about 2M electronic books, 600K physical or digital media materials, millions of pages of manuscript materials and 629K maps. Housed in the main library and 25 specialized libraries, these extensive collections support scholarship and research in all disciplines.

Within the library, the International and Area Studies Library (IASL) curates a collection of materials that consist of nearly 2 million volumes in over 150 languages, which will support the program. Collections are focused on African Studies; East Asian Studies; European Union Studies; Global Studies; Latin American and Caribbean Studies; Middle East and North African Studies; Russian East European, and Eurasian Studies; and South Asian Studies. The combined expertise and research collections of the IASL constitutes one of the campus' gateways to information and scholarship related to area, international, and global studies, connecting students and scholars to the knowledge crucial to developing global competencies through the study of distinct nations and regions, as well as transnational issues and global concerns. The IASL faculty and staff marshal their expertise and the resources of the library to support its mission by delivering international reference services; engaging the campus community; publishing original research, developing resources and media; teaching; and developing world class collections. The IASL works closely with the International Global Institute to provide students with the resources they need to succeed.

The Global Studies librarian who ensures collections and services to support the new MS in Global Studies. The library subscribes to 73 GS-related online databases that provide fulltext and bibliographical access, including Columbia International Affairs Online (CIAO), Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) iLibrary and Public Affairs Information Service (PAIS) Index. The library is also a depository library for the U.S., the European Union (EU), the UN and Canadian documents and has large collections of documents related to GS from the OECD, World Bank, International Labour Organization (ILO), International Monetary Fund (IMF), Organization of American States (OAS) and General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade/World Trade Organization (GATT/WTO).

Journals to support the core courses in the program include the following: Global Networks, International Journal of Interdisciplinary Global Studies, Global Studies Law Review, global-e, Globalizations, Identities: Global Studies in Culture and Power, Journal of Environment and Development, Journal of Global History, Journal of World-Systems Research, New Global Studies, Third World Quarterly.

U.S. Department of Education Title VI National Resource Center funding has provided support to develop courses for the MS in Global Studies. The Center for Global Studies' current Title VI grant will provide limited support for instruction within the MS in Global Studies Program during the first two years of the program. Additionally, these grant funds will support 10% of the program coordinator's initial salary.

Once these funds are exhausted, the program will be sustained through tuition income.

If this is a graduate program, please discuss the intended use of graduate tuition waivers. If the program is dependent on the availability of waivers, how will the unit compensate for lost tuition revenue?

The MS in Global Studies will be a self-supporting program as described by the Graduate College Handbook (<https://grad.illinois.edu/gradhandbook/costrec-selfsupport>). Thus, the program will not be dependent on graduation tuition waiver. The self-supporting designation will provide multiple advantages to both students and the units administering the degree. Tuition generated from this program is not aimed at compensating for losses in other programs, since this is the only graduate degree offered by the collaborating units. Tuition will benefit directly the students enrolled in the program by funding instruction, providing access to high quality experiential learning experiences through faculty guided independent projects and practicum learning, and supporting the advising services required to ensure students receive a quality education and are placed for the job market. In addition, tuition generated by the program will enable the units to provide both need and merit based funding to qualifying students through the creation of fellowships.

With current U.S. Department of Education (USDOE) Title VI funding to seed the development of the program and future tuition income from fee-paying students, a need for additional state funding is not anticipated. Operations for each of the units proposing the major are presently funded by a combination of endowment, external and state funds through the IGI.

Initial funding for CGS to develop the program was provided by the USDOE Title VI National Research Center (NRC) and Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship programs. Since 2003 the USDOE has designated CGS a Title VI National Resource Center (NRC) and Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship Program and awarded the Center, for the 2003-2006 period, \$718,612 in support of its NRC programs and \$354,000 in FLAS Fellowships. CGS was successfully awarded renewal of this status in each of the subsequent award periods with the most recent a total of \$1,910,000 for the 2018-22 cycle. This near doubling of USDOE-awarded resources indicates the USDOE's confidence in CGS' stewardship of its programs and funds. As part of its application to the USDOE programs, CGS committed to establishing an MS in Global Studies program.

This degree will have a self-supporting classification, making it possible for the offering units to use tuition revenue to provide this educational opportunity and offer at least 16 hours of required core courses. Like other professionally oriented, interdisciplinary graduate degree programs, students will work with their advisors to identify appropriate elective courses relevant to each student's concentration and career goals. Advisor approval of the electives will be required to ensure students will have ample alternatives to complete the degree without other departments needing to commit to particular courses' continued offering. This email seeks your unit's consent to list several courses as potential elective components of a new professionally oriented Graduate Master's Degree being developed by the Center for Global Studies (CGS); Program in Arms Control, Domestic & International Security (ACDIS); and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGPP) Program. Each course is listed below for your review. We have also described how the program will limit the number of students in these elective classes. If your unit accepts having the listed courses included as electives, please respond to this email,

noting your approval. Please also note any courses that you'd like to have removed from the list.

We are proposing to establish a master's degree in Global Studies (MGS), which will build upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, WGGP Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus. This Master's Degree will provide a professionally oriented graduate degree track that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies BA degree and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This degree will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing both public and private organizations.

We have developed the core curriculum for the degree and plan to enable students to select up to 16 credit hours in elective courses. This ensures students will have opportunities for interdisciplinary learning and allow them to take advantage of the rich resources available at a comprehensive research university. This degree will have a self-supporting classification, making it possible for the offering units to use tuition revenue to provide this educational opportunity and offer at least 16 hours of required core courses. Like other professionally oriented, interdisciplinary graduate degree programs, students will work with their advisors to identify appropriate elective courses relevant to each student's concentration and career goals. Advisor approval of the electives will be required to ensure students will have ample alternatives to complete the degree without other departments needing to commit to particular courses' continued offering. If your department wishes to limit the number of students in the MGS program from taking a course, you will only need to give sufficient notice to the MGS Program Advisor. Then the MGS Program Advisor would prioritize which students need the available slots.

A total of 70 courses will constitute the total number of potential electives in the MGS.

Hi, Andrea and Steve-

I had one question about your email below. We (my assistant dean Becky Barker and I) weren't 100% clear about the portion of your email below that I've highlighted. My understanding is that the offering unit for an elective course like the one you are inquiring about (e.g., if one of your students took LER 566, we would be the offering unit for that course) does not receive any tuition if a graduate student from a non -LER program takes our course. That would still be the case here, correct? Or is this sentence referring to you all, as the "offering unit" of the degree, rather than the unit offering the elective course? If so, then this discussion about tuition is not related to us, correct?

In general, I am fine with LER 566 (the in-person section only) being listed as a potential elective, although please note that there are a couple of caveats that may make this difficult/not very practical on your end:

1. ONLY the in-person version of LER 566 may be potentially taken by MGS students. Non-LER students are not allowed to take the online version of LER 566.
2. LAS advisor approval would be required and students could take this only on a space-available basis. The restriction would still be set for MHRIR students only and those approved to take it (from the Global Studies advisor's prioritization) would receive an overload to allow them register. This is a heavily subscribed course, and currently, only 2-3 seats per section are available most semesters, although occasionally there might be more.

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

Due to the length of time that it has taken to process this proposal, we are sending out an updated letter for approval of

all of the elective courses.

This email seeks your unit's consent to list several courses as potential elective components of a new professionally oriented Graduate Master's Degree being developed by the Center for Global Studies (CGS); Program in Arms Control, Domestic & International Security (ACDIS); and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGGP) Program. Each course is listed below for your review. We have also described how the program will limit the number of students in these elective classes. If your unit accepts having the listed courses included as electives, please respond to this email, noting your approval. Please also note any courses that you'd like to have removed from the list.

We are proposing to establish a master's degree in Global Studies (MGS), which will build upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, WGGP Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus. This Master's Degree will provide a professionally oriented graduate degree track that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies BA degree and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This degree will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing both public and private organizations.

We have developed the core curriculum for the degree and plan to enable students to select up to 16 credit hours in elective courses. This ensures students will have opportunities for interdisciplinary learning and allow them to take advantage of the rich resources available at a comprehensive research university. This degree will have a self-supporting classification, making it possible for the offering units to use tuition revenue to provide this educational opportunity and offer at least 16 hours of required core courses. Like other professionally oriented, interdisciplinary graduate degree programs, students will work with their advisors to identify appropriate elective courses relevant to each student's concentration and career goals. Advisor approval of the electives will be required to ensure students will have ample alternatives to complete the degree without other departments needing to commit to particular courses' continued offering. If your department wishes to limit the number of students in the MGS program from taking a course, you will only need to give sufficient notice to the MGS Program Advisor. Then the MGS Program Advisor would prioritize which students need the available slots.

A total of 70 courses will constitute the total number of potential electives in the MGS.

Due to the length of time that it has taken to process this proposal, we are sending out an updated letter for approval of all of the elective courses.

This email seeks your unit's consent to list several courses as potential elective components of a new professionally oriented Graduate Master's Degree being developed by the Center for Global Studies (CGS); Program in Arms Control, Domestic & International Security (ACDIS); and Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGPP) Program. Each course is listed below for your review. We have also described how the program will limit the number of students in these elective classes. If your unit accepts having the listed courses included as electives, please respond to this email, noting your approval. Please also note any courses that you'd like to have removed from the list.

We are proposing to establish a master's degree in Global Studies (MGS), which will build upon the successful Global Studies Graduate Minor, WGGP Gender Relations in International Development (GRID) Graduate Minor, and graduate level courses developed across campus. This Master's Degree will provide a professionally oriented graduate degree track that is complimentary to the LAS Global Studies BA degree and Undergraduate Certificate in Global Security. This degree will prepare students for leadership in international and domestic careers in non-governmental organizations (NGOs), government, business, and transnational organizations. Interdisciplinary coursework combined with domestic and international practicum opportunities will prepare graduates to meet the intellectual and practical challenges facing both public and private organizations.

We have developed the core curriculum for the degree and plan to enable students to select up to 16 credit hours in elective courses. This ensures students will have opportunities for interdisciplinary learning and allow them to take advantage of the rich resources available at a comprehensive research university. This degree will have a self-supporting classification, making it possible for the offering units to use tuition revenue to provide this educational opportunity and offer at least 16 hours of required core courses. Like other professionally oriented, interdisciplinary graduate degree programs, students will work with their advisors to identify appropriate elective courses relevant to each student's concentration and career goals. Advisor approval of the electives will be required to ensure students will have ample alternatives to complete the degree without other departments needing to commit to particular courses' continued offering. If your department wishes to limit the number of students in the MGS program from taking a course, you will only need to give sufficient notice to the MGS Program Advisor. Then the MGS Program Advisor would prioritize which students need the available slots.

A total of 70 courses will constitute the total number of potential electives in the MGS.



Non-Residents or students in a program with an additional tuition differential will be responsible for the remaining portion of tuition.

Reimbursable Programs. Programs identified as programs that would be reimbursed from an appointing unit outside their academic college.

JUSTIFICATION: On a separate sheet, please address the following.

1. Describe the reasons for this request and explain: (a) the pros and cons of the classification requested, and (b) how the requested classification will benefit and not adversely affect the academic quality of the program.
- a. The self-supporting designation provides multiple advantages to both students and the units administering the degree. Tuition generated from this program is not aimed at compensating for losses in other programs since this is the only graduate degree offered by the collaborating units. Tuition will directly benefit the students enrolled in the program by funding instruction, providing access to high quality experiential learning experiences through faculty-guided independent projects and practicum learning, and supporting the advising services required to ensure students receive a quality education and are placed for the job market. In addition, tuition generated by the program will enable the units to provide both need and merit-based funding to qualifying students through the creation of scholarships (see question 2 below). At the departmental level, the self-supporting classification will allow courses currently funded by grant and endowment funds to be paid for by hard, tuition-based funding. In addition, it will allow the units to move the grant-funded aspects of positions into more solid sources, allowing the units to sustainably shift activities towards student-centered learning, mentoring and support. The disadvantage of the self-supporting classification is that students enrolled in other degree programs will not be able to “dual” enroll in the program concurrently with a tuition waiver. Courses developed for the program, however, will be open-enrollment to enable students in other programs to pursue a graduate minor in either Global Studies or Gender Relations and International Development.
- b. The self-supporting classification will benefit the academic quality of the program as it will allow the units to use the tuition revenue to directly support student learning by offering specialized courses, creating new and relevant courses, and providing advising to increase the overall value of the program for the students.

2. What type of financial assistance will be offered to students in the program?

The revenue generated by the self-supported program will be used to provide scholarships to students on a need and merit-based level. These scholarships represent a planned direct reinvestment in the program, which will ensure a diversity of students and provide financial support for access to a professionally oriented terminal degree.

Further, students in the MS in Global Studies program will be able to apply to competitive Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowships (FLAS) that are provided through the campus' Title VI Area Studies centers and have been organized in a manner that allow students in participating degree programs to be awarded a fellowship or scholarship depending on the funding model of the degree program. FLAS fellowships support study in modern foreign languages in combination with area studies, international studies, or international or area aspects of professional studies.

3. Has this program had past practice of offering graduate assistantships? If so, please describe.

No. The MS in Global Studies program is new and thus has had no past practices of offering graduate assistantships.

4. What provisions will be made to communicate the new classification to prospective and newly admitted students?

Since this is not a program change, it will not be a new classification. The MS in Global Studies will be administered by a Program Coordinator, who will manage admissions, financial aid, and advising in consultation with the CGS, ACDIS and WGGP Directors, and faculty advisory board sub-committees. The Program Coordinator will ensure all marketing, recruiting and program materials will clearly outline the classification to prospective and newly admitted students.

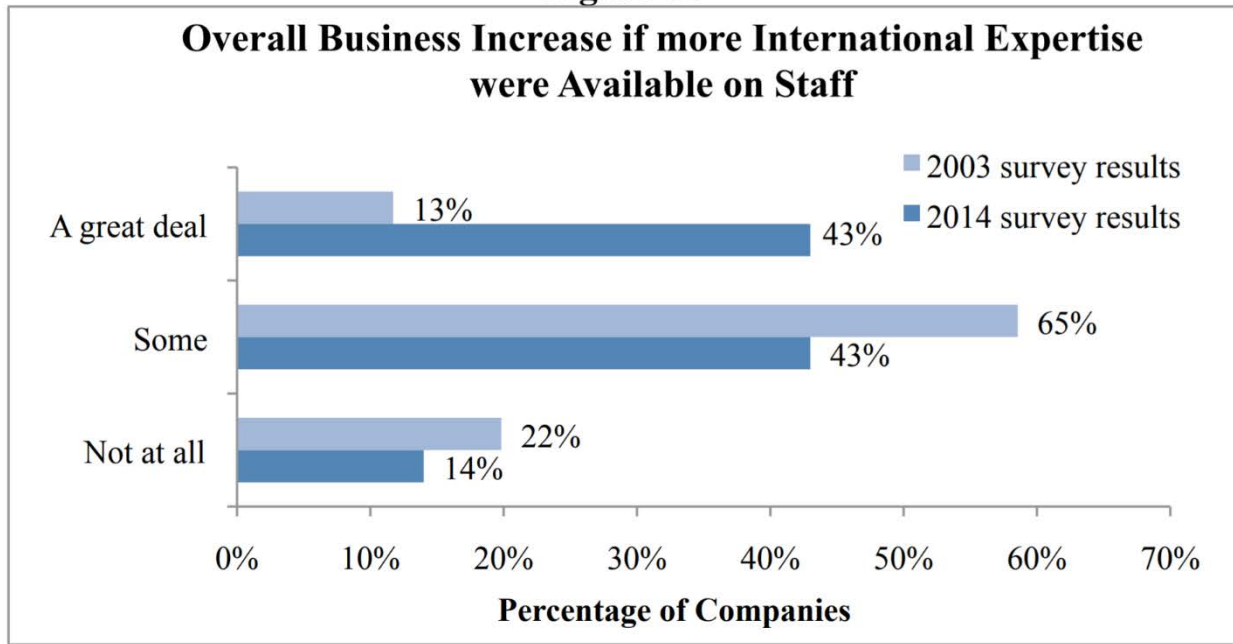


Figure 1: 2014 Survey Result of U.S. Business Executives (Daniel, Kedia, Xie, 2014)

Currently, the combined programs of ACDIS, CGS, and WGGP position Illinois graduates for productive public engagement and success in their careers. Recent program graduates successfully enter the workforce in the Foreign Service, medicine, global policy, computer science, U.S. Department of Commerce, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and many other essential public and private enterprises. A focused graduate program will expand upon the expertise required by these and similar organizations.

Graduate College Required:

Expanded justification of the need and demand for the program

This section presents additional data that was not included in the main body of the proposal.

The Center for Global Studies (CGS) has been active in developing Global Studies as an institutionalized part of the modern university, following some aspects of the paths blazed by early champions of Global Studies, such as the University of California, Santa Barbara, the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In 2008, CGS was instrumental in creating LAS Global Studies, which in 2019 numbers 252 active undergraduates in its classes, despite having no permanent faculty lines as part of its institutional architecture. CGS also developed the Global Studies Minor for graduate students, which allows graduate students to design unique ways of incorporating global perspectives within their primary disciplinary affiliation by combining at least one of two core courses (GLBL 500 or GLBL 501) with two additional pre-approved graduate-level courses with global studies content. Leveraging the Global Studies Minor as a strength, CGS is working in conjunction with Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGGP), Program in Arms Control, Disarmament, and International Security (ACDIS), and LAS Global Studies to develop a MS in Global Studies.

In this institutional work, these program applicants are trying to keep pace with other R-1 universities. As of 2018-19, there are 300 undergraduate and graduate global studies programs in the U.S. alone.¹

A number of global studies programs have gone beyond the financial support provided by their home institutions and federal grants and have secured private donations that have increased their capacities on their campuses and their role in shaping the field of global studies. Two examples follow:

Private donations:

- Roberta Buffett Institute of Global Studies (2015) at Northwestern U.³
- UCSB: 2005 Orfalea donation.⁴

Additional innovative solutions have included designing global studies programs built on the cooperation among multiple institutions, prompting students to cross national as well as institutional borders as a regular part of their studies of global processes. Among the most prominent examples of this approach has been the Erasmus Mundus, a Joint Master Degree that combines study at the Universities of Leipzig, Vienna, Wroclaw, and the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE)⁵, and the Global Studies Programme, which offers both MAs and PhDs, and is built on the cooperation among Albert-Ludwigs-Universität (Freiburg), University of Cape Town, FLACSO (Buenos Aires), Chulalongkorn University (Bangkok), and Jawaharlal Nehru University (New Delhi).⁶

In regard to comparative advantages, as CGS is a Title VI National Resource Center (NRC), establishing a MS in Global Studies puts Illinois on more equal footing with other like peer institutions. Most Title VI NRCs have academic programs associated with them except for AGSC, which was only established in 2018. Three Centers currently have master's programs, with both CGS and IRIS at UW-Madison actively building Global Studies master's programs during the current grant cycle. This strategic goal is bolstered by evidence from the Global Studies Consortium (of which CGS is a member), a group of universities with Global Studies Graduate programs, which have reported steady to moderate growth in their Global Studies Masters programs over the past year. Between other institutions finding success with their Global Studies Graduate programs and our institutional peers launching their own programs, Illinois is justified in pursuing this new degree program.

CGS at Illinois has helped develop 13 major, minor and certificate programs since 2003, including an undergraduate BA in Global Studies, and graduate degrees of an MA and PhD of Global Studies in Education. Illinois stands out among its peers in both number and breadth of academic programs supported, with only CGS at Washington also offering a BA, MA and PhD (in International Studies with

The proposed MS in Global Studies thus presents a valuable opportunity for Illinois to differentiate itself from other universities by leveraging the strengths of an NRC, combined with two other strong thematic centers, WGGP and ACDIS, which provides a distinct competitive advantage with a focus on governance, gender and security not found in the other programs.

Yet, as shown by the number of programs, growth in enrollment, and healthy placement data, the proposed MS in Global Studies offers the University of Illinois a competitive niche. Thus, CGS, WGGP, ACDIS and LAS Global Studies together propose to add a Master of Science in Global Studies to Illinois' rich slate of offerings, to help establish it as a preeminent place for the study of Global Studies.

Although there is an undergraduate Global Studies major, there is currently no Master of Science in Global Studies on campus that focuses on governance, security and gender. There is a Global Studies in Education (GSE) program at the College of Education, but the core GLBL courses are unique to the major and have no overlap with other programs. The Global Studies Major also does not include any GSE courses as electives so no duplication is foreseen.

This Memorandum of Understanding between the Center for Global Studies (CGS); Program for Arms Control, Domestic, and International Security (ACDIS); Women and Gender in Global Perspectives (WGGP) Program; College of LAS and its Program in Global Studies (LASGS) establishes the basis for administration of a Master of Science in Global Studies.

The units named herein agree to administer the Master of Science in Global Studies for at least five years. The faculty named herein serve as qualified core faculty who are available and committed to conducting the program. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Illinois Global Institute agree to the financing procedures outlined herein for at least five years.

Distribution of Tuition:

The Master of Science in Global Studies will adhere to the established LAS distribution of tuition through which the Master of Science in Global Studies will retain 64% of tuition and LAS will retain 36% of tuition (See Table 1).

For the first 18 months of the program, the portion of tuition retained by the program (64%) will be distributed to the units involved in administering and delivering the program to ensure the program's curriculum is delivered to the degree that it is able to achieve its educational goals, and that students receive appropriate services. Each unit that administers a distinct track within the program shall receive 90% of the unit's portion of tuition revenue retained through each enrolled student. The remaining 10% of the unit's portion of tuition revenue will be provided to the LAS Undergraduate Global Studies program to provide support for advising and shared administrative and comarketing activities (See Table 2).

Through these funds, the units that administer tracks will be responsible for advising students, funding, and scheduling regular core course offerings, and facilitating or funding access to classes across campus. Each unit will contribute up to 15% of their tuition gross revenues towards projected shared expenses. These will include the salary of the program coordinator and administrative assistance and the creation of a scholarship program to reinvest revenue toward student financial aid. After the first year of the program, tuition distribution will be adjusted to match initial program enrollment and administrative needs. This distribution will be monitored

for necessary adjustment. In five years, the MOU will expire and the tuition distribution model will be fully re-evaluated.

Shared Costs:

The Center for Global Studies shall be responsible for supervising the work of the Program Coordinator and supervising the staff who complete the following duties: facilitate program recruiting, enrollment, and degree certification activities; organize shared events and activities across the Master of Science in Global Studies; and manage the day-to-day activities required to manage the program. These administrative costs as outlined in Table 3 will be shared by the units within the Master of Science in Global Studies program.

The Center for Global Studies shall contribute current U.S. Department of Education Title VI NRC funds to seed the establishment of the Program Coordinator position. The Title VI NRC grant runs through 2026, so the remaining funds to support the program coordinator position’s salary will be shared by the units with tracks within the program (CGS, WGGP, and ACDIS).

The units will aim to make create a new FTE Program Coordinator position by year two of the program based upon enrollment and tuition revenue.

Addendum to Master of Science in Global Studies Memorandum of Understanding

This addendum pertains to the Master of Science in Global Studies Memorandum of Understanding. The addendum provides additional clarification on the administration of the program.

LAS will be the academic home unit of the Master of Science in Global Studies.

LAS assumes overall responsibility for administration of the Master of Science in Global Studies and will receive credit for the student enrollment accordingly. A committee appointed by LAS and the aforementioned units will serve as the administering body of the Master of Science in Global Studies which shares core courses with the degree. This committee will be responsible for overseeing admissions and advising for students in the degree consistent with the process in place in the academic home unit, LAS.

Due to the anticipated enrollment in the track and the scope of course options available for advisor approval, the projected student enrollment in any individual elective course averages less than two for topical electives and less than three for professional skills electives. It is expected that there are sufficient courses with open enrollment status to fulfill requirements, and any discrepancies can be handled with course advisement within the degree. If a unit responsible for an elective course sets or requests a limit on enrollment that would affect students, then a student's advisor can prioritize approval to students most needing such a course. Should this approach need modification, the program advisor has the option of offering to cover a department's additional expenses, e.g., for additional teaching assistance or laboratory materials, resulting from additional enrollments of Master of Science in Global Studies students.

Master of Science in Global Studies Budget Narrative

Distribution of Tuition:

The MS in Global Studies will adhere to the established LAS distribution of tuition through which the MS in Global Studies will retain 64% of tuition and LAS will retain 36% of tuition (See Table 1).

For the first 18 months of the program, the portion of tuition retained by the Program (64%) will be distributed to the units involved in administering and delivering the program to ensure program's curriculum is delivered the degree is able to achieve its educational goals, and student receive appropriate services. Each unit that administers a distinct track within the program shall receive 90% of the unit's portion of tuition revenue retained through each enrolled student. The remaining 10% of the unit's portion of tuition revenue will be provided to the LAS Undergraduate Global Studies program to provide support for advising and shared administrative and co-marketing activities related to the program's 4+1 option (See Table 2).

The units that administer tracks will be responsible for advising students, funding and scheduling regular core course offerings, and facilitating or funding access to classes across campus.

Each unit will contribute up to 15% of their tuition gross revenues towards projected shared expenses. These will include the salary of the program coordinator and administrative assistance. After the first year of the program, tuition distribution will be adjusted to match initial program enrollment and administrative needs. This distribution will be monitored for necessary adjustment. In five years, the tuition distribution model will be fully re-evaluated.

Shared Costs:

The Center for Global Studies shall be responsible for supervising the work of the Program Coordinator and supervising the staff who complete the following duties: facilitate program recruiting, enrollment, and degree certification activities; organize shared events and activities across the MS in Global Studies; and manage the day-to-day activities required to manage the program. These administrative costs as outlined in Table 3 will be shared by the units program tracks.

The Center for Global Studies shall contribute \$30,000 in U.S. Department of Education Title VI NRC funds over two years to seed the establishment of the Program Coordinator position. The remaining funds to support the program coordinator position's salary will be shared by the units with tracks within the program (CGS, WGGP, and ACDIS).

The units will aim to make this Program Coordinator a permanent FTE position by year two of the program based upon enrollment and tuition revenue.

This addendum pertains to the MS in Global Studies Budget Narrative. The addendum provides additional clarification on the administration of the program.

LAS will be the academic home unit of the MS in Global Studies.

LAS assumes overall responsibility for administration of the Program and will receive credit for the student enrollment accordingly. A committee appointed by LAS and the aforementioned units will serve as the administering body of the Program which shares core courses with the degree. Members of this committee will be responsible for handling admissions and advising for students in the degree consistent with the process in place in the academic home unit, LAS.

Due to the anticipated enrollment in the concentration and the extensive course list available to fulfill degree requirements, the enrollment on any individual course is anticipated to be 1- 2 incremental students on average and will therefore not require additional resources. It is expected that there are sufficient courses with open enrollment status to fulfill requirements, and any discrepancies can be handled with course advisement within the degree. If the departments offering courses limit enrollment for courses required by Concentration students to fulfill requirements, then the committee administering the degree will be responsible for negotiating with these units to open enrollment as needed. Tuition funds may be allocated as noted in the MOU to facilitate course enrollment.

Prof. Witt, (CC: Stephen Downie)

Hello – I am one of the subcommittee chairs of the Senate Education Policy Committee (EdPol) and my subcommittee is doing the initial review of your proposals before presenting it to the full committee to vote on as part of the shared governance of the Urbana Senate. Specifically, my subcommittee is looking at the new Global Studies, MS proposal (<https://nextcourses.illinois.edu/programadmin/?key=1067>).

Thank you for the excellent and detailed proposal -- the subcommittee and I were able to quickly understand the proposal and really appreciate the clarity. We loved the multi-track approach you provided to students.

My subcommittee received this proposal yesterday and our final EdPol meeting before summer is on Monday, so the subcommittee jumped right into it, and I wanted to reach out ASAP as there were a couple of subcommittee question that I wanted to reach out to you as the sponsor to get more information. The subcommittee members have asked:

(1): First, a committee member in the humanities was curious about the choice of creating an MS rather than an MA? The coursework is drawing largely from humanities and social sciences. Is an MS customary for a degree in Global Studies at peer institutions?

This is an excellent question and good observation. The group working on this proposal considered both options, settling on the MS. Among Global Studies masters programs there is no set standard regarding MA and MS programs. In our comparison of programs, we observed that degrees with a more professional orientation such the one we propose tend to be an MS while programs that aim more towards future PhD level studies are MA degrees. Since this is an interdisciplinary degree with a focus on preparing students for professional practice, we opted for the MS. This follows programs on campus like the successful MS in Library and Information Science, which integrates social sciences, humanities, and professional practice. In addition, having tracks in areas such as Security Studies made an MS more necessary given the blend of engineering and technology coursework with humanities and social sciences.

(2): Second, there were questions regarding the language requirement. Specifically, the

proposal states that if students have not met the requirement of “through third year of instruction” they can take an elective course. To us, this implies that there is a minimum competency for the second language that is not stated. Are we assuming that anyone with an undergraduate degree will have had at least two years?

We purposefully did not set a minimum language competency since this can be a problematic metric and is also not reflected universally by a specific number of years of instruction. Given the nature of the work the degree aims to prepare students to perform, we felt it important to ensure that some level of second language competency is required. As noted in the sections on the need and market for the program, we presume that most applicants to this program will have this level of language training. Specifically, we assume that many of the students drawn to this program will have come from undergraduate programs focused on area studies, international studies, or global studies. These undergraduate degrees typically require at least three years of language training. For qualified students that seek the degree without the requisite language background, we have noted accommodations that enable someone to pursue language studies. Further, we have worked with LAS and the Graduate College to ensure that students that seek advanced language skills while in the program will be eligible to apply for the campus' Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowships, which aim to provide advanced language training.

If any other questions or comments arise as the subcommittee reviews it, I'll continue to forward them to you. If the subcommittee fully understands the program, we will try to advance it to the agenda for Monday – however, it is one of the very last proposals to reach EdPol and we're doing our very best to advance everything that is ready, making sure that all shared governance is followed (it's better to do it right rather than getting kicked back later in the process to start all over again).

If there are minor questions, it may be helpful if you're able to attend a part of the EdPol meeting Monday if you're available at anytime between 1:10pm-2:50pm? Once it gets closer, we'll know if this could be valuable, but I wanted to check on the possibility of that given the last-minute nature of this proposal.
