PROPOSAL TITLE: Add Medieval Studies Concentration to the EALC PhD Program

**BRIEF DESCRIPTION:** This proposal would enable students in the PhD program in East Asian Languages and Cultures to earn a Medieval Studies Concentration..

With the addition of this program to the concentration, the current medieval language requirement of LAT 460, Arab 306, or GRK 202 is being revised in a separate proposal to accommodate the study of other non-Western medieval cultures (see attached documentation). The revised concentration would thus be more appropriate for students in EALC and other programs.

**JUSTIFICATION:** Part of the broader effort by the Program in Medieval Studies to expand the field as a global discipline including not only European cultures but also those of East Asia and the Middle East, this proposal is intended to offer graduate students in EALC the opportunity to earn the Concentration in Medieval Studies. EALC is one of the largest participating departments in the Program in Medieval Studies- our affiliated faculty include Professors Zong-qi Cai, Kai-Wing Chow, Alexander Mayer, Elizabeth Oyler, and Brian Ruppert. The department already offers many graduate-level courses that focus on East Asian historical periods contemporary with the "medieval" era as conventionally defined (ca. 500-1500), although what is considered the "medieval" period in an East Asian context does not perfectly align with the European "Middle Ages".

The Medieval Studies concentration requires two graduate courses at the 400- or 500-level in Medieval Studies selected by the student and approved by the Advisory Board of Medieval Studies. The following EALC courses fulfill the concentration requirement for two graduate courses at the 400- or 500-level in Medieval Studies and also fulfill requirements for the PhD in EALC:

EALC 413 ("Premodern Chinese Drama")

EALC 425 ("Chinese Poetry and Translation")

EALC 463 ("Drama in Premodern Japan")

EALC 484 ("Buddhist Meditation")

EALC 488 ("History of Chinese Buddhism")

EALC 495 ("Topics in Asian Religions")

EALC 520 ("Problems in Chinese History")

EALC 522 ("Seminar in Chinese History")

EALC 531 ("Seminar in Japanese Literature")

EALC 550 ("Seminar in EALC")

RLST 567 (/EALC 567, "Introduction to Mahayana")

EALC 568/RLST 568 ("Popular Religion in East Asia")

Students will need to demonstrate reading knowledge of a major international medieval language essential to the student's field of specialization, as determined by the student in consultation with a faculty supervisor and with the approval of the Director. They will also need to demonstrate reading knowledge of another medieval language, and may take one of the following courses to fulfill this requirement: CHIN 407 or EALC 590 (Directed Readings in Kanbun) for specialists in China or Korea; JPN 407 for specialists in Japan.

#### **BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:**

- a. <u>Additional staff and dollars needed:</u> The coursesare already offered on a regular basis and there are no plans to add additional students, so there are no direct additional staff or financial needs foreseen..

Dear Andrea,

On behalf of the Program in Medieval Studies, I would like to propose the following revision to our Graduate Concentration. The proposed revision has been approved by the Program Advisory Committee. My understanding is that this constitutes a minor revision so I have not prepared a Senate proposal form. Please let me know if you need anything from me.

Professor Brian Ruppert of EALC has prepared a formal proposal to add the Concentration to EALC when the requirement has been approved.

The proposed revision is as follows:

#### **Current Requirement:**

Latin 460 or (for students researching medieval Islamic or Byzantine fields) Arab 306 or GRK 202 with a minimum grade of B or an equivalent approved by the Medieval Studies Advisory Committee. (Note: Students who fulfill this requirement by taking courses at the 200- or 300-level may be required to take additional coursework at the 400- and 500-level to meet the requirement of 24 hours of graduate-level coursework.)

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#### **Proposed Revision:**

Reading knowledge of a major international language essential to the student's field of specialization, as determined by the student in consultation with a faculty supervisor and with the approval of the Director, with a minimum grade of B. (Note: Students who fulfill this requirement by taking courses at the 200- or 300-level may be required to take additional coursework at the 400- and 500-level to meet the requirement of 24 hours of graduate-level coursework.)

Rationale: With the redefinition of "Medieval Studies" as a global field encompassing non-Western cultures, the language requirement must be more flexible to accommodate students specializing in field such as medieval East Asia. What qualifies as an essential international languages (for example, Medieval Latin, koine Greek, or classical Chinese) varies by field and is best determined by students and their faculty advisors. The term "international" is added to clarify the distinction between this requirement and the separate requirement for "reading knowledge of another medieval language," which is typically fulfilled by a regional or national "vernacular" language.
