Proposal Title:

Transfer of the undergraduate minor in Italian, and the undergraduate major leading to the BALAS in Italian from the Department of Spanish, Italian and Portuguese to the Department of French.

Brief Description:

The undergraduate major and minor in Italian are currently housed in the Department of Spanish, Italian and Portuguese. This proposal seeks to transfer these undergraduate programs—and the courses offered under the ITAL rubric—to the current Department of French.

Justification:

The common intellectual grounds of the French and Italian traditions and their past and present geopolitical, linguistic, and cultural affinities recommend a shared department for these two programs that have, over the course of many years, independently developed a strong focus on Europe, the continent where common French and Italian historical, linguistic and cultural ties are the most visible. For the most part, Italy and Spain do not share this dense network of historical connections. However, long lasting natural connections do unite Spanish and Portuguese, two primary languages of the Iberian Peninsula and Latin America. The existence of numerous departments of French and Italian across the U.S. testifies to the recognized validity of a French-Italian academic configuration (Stanford, USC, UC-Davis, UT-Austin, U of Wisconsin-Madison, Indiana University, U of Chicago, Northwestern, Princeton, Ohio State University, etc.). Similarly, most academic units specialized in Spanish in the United States tend to include both Spanish and Portuguese, but not Italian. The faculty of both units also discussed the idea of forming a single Department of Romance Languages and Literatures, but this was unanimously rejected by the faculty.

At the undergraduate level, there exist a number of courses that can 'meet with' or be cross-listed, allowing French and Italian to offset recent losses in faculty and enhance each program's intellectual scope. The programs in French and Italian have already shared courses informally for a few years; the 'Language and Minorities in Europe' course (FR 418) was taught for the first time by faculty in Italian in Spring of 2013.

Undergraduates in Italian have used this course for several years to satisfy their advanced linguistics requirement, which has offset to some extent the loss of the Italian linguist. There are also contact points between the two programs in the areas of Early Modern/Renaissance Studies and Cinema Studies (e.g. FR 387, 389 and ITAL 470). Intellectual synergies and common cultural and historical traditions between French and Italian have found particular resonance in 2011 in the SLCL- and EUC-sponsored Mediterranean Studies initiative.

Students majoring and minoring in French and Italian were invited to a "town hall" style meeting on Tuesday, September 17, to have an opportunity to air their concerns and to ask faculty about the transfer of the Italian program; no substantive concerns were expressed.

DESIRED EFFECTIVE DATE: Upon approval.

Budgetary and Staff Implications:

Additional dollars and staff needed

The anticipated level of budgetary and staff support for the two newly-configured departments (the Department of Spanish and Portuguese and the Department of French and Italian) is not more than the level of support currently available for the two existing units (SIP and French). The same four language and literature programs will continue to exist (Spanish, Portuguese, French, and Italian) in their current organization. Funding for faculty and staff salaries, teaching assistantships, and other costs related to Italian, as well as gift funds specifically earmarked for Italian will be transferred from SIP to French, and the College of LAS will ensure that ICR funds are distributed appropriately between the two units.

Faculty reallocations (e.g., changes in class size, teaching loads, student-faculty ratio)

Both the three tenure-line faculty lines and the two non-tenure track academic lines in Italian will be moved into the proposed Department of French and Italian. Undergraduate degrees will be administered by the proposed Department of French and Italian. No changes in the undergraduate majors or minors or the graduate programs offered by Italian or French are envisioned at the time of the transfer, but in both cases the proposed Department of French and Italian will pursue ways in which the transfer can be leveraged to benefit those programs, in particular by exploring areas of trans- and international focus, for example Medieval and Early Modern Studies, Film Studies, Mediterranean Studies, and Linguistics. No impact on class size, teaching loads, or faculty-to-student ratios is anticipated as a result of the transfer of the Italian undergraduate program.

Effects on course enrollments in other departments and implications of discussions with representatives of those departments

No adverse effects on course enrollments in other departments are anticipated. Faculty in Italian and French collaborate actively with other faculty and units in SLCL and across campus. Collaborations with the European Union Center have resulted in increased course enrollments and joint grant and course proposals (e.g., on minorities and the Mediterranean) in the last four or five years both in French and Italian; these collaborations will continue after the transfer is implemented.

Impact on library, computer use, laboratory use, equipment, etc.

No significant impact is anticipated. We see no need to change the Library structure and recommend the preservation of the current organization. The Dean of the Library does not foresee any changes to anticipated library resources.
