

Proposal to the Senate Educational Policy Committee

- PROPOSAL TITLE: <u>Proposed Revisions to the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.)</u> Curriculum in the Department of Recreation, Sport and Tourism (RST), College of Applied Health Sciences (AHS)

- **BRIEF DESCRIPTION:** This curriculum is targeted exclusively for Ph.D. students with a prior Master's degree. Proposed revisions to the RST Doctor of Philosophy Curriculum (see Appendix A).
 - 1. Add RST 503 (Advanced Leisure Research Methods) to the core requirements.
 - 2. Change of credit for RST 590 (Research Seminar), from zero to one credit hour.
 - 3. Change coursework to support specialization (12 credit hours RST courses and 16 credit hours outside RST) to 28 credit hours of which a student must complete a minimum of 12 credit hours in RST courses.
 - 4. Increase advanced research method courses to support specialization from 12 to 16 credit hours.
 - 5. Reduce the number of RST 599 (Thesis) hours from 32 to 20 credit hours.

Overall, the total credit hours (80 credit hours) do not change; core coursework increases from 8 to 16 credit hours (including 4 credit hours of advanced research); coursework to support specialization remains the same (28 credit hours); advanced research methods credit hours to support specialization increase by 4 credit hours, from 12 to 16 credit hours (with an additional 4 credit hours, RST 503, now required as part of the core); and RST 599 thesis hours decreases from 32 to 20 credit hours.

JUSTIFICATION: (*Please provide a brief but complete rationale for your request.*)

It has been nearly 10 years since the Department conducted an extensive review of the PhD curriculum. One of the Department's goals identified in the Strategic Plan for the 2013-2014 academic year was to conduct a comprehensive review of the PhD curriculum and revise as needed. The Department's Graduate Studies Committee was charged with this task. The Committee conducted the review and discussed proposed revisions with the departmental faculty at the end of the Spring 2014 semester. The faculty voted unanimously to support the recommended revisions.

The proposed changes to the PhD curriculum focus primarily on assuring that graduates of the program gain a comprehensive exposure to research. As such, the number of advanced research credit hours increases by 8 hours (addition of RST 503 in the core coursework, and an additional 4 hours of advanced research methods to support specialization). The addition of 8 hours provides an opportunity for students to increase their research competencies. Adding credit to the Graduate Seminar (RST 590; zero to 1 credit hour), provides more formality to the seminar and raises the expectation of student and faculty involvement. Credit for the seminar course also signals the importance of the course in the overall curriculum. RST 590 was approved for 1 credit hour effective the fall 2015 semester. The department's research culture will be enhanced with greater involvement and interactions of students and faculty participating in the graduate seminar.

BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:

- 1) Resources
 - a. How does the unit intend to financially support this proposal? There are no additional costs associated with the proposal—the courses are already being taught by the faculty. The proposed revisions to the curriculum will not require additional financial resources or staffing.
 - b. How will the unit create capacity or surplus to appropriately resource this program? If applicable, what functions or programs will the unit no longer support to create capacity? There is no need beyond the current allocations to appropriately resource the program.

 - d. Please provide a letter of acknowledgment from the college that outlines the financial arrangements for the proposed program. Not requested, since there was no change in the current financial arrangements needed to support the proposed curriculum revisions.
- 2) Resource Implications
 - a. Please address the impact on faculty resources including the changes in numbers of faculty, class size, teaching loads, student-faculty ratios, etc. No additional staff is needed. The current staff, class size, teaching loads, and student-faculty ratios are expected to remain unchanged. All proposed program requirements are currently being covered in full by the current faculty.
 - b. Please address the impact on course enrollment in other units and provide an explanation of discussions with representatives of those units. There should be no effects on course enrollment in other units, as proposed changes are department specific. The vast majority of courses are taken within the department, so the effects on other departments are expected to be negligible, no change from the current level.
 - c. Please address the impact on the University Library. There is no need for additional library acquisitions, as current resources are adequate to accommodate student needs.
 - d. Please address the impact on technology and space (e.g. computer use, laboratory use, equipment, etc.) Technology and space needs are not affected by the proposed curriculum changes. There will be no additional need beyond the current technology provisions and space allocations. No new equipment or new facilities are required.

Enclosed please find the proposal for revisions to the Ph.D. Curriculum in the Department of Recreation, Sport and Tourism.

The proposal was received by the Graduate College on March 12, 2015. It was reviewed by the Program Subcommittee on March 31, 2015. The proposal was approved to move forward to the Executive Committee pending one revision and one additional piece of information being needed:

- A sentence should be added to the beginning of the proposal explaining that it is targeted exclusively for Ph.D. students with a prior Master's degree.
- Currently the RST 590 course is offered for zero credit hours. A course revision form is needed to change the credit so that it can be offered for zero to one credit hour.

The revised proposal and the course revision form were received on April 9, 2015. They were forwarded to the Executive Committee. They were approved by the Executive Committee at the April 14, 2015 meeting.
