

### **Proposal to the Senate Educational Policy Committee**

#### **PROPOSAL TITLE:**

- 1) Establish (3) three additional optional Graduate Concentrations for the Master of Laws (LL.M.) Degree at the College of Law.
- 2) Merge the Commercial Law and Trade Concentration with the Corporate and Finance Law Concentration to make a Corporate Law, Commercial Law, and Trade Concentration
- 3) Change the title and some requirements of the Environmental Law, Sustainability, and Compliance Concentration.
- 4) Change some requirements of the Justice, Democracy, and Legal Rights Concentration.

#### **BRIEF DESCRIPTION:**

This proposal seeks the approval of (3) three additional optional Graduate Concentrations for the LL.M. Degree at the College of Law, a merger of two current concentrations, and a title plus course requirement changes of the Environmental Law, Sustainability, and Compliance Concentration. (see traditional LL.M. degree requirements in Appendix A and current Concentrations in Appendix C). The proposed optional Concentrations all require students to complete a minimum of fourteen credit hours in topics integral to each Concentration topic (requirements detailed in Appendix B). These courses have been selected from existing Illinois Law courses, and so require no new course proposals.

These additional and modified Concentrations (see Appendix B) are open to students in the LL.M. degree program at the College of Law and are fully compatible with the traditional LL.M. degree requirements (see Appendix A). The Concentrations are optional. Students are expected to have graduate standing at the College of Law and a minimum 3.0 GPA to receive the Concentration (in excess of the LL.M. minimum 2.75 GPA).

In some instances, a Dual Concentration (i.e., in Intellectual Property and Justice, Democracy and Legal Rights) is available to eligible students. Eligible students must apply to pursue the Dual

Concentration and may stay in residence an additional semester so that the 14-credit requirements of the second Concentration can be independently met. In the case of the Dual Concentration, credits used to satisfy one Concentration cannot be used to satisfy the requirements for a second Concentration. Students interested in remaining in residence for a third semester to complete their program of study must apply by the listed deadline at the start of the second semester of the LL.M. degree.

#### **JUSTIFICATION:**

The Illinois LL.M. program is designed to introduce international students to the U.S. legal system while also providing them with the opportunity to deepen their knowledge and skills in particular areas of professional and academic interests.

The additional and modified Concentrations offer a directed, optional program of study for the students in increasingly important fields of global legal practice. Each Concentration will enable the College to better serve students in the following ways:

- 1) Each Concentration provides specialized training in a designated field;
- 2) Provides guidance to students in developing a program of study with the available courses deemed most useful and relevant to their chosen Concentration:
- 3) Enables students to identify Illinois as a law school that has unique strengths in the international and domestic practice of law in each Concentration area;
- 4) Provides students with a Concentration designation on their transcripts that will better allow them to market their expertise in U.S. law. Such students will have a competitive advantage in the legal employment market;
- 5) Enables students to add a Concentration and complete a Dual Concentration with the option of one additional semester.

In addition to the benefits for our students, the Concentrations will also be beneficial to the College of Law. Several peer law schools, many with weaker reputations in the subfields of the Concentrations, offer these in their LL.M. degrees. The Concentrations will permit Illinois to better communicate the breadth of our curricular offerings to student applicants as well as to their potential employers.

    - Current staff in the Graduate and International Programs Office has the capacity to serve as advisors, maintain the records and process admissions. Additional teaching will not be necessary as students can be easily integrated into existing course offerings.

We expect that each of the courses may see an increase of 5-10 students per year (including possible Dual Concentration students); however, the courses required have not reached capacity.

No additional or external resources will be necessary as the current staff at the College of Law can absorb any additional duties.

Additional teaching will not be necessary as students can be easily integrated into existing course offerings. We expect that each of the courses may see an increase of a few students per year; however, the courses required have not reached capacity.

There will be no impact on course enrollments in other units as all required courses will be taught at the College of Law.

A slight increase in graduate student population is expected since those pursuing Dual Concentrations may require a third semester in their LL.M. program. The attached letter from the University Library indicates their awareness and readiness for this slight increase.

The vast majority of students admitted to the Concentrations will be current University of Illinois Graduate students; therefore the impact on overall enrollment will be limited. While the existence of the Concentrations and the potential for a Dual Concentration may attract additional students, we are confident that we can limit the overall impact on resources through enrollment management. We do not anticipate the overall population of graduate students to exceed the unit's recent historical highs.

# Appendix A: (Traditional Master of Laws Degree Requirements)

#### **Master of Laws**

The Master of Laws (LL.M.) degree is designed to prepare students with or without any prior legal training to enhance their professional development by adding familiarity with U.S law. Applicants must hold a bachelor's degree (or equivalent degree) from an approved school listed on the International Association of Universities List of Higher education Institutions. Full consideration for admission to the LL.M. program will be given to applicants holding a bachelor's degree in law or a bachelor's degree in a subject outside law.

The LL.M. degree requires the completion of at least 32 graduate hours of credit and is normally completed in one academic year. All candidates are required to pass Professional Responsibility (<u>LAW 501</u>), a four hour graduate course and LL.M. Legal Research and Writing (<u>LAW 500</u>) a two hour graduate course. The remaining graduate hours are selected from any College of Law course.
