# Proposal for the revision of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Multidisciplinary Major in International Studies

### Multidisciplinary Major in International Studies Multidisciplinary Minor in International Studies

Curriculum Code: 321420 Sciences & Letters- International Studies

Sponsor: Charles Stewart (333-1350; email: ccs@uiuc.edu)

<u>Brief Description</u>: The "Global Studies" component of 12-13 hours for the Major in International Studies and 9-10 hours for the Minor in International Studies requires four and three courses, respectively, selected from a list of five specified courses. This revision proposes the "Global Studies" component be redefined by the following language:

For the Major in International Studies:

"Four courses must be selected from the approved course list in consultation with the International Studies advisor; they must include no more than one course each from the following departments: Anthropology, Economics, History, Political Science, and Sociology."

For the Minor in International Studies:

"Three courses must be selected from the approved course list in consultation with the International Studies advisor; they must include no more than one course each from the following departments: Anthropology, Economics, History, Political Science, and Sociology." Courses that will appear on the lists are attached.

<u>Justification</u>: An overly-specific set of prescribed courses in the original proposal has restricted access to the major and minor due to unit scheduling of those courses.

#### **Budgetary and Staff Implications:**

- a. No additional staff and dollars needed (see c below).
- b. No internal reallocations required (see c below)
- c. The expansion in the number of options for courses that fulfill this requirement will, in effect, relieve the pressure on additional enrollments in a single course/department. International Studies majors draw students from the majors now in the heavily subscribed disciplines of Economics, Sociology, History and Political Science, thus relieving enrollment pressure in those majors.
- d. No additional impact on library, computer use or equipment is envisaged.

Guidelines for Undergraduate Education: The multidisciplinary major and minor in International Studies will provide undergraduate students with an opportunity to examine in some depth a culture and language foreign to them and its international context. The major will also contribute to the campus priority of internationalizing our curriculum. The students will observe and respond critically to a variety of forms of communication while developing clear, critical, and creative thought processes. The major and minor is sufficiently general to encourage future development through education or employment opportunities.

# University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign College of Liberal Arts and Sciences MULTIDISCIPLINARY MAJOR IN INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

**DESCRIPTION:** The major in International Studies focuses on global themes, the study of one world area in some depth including language and culture of the area, and expertise in one technical area. Students will take courses in a number of departments and work with an adviser to construct the major curriculum most appropriate to individual interest and future employment and/or educational aspirations. The major will provide each student with a focused multidisciplinary base of course work relating to a specific geographic area and advanced language training needed for the area.

#### HOURS REQUIREMENTS

#### 6 Language and Culture

Select courses from the approved list in one foreign language. This requirement is in addition to and must utilize courses in the same rubric used to fulfill the LAS College language requirement of four semesters or equivalent of college course work in a single language (16 - 20 hrs) or four years of a single language in high school. (Placement examinations may be utilized for students presenting four years of high school study.)

#### **Global Studies**

Four courses must be selected from the approved course list in consultation with the International Studies advisor; they must include no more than one course each from the following departments: Anthropology, Economics, History, Political Science, and Sociology.

#### 9 Area Studies

200 and 300-level courses which complement the Language and Culture component must be selected from the approved course list and include work in at least two disciplinary departments. Select one area from the following: Africa, Europe, Russia and Eastern Europe, Latin America and Caribbean, South and East Asia, Middle East.

#### Professional, Technical or Scientific

Minor selected in consultation with the curriculum adviser (some examples include ESL, Chemistry, Mathematics) or twenty hours of topical studies courses combined into an intellectually or professionally coherent study that is approved by the curriculum adviser. No more than one-half of the course work should be at an elementary level and at least 6 hours of advanced (300-level or designated 200-level) courses are required.

#### 12 Study Abroad

Students will study a variety subjects which could include language and culture courses in a region in which their areas studies course work and foreign language training will be utilized; up to 6 hours may be used to fulfill other requirements of the major.

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The curriculum, administered by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, will require 120 hours of course work for graduation. The minimum required major and supporting courses equate to 49 - 55 hours including a minimum of twelve hours advanced level (300 and approved 200) courses.
