## UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS URBANA-CHAMPAIGN SENATE

October 15, 2018 Minutes

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Senate of the Urbana-Champaign Campus was called to order at 3:10 pm in Illini Union Room A of the Illini Union with Chancellor Robert Jones presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

#### **APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES**

10/15/18-01 The minutes from September 24, 2018 were approved as distributed.

10/15/18-02 The following individuals were granted floor privileges without objection.

Stephen Kaufman, Professor Emeritus, to speak to RS.19.02 and Bruce Hannon, Professor Emeritus to speak to RS.19.03.

#### SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Bettina Francis (LAS), a faculty senator and Chair of the Senate Executive Committee (SEC), made the following announcements.

The Senate Committee on the Library (LB) is extending an invitation to attend the LB Committee meeting on December 6, 2018 at 9:00 a.m. in room 232 English Building to discuss the Library Building Project. More information about the project can be found online at: <a href="https://www.library.illinois.edu/library-building-project">https://www.library.illinois.edu/library-building-project</a>

The Senate periodically calls for a review of itself. The composition of Eighth Senate Review Commission (SR) will be discussed later in the meeting and also the membership of the Eighth SR. Anyone can submit ideas for consideration by the SR through the online form available at: <a href="https://go.illinois.edu/SRC8">https://go.illinois.edu/SRC8</a> or by clicking on the link from the Senate homepage.

The Senate will host the Annual Meeting of the Faculty on Monday, October 29 at 3:10 p.m. in Illini Rooms ABC at the Illini Union. The Chancellor and President will participate and answer questions during the meeting.

The November 12 Senate meeting will be held in Illini Room A of the Illini Union. It was previously listed at a different location.

Chair Francis then invited Lynne Rudasill, Chair of the Faculty Advisory Committee (FAC), to speak about the FAC.

Rudasill stated that the FAC's charge is broader than just handling grievances. The elected committee of nine faculty provides for the orderly voicing of suggestions for the good of the University, added recourse in the grievance process, and also a channel to facilitate discussion on matters of interest or concern between the faculty and the administration. Rudasill expressed her appreciation for the continued "open door" of the Chancellor and the Provost.

#### CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS

Chancellor Jones congratulated faculty senator Kar (LAW) as the newly elected SEC Vice-Chair.

An announcement was recently made that Illinois will resume responsibility for the Research Park. Responsibility was returned to Illinois after long discussions and analysis by internal and external entities. Future plans for the Research Park will be included into the strategic plan, including the budget. There are plans to double the Research Park in size and impact.

Closely related to the Research Park is the Economic Impact Study. The study was commissioned by the University System and the report can be found on the System homepage. Urbana is responsible for \$8.9 billion of the \$17.5 billion impact on the state.

The University is 100% smoke and tobacco free as of August 2019. This new policy applies to everyone; faculty, staff, students, and visitors. This is a significant step forward in the safety and wellness of our community.

Indigenous People's day was celebrated on the South Quad. This student-led event has been celebrated for decades by Native students, La Casa Cultural Latina, and Native American House.

A more somber event was held in memory of Yingying Zhang, the missing Chinese scholar. A dedication ceremony was held at the memorial garden in her honor located close to WILL, near the last place Zhang was seen.

Rashid Bashir was named the College of Engineering Dean. He has been at Illinois since 2007 and played in key role in the creation of the Carle Illinois College of Medicine.

Rebecca Sandefur was awarded a 2018 MacArthur Fellowship, commonly known as a "genius grant," from the MacArthur Foundation. She is the eighth person at Illinois to receive the grant.

Gene Robinson was recently elected to the National Academy of Medicine. This is considered one of the highest honors in the fields of health and medicine. Robinson has also been awarded the 2018 Wolf Prize in Agriculture. It is unique to be recognized in both fields.

Chancellor Jones closed his remarks by inviting everyone to his State of the University address at noon on November 8.

Faculty senator Burbules (EDUC) introduced and moved approval of resolution RS.19.02. The motion was seconded and lengthy discussion followed.

Chair Francis noted that the resolution was discussed at SEC and although SEC is not a sponsor there were six SEC members that were in support of the resolution.

Concern was expressed by a few senators that the process will not move expeditiously.

Faculty senator Tolliver (LAS) reiterated that this resolution supports the initiatives, not the entire 80+ page report. Burbules added that he believes these seven initiatives are a constructive path forward.

10/15/18-28 Chancellor Jones relinquished chairmanship of the meeting and appointed Parliamentarian Friedman chair pro tempore for the remainder of the debate on item RS.19.02.

Jones stated that the formation of a task force is not a delay tactic or a way of avoiding the topic. The task force will not take five years. New traditions will be established and the task force will help us move forward.

#### **RS.19.03** Resolution for Campus Sustainable Landscapes

WHEREAS, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is moving toward sustainable development of campus landscaping but currently has no clear central plan to ensure improvements and it is difficult for the campus community to provide input on these practices; and,

WHEREAS, the large and decentralized nature of our campus has often led to landscape practices with unintentional consequences that lack sustainable design, effective control of water, insensitivity for use of native plantings, and neglect of regional environmental design conventions; and,

WHEREAS, improper landscaping features can be a significant source of greenhouse gas emissions and require large inputs of water, chemical fertilizers, pesticides, and ongoing unplanned maintenance cost; and,

WHEREAS, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has committed that we believe we must, "...exercise leadership by modeling ways to minimize global warming emissions" as part of our 2015 Illinois Climate Action Plan (iCAP); and,

WHEREAS, objective 7.2 of the 2015 iCAP states "Design and maintain campus landscapes in a more sustainable manner..."; and,

WHEREAS, the campus leadership has expressed the need to improve the outdoor aesthetics of the campus grounds; and,

WHEREAS, our campus landscape acts as a "living learning laboratory", a true classroom, teaching students every day how the University values natural order, ecological relationships, and sustainable land use<sup>1</sup>; and,

WHEREAS, improving the resistance and resilience of our landscapes to future climate change will necessitate careful, centralized planning and management of landscaping operations; and,

WHEREAS, funding of sustainable plans of various portions of the campus landscape could be established by cooperation with the University of Illinois Foundation; and,

WHEREAS, the current system for managing campus landscapes is understaffed and poorly resourced, lacking horticulturists and/or ecologists, and is difficult for campus community members to interact with; and,

WHEREAS, the Illinois Student Government has previously passed a resolution supporting the development of sustainable campus landscapes, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED, the Senate of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign recommends the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign create a committee, with the appropriate expertise and competence, who shall be tasked to design and implement a clear, transparent, and accessible management plan for the sustainable development of our campus landscapes with a focus on planting systems with native species that require minimal input, support pollinator communities, and promote positive social-ecological interactions, balancing aesthetic beauty with ecosystem integrity; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this sustainable landscape management plan be overseen by a campus sustainable landscape director, who shall be adequately provisioned with the authority and resources necessary to ensure its successful implementation.

#### BASIS FOR NOMINATION:

We are nominating Alan Alda for an honorary degree in recognition of his dedication to increasing public understanding of science and his advancement of the field of science communication. His commitment to sharing the beauty and the power of scientific knowledge with the public parallels the outreach goals of the University of Illinois as a land-grant institution, and of the Carl R. Woese Institute for Genomic Biology (IGB) and the Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology.

#### EXCERPT FROM THE NOMINATION LETTER:

"Motivated by his own curiosity about the scientific world and his desire to share the excitement of scientific exploration with others, in 1993 Alda became the host of Scientific American Frontiers, a PBS show that highlighted scientific advances through interviews with researchers. During Alda's 13-year tenure as host, the show was recognized by the Council of Media Integrity for "outstanding contributions to the public's understanding of science and scientific principles." His work helped to bring engaging, accurate scientific content to a generation of viewers, a few of whom eventually appeared as guests on the show after pursuing their own careers in STEM.

In 2013, Alda founded the Stony Brook Alan Alda Center for Communicating Science to continue this work on a larger scale. The center provides resources and training to help scientists improve their communication skills, as well as conducting research to identify more effective approaches to public science education. In 2016, in recognition of the work that led to the center's establishment, Alda was awarded the National Academy of Sciences Public Welfare Medal. The Academy honored his "extraordinary application of the skills honed as an actor to communicating science on television and stage, and by teaching scientists innovative techniques that allow them to tell their stories to the public.""

"Mr. Alda has also been passionate about the need to help scientists communicate better. In 2009, The Alan Alda Center for Communicating Science was established in his honor at SUNY Stony Brook's School of Journalism. Through the Center he pioneered an innovative course using improvisational theater techniques to help scientists connect with their many audiences. He recognized that scientists could use these techniques to strengthen their interpersonal skills, and, as a result, become better at sharing their scientific work with a diverse group of people. Today, scientists must be comfortable engaging with fundraisers, members of Congress, journalists and general laypeople to secure support required to advance their work. The results of these interactions are often dependent on a scientist's ability to convey their discoveries in a compelling way. Today, more scientists are better prepared for these exchanges because of his work at Stony Brook and other academic institutions."

"Dr. Hayden is the first woman and first African American to be appointed to the post of Librarian of Congress. She became the 14<sup>th</sup> Librarian of Congress in 2016. She is passionately dedicated to equity of access to information as illustrated by her outstanding career in libraries. Dr. Hayden previously served as director of the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore for 23 years where she transformed a deteriorating library system into a vital community service agency. During the 2015 riots in Baltimore following the death of Freddie Gray who was severely injured while in police custody, Dr. Hayden kept the libraries open citywide to continue service and provide people with safe spaces while most stores in the community shut down.

Dr. Hayden began her career with the Chicago Public Library as a library associate and children's librarian from 1973 to 1979 and as the young adult services coordinator from 1979 to 1982. She was library services coordinator for the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago from 1982 to 1987. She served from 1991 to 1993 as deputy commissioner and chief librarian of the Chicago Public Library. She was elected president of the American Library Association (ALA) for 2003 to 2004 and successfully challenged the government's attempt under the USA Patriot Act to gain unwarranted access to library records. She led development of the ALA Spectrum Scholarship program which actively recruits and provides scholarships to students from diverse backgrounds to assist them in obtaining a graduate degree and leadership positions."

SP.18.12 Proposed Revision to the *Constitution*, Article I, Section 5 and the *Bylaws*, Part A

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures (SP) recommends that the quorum provision be moved from the *Constitution*, Article I, Section 5 to our *Bylaws*, Part A. This change would bring our governing documents in line with those from the Chicago and Springfield Senates which specify their respective quorums in their *Bylaws*.

#### RECOMMENDATION

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The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Constitution* and the *Bylaws*. The revision to the *Bylaws* will not become effective until the revision to the *Constitution* is approved by the Board of Trustees. Text to be added is <u>underscored</u> and text to be deleted is <u>struck through</u>.

#### PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THE CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE I, SECTION 5

- Section 5. A quorum necessary for a Senate meeting shall consist of 100 senators elected and serving.

SP.18.14 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article VIII, Section 4 – Changes in Existing Units

#### **BACKGROUND**

Article VIII of the *University Statutes* governs changes in the organization of academic units. In the tradition of shared governance, it includes faculty, Senate, and the administration in the approval processes around such changes. This article was first formulated in the 1950s, revised in the early 1980s, and revised most recently in 2011. With those refinements, Article VIII provisions promised to serve both academic, administrative, and governance needs.

However, it has become clear that the current language did not anticipate the need to change the names of academic units to recognize financial donors or honor distinguished individuals. This gap in the *Statutes* has led to somewhat conflicting guidance in the *General Rules* and Campus Administrative Manual, as well as to differing understandings of the lines of consultation required in various types of renaming. The proposed language below specifies and separates the renaming of units into two cases: (1) those reflecting a change in the organization of a unit, and (2) those meant to recognize financial donors or honor distinguished individuals. In the first case, this revision states more clearly the current statutory logic for instances of renaming tied to organization or disciplinary change. In the second case, this revision spells out a streamlined path for the approval of the eponymous naming of academic units, while maintaining input from the faculty and the Senate in the process.

This set of proposed changes has been developed concurrently with discussions between representatives from the Senate Committees on University Statutes and Senate Procedures, General University Policy, and the Joint Advisory Committee on Investment, Licensing, and Naming Rights, meeting over the last year with the Office of the Provost, University Counsel, the University Foundation, and others. The administration has developed interim procedures, set out in the Campus Administrative Manual, to attempt to honor the logic presented here. Should this set of revisions ultimately be approved by the Board of Trustees, other modifications will be necessary to other policy documents to ensure that this process is consistently expressed across our governing documents.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Article VIII, Section 4.

Text to be added is underscored and text to be deleted is struck through.

PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THE STATUTES, ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 4

ARTICLE VIII. CHANGES IN ACADEMIC ORGANIZATION UNITS

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#### Section 4. Changes in the Organization and Naming of Existing Units

<u>a.</u> From time to time, circumstances will favor changes in academic organization such as the termination, separation, transfer, merger, <u>or</u> change in status (e.g., department to school), <u>or renaming</u> of the academic units specified in Section <u>4 3</u>. The procedures for the various changes shall be the same as those specified for formation of such a unit, except that the proposal may originate in the unit(s) or at any higher administrative level. The advice of each unit involved shall be taken and recorded by vote of the faculty by secret written ballot in accordance with the bylaws of that unit. For transfer, merger, separation, and change in status, the procedures shall be those applicable to the type of unit which would result. Units affected may communicate with the Board of Trustees in accordance with Article XIII, Section 4, of these *Statutes*.

- b. Academic Units specified in Section 3 may be renamed in either of two ways:
  - (1) If the renaming is related to a change in academic organization (as in Section 4.a) or changes in a discipline or its terminology (e.g., a shift from "communications" to "media" or from "commerce" to "business"), the procedures shall be the same as those specified for formation of such a unit, except that the proposal may originate in the unit(s) or at any higher administrative level. The advice of each unit involved shall be taken and recorded by vote of the faculty by secret written ballot in accordance with the bylaws of that unit.

 (2) If the renaming involves the addition of an eponym (e.g., the name of an alumnus, donor, person, or entity) the proposal may originate in the unit or at any higher administrative level. The advice of the unit to be renamed shall be taken and recorded by vote of the faculty by secret written ballot in accordance with the bylaws of that unit, and the advice by vote of the appropriate senate shall be taken.

#### RS.19.04 Resolution to Protect Faculty from Trolling, Harassment, and Stalking

WHEREAS, "nationally, unfair attacks on scholars have increased, often in social media, on message boards, and through other online forums;"\* and

WHEREAS, recent advances in technology and widespread use of social media are creating novel problems of cyberstalking and cyberbullying that are not yet comprehensively or fully addressed by University policies and procedures; and

WHEREAS "these 'trolling attacks' can be professionally disruptive and personally difficult;"\* and

WHEREAS, a faculty member may feel threatened, uncomfortable, or unsafe if the perpetrator of a trolling, harassment, or stalking attack is allowed to enroll in that faculty member's class; then

BE IT RESOLVED that the Academic Senate of the University of Illinois endorses the efficient development of appropriate and comprehensive policies to allow a department to reject an individual student's enrollment into a class not required for graduation and uniquely taught by a particular faculty member, if that student has displayed a previous history of persistent trolling, harassment, obsession with, or stalking, either electronically or in person, of that particular faculty member.

University Senates Conference (Final; Information)

UC.19.01 Report of the University Senates Conference Activities August 29-October 31, 2018

Current membership of the University Senates Conference (USC), meeting agendas, and meetings can be found at: <a href="http://www.usc.uillinois.edu">http://www.usc.uillinois.edu</a>

USC has met three times during the fall 2018 semester: on August 29 (UI-Urbana), on October 1-2 (Retreat and Business Meeting at Allerton Conference Center), and on October 31 (UIC). President Tim Killeen and Executive Vice President Barbara J. Wilson join the Conference at each meeting for a two-hour long discussion of issues posed by USC. We regularly discuss the economic situation of the University of Illinois system, legislative matters affecting the three universities, planned and ongoing initiatives affecting faculty, and other topics raised by USC. At recent meetings, we also discussed the formation of a system-wide task force on the prevention of sexual harassment (October 31), the current state of the UI system as it relates to its peers (October 31), enrollment trends and implications (October 2), and strengthening USC's interactions with the Board of Trustees (August 29).

At the August 29 meeting, we were also joined by Dr. Edward Seidel, Vice President of Economic Development and Innovation, and at the Oct. 31 meeting by Dr. William Sanders, Interim Director of the <u>Discovery Partners Institute</u> (DPI), to discuss the planned structures of DPI and the Illinois Innovation Network, particularly as they relate to shared governance and to teaching.

At the first meeting of the academic year, we determined that our agenda for the upcoming year would focus on discussing the following interrelated topics:

- 1. The University of Illinois as "the Public's University": changing meanings
- 2. Teaching and preparing a labor force
- 3. New partnerships between UI and other entities
- 4. Shifting forms of shared governance

As the USC is granted time on the agenda of each meeting of the Board of Trustees for a short presentation, we determined in August that we would use our time to discuss each of these four topics with the Board. The first presentation, given at the September 27, 2018 Board meeting, was dedicated to an overview of USC's functions and to a brief summary of each of these issues. We will present our developing ideas on shifting forms of shared governance, and in particular shared governance at the system level, at the November 28 Board meeting.

Now that the UI System is launching research and academic initiatives such as DPI, we will need to develop new structures of shared governance so that faculty can continue to enact our responsibility of oversight over and initiation of the academic and research missions of the University of Illinois. The October 1 Retreat was therefore dedicated to developing a set of principles regarding **shared governance at the system level.** At its October 31 meeting, the Conference discussed a draft of a document outlining suggested best practices and principles, and we anticipate distributing a final version in the coming weeks.

As we have considered ways in which shared governance should be enacted at the system level, we have drawn on nearly a year's worth of conversations with system administrative leaders focusing on the Discovery Partners Institute, but anticipating the potential for other types of research and academic initiatives that would cross university boundaries and also involve partnerships with other academic, commercial, and civic entities.

Another major focus of USC's work this year has been the finalization of a set of proposed revisions to the *University Statutes* and to the *General Rules*. The senates have already received a set of proposed revisions to Article III of the *General Rules*, which deals with intellectual property rights and must therefore be reviewed by the senates (unlike other revisions of the *General Rules*, which are reviewed only by USC). Also submitted for review was a set of revisions to the *University Statutes* aimed at updating the language to reflect the switch in conceptualization of the relationship among the three campuses and the campuses' relationship with the central administration. This switch is reflected in the change in nomenclature from "University Administration" to "System" and from "campus" to "university."

The Conference now turns its attention to a set of more substantive proposed revisions to the *Statutes*, for example, changes to the section on Academic Freedom and Tenure (Article X), to the codification of "severe sanctions short of dismissal" of faculty (Article IX), and to the regularization of terminology to refer to academic positions. Our hope is to forward the proposed revisions to the senates during the spring 2019 semester.
