## UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS URBANA-CHAMPAIGN SENATE March 4, 2019 Minutes

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Senate of the Urbana-Champaign Campus was called to order at 3:14 pm in the Knight Auditorium at Spurlock Museum with Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Provost Andreas Cangellaris presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

#### **APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES**

03/04/19-01 The minutes from December 10, 2018 were approved as distributed.

03/04/19-02 The following individual was granted floor privileges without objection to speak about item EP.19.39. Jerry Dávila: Lemann Chair in Brazilian History and Executive Director, Area Studies Centers and Thematic Programs

The following floor privileges carry forward from the February 4, 2019 Senate meeting to speak about item RS.19.07. Brenda Farnell: Professor and Head of Anthropology and Sarah Colomé: Director, Women's Resource Center

#### SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

- 03/04/19-03 Bettina Francis (LAS), a faculty senator and Chair of the Senate Executive Committee (SEC), made a motion to change the order of the agenda by moving resolution RS.19.07 to the end of the "Proposals" on the agenda. The motion was seconded.
- 03/04/19-04 By i-clicker and show of hands, the motion to move resolution RS.19.07 to the end of the "Proposals" on the agenda was approved with 88 in favor, 7 opposed, and 1 abstention. The required two-thirds was achieved.

Francis also noted that University Senates Conference Chair Joyce Tolliver would give a brief overview of the UC.19.02 report. Any questions about UC.19.02 should be directed to Tolliver.

#### **CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS**

Provost Cangellaris gave remarks in the absence of Chancellor Jones. Cangellaris noted the Unofficial St. Patrick's Day event is not condoned or supported by the University, and also commended the pubic safety officers that helped to ensure the safety of those that participated.

Cangellaris noted Governor Pritzker's recently presented budget proposal and that the proposal seems to be favorable towards higher education. Millions of dollars would support financial aid, the Aim High grant program to attract in-state students, the Discovery Partners Institute (DPI), and Illinois Innovation Network (IIN). This is only a proposal at this time.

	Tolliver explained that this document addresses governance for system-wide initiatives such as DPI. Currently there is no governance structure outlined in the Statutes for these types of initiatives. In response to a question, Tolliver replied that the document has been widely distributed and verbally accepted, but the document has not been codified anywhere such as the <i>Statutes</i> .

# SP.19.12 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article VIII, Section 4 – Changes in Existing Units

## BACKGROUND

At its November 12, 2018 meeting, the Senate approved a proposed revision to the *University Statutes*, Article VIII, Section 4, establishing two tracks for the renaming of academic units. That proposal, SP.18.14 included a background which read in part:

It has become clear that the current language did not anticipate the need to change the names of academic units to recognize financial donors or honor distinguished individuals. This gap in the *Statutes* has led to somewhat conflicting guidance in the *General Rules* and Campus Administrative Manual, as well as to differing understandings of the lines of consultation required in various types of renaming. The proposed language below specifies and separates the renaming of units into two cases: (1) those reflecting a change in the organization of a unit, and (2) those meant to recognize financial donors or honor distinguished individuals. In the first case, this revision states more clearly the current statutory logic for instances of renaming tied to organization or disciplinary change. In the second case, this revision spells out a streamlined path for the approval of the eponymous naming of academic units, while maintaining input from the faculty and the Senate in the process.

This set of proposed changes has been developed concurrently with discussions between representatives from the Senate Committees on University Statutes and Senate Procedures, General University Policy, and the Joint Advisory Committee on Investment, Licensing, and Naming Rights, meeting over the last year with the Office of the Provost, University Counsel, the University Foundation, and others. The administration has developed interim procedures, set out in the Campus Administrative Manual, to attempt to honor the logic presented here. Should this set of revisions ultimately be approved by the Board of Trustees, other modifications will be necessary to other policy documents to ensure that this process is consistently expressed across our governing documents.

Since the passage of SP.18.14, it has become clear that one additional option should be spelled out in the *Statutes*, so that each Senate can exercise flexibility in how it implements the second naming option (Article VIII, Section 4.b.2). This addition in lines 31-32 specifies that a Senate may delegate portions of the renaming process to a committee, provided that the committee has clear conditions which must be approved by the Senate. This addition allows each Senate latitude when dealing with the coordination and flow of the wide variety of renaming efforts.

Because this is a modification to a previously-passed proposal, the Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures re-presents the language changes from SP.18.14, only additionally modifying "which" to "that" in line 13, "shift" to "change" in line 19, and striking "by vote" in line 30 to clarify (presented in **bold**, along with the new modification in Article VIII, Section 4.b.2, lines 31-32), and recommends that this new document *supersede* the previous.

# RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Article VIII, Section 4.

Text to be added is <u>underscored</u> and text to be deleted is <del>struck through</del>. New changes since SP.18.14 are shown in **bold**.

**PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THE STATUTES, ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 4**

The advice of each unit involved shall 22 be taken and recorded by vote of the faculty by secret written ballot in accordance with 23 the bylaws of that unit. 24 25 26 (2) If the renaming involves only the addition of an eponym (e.g., the name of an alumnus, donor, person, or entity), the proposal may originate in the unit or at any 27 higher administrative level. The advice of the unit to be renamed shall be taken and 28 recorded by vote of the faculty by secret written ballot in accordance with the bylaws of 29 that unit, and the advice by vote of the appropriate senate shall be taken and recorded 30 by a vote of the senate. The senate may delegate its advisory vote to a committee 31 under conditions established by the senate. 32 33

## **Graduate Programs**

**Graduate Concentration in Second Language Acquisition and Teacher Education** – Remove SOC 582, Survey Research Methods II (4 hours), from the list of advanced courses in quantitative or qualitative research from which students are to select one course. SOC 582 has been discontinued effective Fall, 2019. There is no change to the total number of hours required for the concentration.

## Institutes

At the September 17, 2018 meeting, the Office of the Provost's report to the EPC focused on the reconciliation of the internal university program inventory with the Illinois Board of Higher Education's program inventory takes place annually. Two centers/institutes with "expired temporary status" (IBHE designator/construct) – the Chicago Center for Veterinary Medicine and the Confucius Institute--formally indicated they will not seek an extension. Banner activity for one of these, the Confucius Institute, has all been cleared as of March 6, 2019, and that institute is formally and fully eliminated.

The Division of Management Information continues to work with the College of Veterinary Medicine to resolve Banner activity associated with the Chicago Center for Veterinary Medicine. An update to the EPC will be provided when Banner activity for the Chicago Center for Veterinary Medicine is resolved.

## **Undergraduate Programs**

**BALAS in History** – Remove HIST 495, Honors Research and Writing Seminar (3 hours) from the list of history electives at the 200-level or above of which students are required to complete 12 hours. HIST 495, which was the honors research equivalent of HIST 498, has been discontinued effective Fall, 2019. There is no change to the number of hours required for the major.

**BALAS in History, Social Science: History Teaching Concentration** – Remove HIST 495, Honors Research and Writing Seminar (3 hours) as an option between HIST 498 or 495 that students must take and can count as three hours toward the United States History, Nonwestern and Global History, or European History requirements. HIST 495, which was the honors research equivalent of HIST 498, has been discontinued effective Fall, 2019. There is no change to the number of hours required for the concentration. This revision has been endorsed by the Council on Teacher Education.

**BS in Human Development and Family Studies** – In the list of Social and Behavioral Science general education courses, from which students in this major were to take a total of 11-12 hours, remove the "Choose one of the following" subcategory which specified 3-4 hours of introductory economics (ACE 100, Agr Cons and

Resource Econ, 4 hours; ECON 102, Microeconomic Principles, 3 hours; or ECON 103, Macroeconomic Principles, 3 hours). The HDFS major already specifically requires two introductory-level social and behavioral science courses, PSYC 100, Introductory Psychology (4 hours), and SOC 100, Introductory Sociology (4 hours), which is above and beyond the campus requirement of 6 hours of social and behavioral sciences. In addition, students in the HDFS major are required to take ACE 240, Personal Financial Planning (3 hours), which the Department of Human Development and Family Studies and College of ACES have found to provide the most pertinent financial information for HDFS majors. The Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics and the Department of Economics have been informed of and are in support of this change. The revision expands the number of hours students have as electives and does not change the total number of hours required for the degree.

# **SC.19.21** Report on the on the March 14, 2019 meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois System in Urbana

Chair Donald J. Edwards convened the public portion of the meeting at approximately 9:35 AM. The Other Guys, a subset of the Varsity Glee Club, sang the State Song, "Illinois", after which President Killeen introduced the official observers to the meeting.

UIUC Chancellor Jones welcomed the Board to Urbana. He noted that the university is celebrating the unrolling of its new Strategic Plan, following a robust planning process with widespread participation. Its 'simple' goals are to maintain, and to build on, the past 150 years' reputation for excellence. Jones also noted that the university has released its fourth annual Illini success report: 91% of graduating seniors found their first destination within 6 months of graduation; their average salary was above \$60,000. Moreover, a large percentage of graduates said they would be staying in Illinois, demonstrating that the university's graduates contribute to the well-being of the state. Finally, he noted that of students who accepted internships, more than 30% received full-time job offers from the company.

President Killeen reported that 2019 saw the System grow by more than 9,000 students, which means it is on track to reach 93,000 students over the next 5 years. Under-represented minorities are an increasing percent of this student body, having risen from 25% 5 years ago to almost 30% now. The increase in the student body will require increased investment in facilities: and there are plans for major capital improvements, with a state-funded capital improvement plan likely for this year. The increase in students will also require major increases in faculty numbers, and he observed that there are two major hiring initiatives underway. In the Distinguished Faculty hiring Program, 14 faculty have already arrived; he invited three of them to speak.

Nancy Amato, who is chair of the CS department at UIUC, noted that she received her Ph.D. from UIUC in 1995, and came here because it is one of the top five CS departments at a public university. Kenneth Kris, Professor of Public Administration at UIS, noted that he is a 1<sup>st</sup> generation college graduate, son of a factory worker from a small town, who has contributed to developing solid financial planning for (among others) Estonia, Minnesota, and New York City. Finally, David Seposki, a historian from the Berlin Max Planck Institute, noted that he was a Chicago native who came to UIC because of its excellent reputation.

The second hiring program seeks to remedy the increase in student: faculty ratios: while the number of students has increased 10%, faulty numbers have increased by only 2.6%. Therefore, plans are underway to hire significant numbers of new tenure-track faculty. AT UIUC, the plan is for 493 new faculty members, of whom 325 would be replacements for faculty who have left or retired; 168 additional faculty members are to be hired. (Note: the departments mentioned as targets for hiring were mostly in STEM – math, statistics, information science, health sciences). At UIC, 255 new hires are planned, of whom 135 would be replacements. At UIS, 25 new hires are planned, of whom 448 are

actually additions to current faculty numbers. These increases will require expanding resources to meet the recurrent salary costs as well as the large startup costs.

Killeen then pointed out that the Foundation reports that \$2 billion have been raised in the 1<sup>st</sup> year of the current fund drive, which is projected to run for 5 years.

Avijit Ghosh reported on the System's risk management and self-insurance programs. He noted that there are four self-insurance programs, which are necessary not only for cost-effectiveness, but also because insurers will not provide insurance to universities unless they have robust self-insurance programs. The System has 50 separate insurance contracts to supplement the self-insurance. He elaborated on the various reserve funds, and noted that the System's relatively low payouts result in lower premiums now than in the past.

Ghosh also noted that, for this fiscal year, income is up due to increased revenue from tuition, appropriations, and grants. Grants are up by 5%, while other factors increased by 1-2%.

Gay Miller and Prasanta Khalita of the USC Academic Affairs Committee illustrated the intertwining of liberal arts and practical goals of university education, using examples from each university: featuring this year's SOFA-CONNECT project from FAA at UIUC; Interprofessional Education and Collaborative Practices at UIC; and noting that the student body of UIS Online comprises students from 84 counties in Illinois; from 46 states and 1 territory in the US, and 14 countries.

The USC presentation was followed by committee reports, consisting of the numbers of those proposals that passed.

Also mentioned were the following:

- There have been 2000 calls to the Ethics Office, which consists of five people.
- Some 2000 bills have been submitted to the General Assembly; although few will go anywhere, this still requires a major legislative effort on the University's part;
- The budget submitted by Governor Pritzker is relatively favorable to the University;
- April3 is UI Advocacy Day in Springfield;
- There were 1,061 FOIA requests of the University in 2018.
- The three universities have different costs for student health insurance; an analysis of why students opt out is necessary.
- 41 students have been accepted to next year's class at the Carle-Illinois College of Medicine, and the 1<sup>st</sup> year students there are doing well.

Six speakers asked to make public comments. (Because the speakers' names were only given orally, they may be incorrectly spelled in what follows.)

Michael Skibzky, sophomore in Business, proposed a mascot for UIUC. He argued that a mascot is a form of identity for students, and introduced "Champ" the doughboy: a stylized figure of a WW I soldier, carrying a victory flag. He argued that this is a unique, inoffensive mascot; the word is of the same length as "Chief" – and forms part of the name of the city of Champaign. ("Champ" was modeled, in full regalia, after the meeting.)

Richard Skibzky, father of Michael and a UIUC alumnus, spoke in favor of "Champ", saying that the campus needs a symbol.

Reelyn Faye, self-identifying as a veteran and a Native American, argued for the return of Chief Illiniwek, saying that the removal of Native American symbols is a denial of the heritage of Native Americans.

Ian Dozier spoke passionately about the need to give students the opportunity to form their own opinions. He argued that requiring freshmen to undergo "cultural sensitivity training" deprives them of the opportunity to learn and to form their own opinions. He stated that it is necessary to let all stakeholders have part in the discussion (without saying what the discussion is about), and that the system is broken and the faculty must be held accountable. Finally he noted that his jacket had been "ripped off" during the homecoming parade, and showed an orange patch (which he said was duct tape) on a blue jacket.

Janet Smith, a faculty member in Urban Planning at UIC, commented on the high cost of attending UIC, noting that even with tuition frozen, costs were going up because fees are increased. She asked the Board of Trustees to consider the full range of costs – fees as well as tuition – in identifying the cost of attending the university. Although she agrees that UIC needs new buildings, she is concerned about the assumption that continued increases in student enrollment will subsidize the costs of building, noting that this was not true for Roosevelt University. Moreover, students are asked to pay before the buildings are actually built: will they even derive benefits from them? Currently, tuition at UIC is approximately \$5300; however, fees are an additional \$2300 per semester. In addition, most departments charge a tuition "differential" because their costs are not covered by the standard tuition – this is an additional \$1,000 for undergraduate students, most of whom must pay it out of pocket; it rises as high as \$5,100 for graduate students in Public Health. She requests of the Board of Trustees that they make the actual cost of attending UIC visible.

Anna May Zhialo (The spelling of her name is very uncertain.) spoke in favor of fossil fuel divestment by the University. She pointed out that we are living in the Anthropocene Age, and that UI students understand the significance. The fossil fuel industry spends \$10 for every \$1 spent by environmental groups on discussions of climate change. Yale, Oxford, the City of New York, and Ireland have all divested from fossil fuels. UIUC students are strongly for divestments, voting for it 6:1 in 2013, and again in 2016, by 3:1. Climate change will affect all students: their generation will be universally affected. Meanwhile, the University is exhibiting cognitive dissonance between its beliefs and its actions in refusing to divest from fossil fuels.

After the public comments, votes were taken on actions passed out of committees. The meeting adjourned at approximately 11:45.
