#### EP.20.74 Report of Administrative Approvals through January 27, 2020

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on January 27, 2020. Additional information for each approval is attached.

#### A. Undergraduate Programs

- Journalism minor In the list of courses from which students are to select 6-7 hours, *remove* JOUR 421, Editing for Publication (3 hours) and *add* JOUR 220, News Editing (4 hours). JOUR 421 has not been offered for several semesters, whereas JOUR 220 is regularly taught and fits well with the minor. There is no change to the total number of hours required by the minor.
- 2) African Studies minor Update the list from which students are to select one course to remove HIST 110, History of Africa (3 hours), which has been discontinued effective Fall 2020, and replace it with HIST 111, History of Africa to 1800 (3 hours), and HIST 112, History of African from 1800 (3 hours). There is no change to the total number of hours required for the minor.
- 3) Political and Civic Leadership minor Replace PS 199, Undergraduate Open Seminar with PS 191, Topics in Civic Leadership (1-2 hours) as a course of which students are required to take at least two sections for at least 2 hours for the minor. Delete the footnote that referenced PS 199. There is no change to the total number of hours required for the minor.
- 4) Bachelor of Science in Human Development and Family Studies Remove major-specific Quantitative Reasoning II general education requirement, allowing any successfully-completed course from the campus-approved list to fulfill this requirement. This does not change the total number of hours required for the major.
- 5) Bachelor of Landscape Architecture Remove GEOG 103, Earth's Physical Systems (4 hours) as an option to fulfill the major's physical science general education requirement. This course is no longer offered. Editorial revision to remove duplicate "for the degree of..." statement in the program of study listing. Corrected total hours, which were summing to indicate a range, to reflect the actual minimum for the program, 124.
- 6) Leadership Studies minor The Agricultural Education Program was renamed the Agricultural Leadership, Education, and Communications Program effective for Fall, 2019. In parallel to this name change, the program established a new course subject, Organizational and Community Leadership (LEAD), and are converting courses that existed under the AGED course rubric to the LEAD rubric. This revision updates the Leadership Minor's Program of Study listing to reflect the LEAD rubric, replacing AGED 260 with LEAD 260, Foundations of Leadership (3 hours); AGED 380 with LEAD 380, Leadership in Groups and Teams (3 hours); AGED 480 with LEAD 480, Collaborative Leadership (3 hours); and AGED 340 with LEAD 340, Leadership Ethics & Society: Addressing Contemporary Challenges (3 hours).

Additionally, in the list of electives from which students are to choose 5-6 hours, remove ACE 293, Offcampus Internship (1-4 hours); and add ACES 298, International Experience, Leadership Experience to Rome section (3 hours); and remove SE 462, Leading Sustainable Change (3 hours), which has been discontinued. There is no change to the total number of hours required for the minor.

7) Agricultural, Consumer, and Environmental Sciences Minor – In the list of "Global Study in the Social Science Disciplines" courses from which students are to select a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 9 hours, remove EPS 426, Comparative Education (3 hours), as this course has been deactivated. Twenty-six courses remain as options in this list, and there is no change to the total number of hours required for the minor.

#### B. Graduate Programs

1) PhD in Human Development and Family Studies – Update the list of Substantive Courses from which students are to select four courses (8-16 hours) to remove HDFS 525, Family Interaction (4 hours) and WGGP 581, Gender Relations & Intl Dev (4 hours), and to add HDFS 529, Youth and Family Acculturation (2 hours); HDFS 541, Inequalities In A Diverse Society (4 hours); HDFS 561, Child and Family Program Dev (4 hours); HDFS 562, Child & Family Program Eval (4 hours); HDFS 595, Seminar (1-4 hours); and RST 586, Health and Leisure in Recreation, Sport and Tourism (4 hours). The revision is anticipated to alleviate students' issues with having a time-lag between when courses on this list are offered and when students need to take them. An email of support from the Department of Recreation, Sport and Tourism for the addition of RST 586 is included with the proposal. There are no changes to the total number of hours required for the degree.

### Program Description and Justification

Justification for proposal change:

The proposal contemplates two changes -- both related to changes in course offerings. The language related to PS 200 requires a change because that course is no longer offered and it no longer appears in the catalog. The change is to remove a reference in the minor to a course that no longer exists. The language change related to PS 191/PS 199 is to mark completion of a change noted in footnote 3: " PS 199 is a temporary designation. As these courses are developed and receive PS numbers, these new course numbers will take the place of PS 199." The new course number is PS 191. Justification for proposal change:

GEOL 103 has historically been one of three Natural Science & Tech Gen Ed courses that L.Arch students must pick from for 3 credit hours of the Natural Science & Tech Gen Ed category. The course is no longer offered by the university. With removing this course option, two other course options still exist (GEOG 103 and GEOL 100, 4 and 3 credit hours respectively). No other courses have been identified as an acceptable substitute for this grouping at this time. This change does not impact the number of credit hours required for the degree and students still have two course options to select from. The Bachelor of Landscape Architecture curriculum currently requires students to complete MATH 115 pre calculus under "Landscape Architecture Supporting Courses." In the past, trigonometry, transferred from an outside institution as MATH 114 trigonometry (previously offered at UIUC but not any longer) has also been accepted as a substitution for the MATH 115requirement.Both GEOG 103 and GEOL 100 have been offered fall, summer, and spring for The BLA Committee of the past few years so students have plenty of terms Department of Landscape Architecture would like to enroll request that, in either course for addition to MATH 115, STAT 100 or its equivalent be added as an option for BLA majors to complete this requirement. Other edits are administrative in nature. Committee discussion noted that trigonometry/pre calculus were much more central to the work of Landscape Architects in the past but technology has made this less the case today. In addition being familiar with statistics will allow future Landscape Architects to be consumers of research that will have an impact on their profession.
