Cangellaris replied that Chancellor Jones addressed this issue in his State of the University Address and that there is significant movement forward in responding to the needs of those at Illinois.

SP.19.14 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article III, Sections 3 and 5, and Article VI – Dean, Director, or Campus Librarian

BACKGROUND

Currently, the *Statutes* provide for the annual reappointment of college deans, but do not specify a process for the appointment of a new dean, as they do for the appointment of a new chancellor/vice president (Article I, Section 5). The appointment of a new dean should be treated as important as the annual reappointment, because a dean “is the agent of the college faculty for the execution of college educational policy” (*Statutes*, Article III, Section 3a).

Given the importance of this initial appointment, the Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends adding an additional layer of faculty participation in the process. On the appointment of a new dean, a committee selected by the faculty of the college would advise the chancellor/vice president as part of the selection process. This procedure would strengthen shared governance and would align with the current procedure for the appointment of a new chancellor/vice president, in which a committee is selected by the Senate to advise the president (*Statutes*, Article I, Section 5).

Similar to that procedure, this proposal does not specify the composition of the search committee or the search process, but instead provides an avenue for selected faculty from the college to participate in the Chancellor’s search process, which typically involves other interested parties.

These proposed changes would formalize the role of the faculty in the appointment of a new dean, provide transparency to avoid potential conflicts of interest, promote diverse representation, and strengthen shared governance in academic and research matters that directly affect faculty.

Additionally, parallel language has been proposed for Article III, Section 5, which governs schools and similar campus units, and to Article VI, which governs the Library.

RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Article III, Sections 3 and 5, and Article VI.

SP.20.19 Revision to the *Bylaws*, Part D.12 – Committee on General University Policy

BACKGROUND

Responding to the Report of the Eighth Senate Review Commission (XSR.19.01), the Senate Committee on General University Policy (GP) examined its charge and composition as provided by the *Bylaws*, Part D.12.

The proposed revisions more clearly define the committee’s scope, including responsibilities referred to GP by the Senate, and codify GP’s role of monitoring background checks, multi-year contracts, and the Faculty Policy Guide.

GP recommends the addition of another faculty member to its membership to avoid voting ties. GP further recommends the addition of the Senior Associate Chancellor for Human Resources or the Senior Associate Chancellor’s designee as an *ex officio* member to help clarify the consequences of policy changes for human resources procedures.

RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends the approval of the following revisions to the *Bylaws*. Text to be deleted is ~~struck through~~ and text to be added is underlined. Adoption of amendments to the *Bylaws* requires a two-thirds vote of the Senate.

RS.20.02 Resolution on Sexual Harassment Reporting

WHEREAS, recent media reports have identified eight members of the faculty and staff on the Urbana-Champaign campus who have been identified as being subject to sexual harassment or assault complaints in recent years not including those who have been accused but the allegations have not been disclosed;

WHEREAS, the Report from the Committee on Faculty Sexual Misconduct stated that only 3.4% of victims of faculty sexual misconduct come forward, in part, out of fears of retaliation;

WHEREAS, NPR Illinois, currently part of the University of Illinois at Springfield, is a journalistic enterprise that has done recent work in bringing many of these sexual harassment and assault cases to light;

WHEREAS, the University of Illinois responded to NPR Illinois reporting by instructing all journalists they were mandatory reporters who had to disclose all conversations with victims to University authorities pursuant to institutional and system policies;

WHEREAS, the federal law known as "Title IX" provides discretion to the University on who is and who is not a "mandatory reporter" (termed "responsible employee" in the law);

WHEREAS, by designating reporters associated with the University as "mandatory reporters" has had, if not by intent than by effect, a "chilling effect" on victims and yet another incentive to not only not report, but not to publicly disclose their experiences; and

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the Senate, in the interest of faculty sexual harassment and assault survivors, formally requests the Chancellor of the Urbana-Champaign and the President of the University of Illinois System to:

1. Explore changing to definition of "responsible employee" to explicitly exclude all journalists associated with the University or any of its campuses;
2. To establish a committee at the campus and system levels to review the mandatory reporter policy in a victim-centric way to both protect the rights of victims to be heard and to tell their stories as they see fit.

- 3) **BS in Elementary Education** – clarify the general education requirements table in the Program of Study listing to reflect students may fulfill the Quantitative Reasoning II requirement by taking a second course from the campus-approved Quantitative Reasoning I list or through completion of a course on the campus-approved Quantitative Reasoning II list. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 4) **BS in Middle Grades Education** -- clarify the general education requirements table in the Program of Study listing to reflect students may fulfill the Quantitative Reasoning II requirement by taking a second course from the campus-approved Quantitative Reasoning I list or through completion of a course on the campus-approved Quantitative Reasoning II list. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 5) **BFA in Art and Art History** – clarify elective lists and specific area requirements to add full listing of approved courses to fulfill requirements. There is no change to any of these actual requirements, this is an effort to make the Academic Catalog Program of Study Listing more transparent.
