MAAE Proposal

PROPOSAL TITLE: Establish a Master of Agricultural and Applied Economics degree with a major in Agricultural and Applied Economics in the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics, College of Agricultural, Consumer, and Environmental Sciences, and create a joint program with that new program and the existing Bachelor of Science with a major in Agricultural and Consumer Economics.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION:

The Department of ACE requests the establishment of a Master of Agricultural and Applied Economics degree with a major in Agricultural and Applied Economics. The new degree program would require a total of 32 credit hours at the graduate level. This new degree will be available as part of the joint degree detailed below, to current undergraduates in our department and as a stand-alone master's degree.

The Department of ACE also requests establishment of a combined BS and Masters program, linking this new program with the existing BS in Agricultural and Consumer Economics. The BS component would require a minimum of 126 hours, consistent with current undergraduate program requirements, while the Masters component would require an additional 26 hours for a minimum of 152 total credit hours for the combined degrees, with six hours of upper level undergraduate work being completed jointly and also count toward the 32 hours needed for the Masters degree. Students in the combined program would complete requirements for both degrees with fewer credit requirements, allowing them to receive both degrees in 5 years (10 semesters) rather than the typical 6 years (12 semesters) for both degrees independently.

JUSTIFICATION:

This proposal would create a non-thesis Masters degree that would allow students to receive a BS and non-thesis Masters degree in Agricultural and Consumer Economics over a 5 year period. This program is targeted at students interested in obtaining graduate training to work in the food and agribusiness sector.

Thus, the combined program would create a very attractive option for current and future ACE undergraduate students which would help us to recruit highly talented students for our undergraduate program, and retain those students for their graduate work. Combined program students complete a standard BS degree in ACE and also complete the proposed non-thesis master's degree which focuses their study on the concepts and analytical techniques used by

analysts and managers in industries, governments, and other organizations through the applied focus option.

Application Process

Application deadlines will follow those used for the existing MS and PhD programs – February 15th for admission beginning the following summer or fall term, and October 15th for the following spring term. Application requirements will follow those of current MS program applicants, with one exception – official GRE scores will be encouraged, but optional for MAAE applications to be considered complete. Combined BS/MAAE program applicants will need to have achieved junior standing by the end of the term in which they apply.

Enrollment Estimates

Initial enrollment in the MAAE program is expected to be 5 to 8 students per year for the first two years. Over time, ACE will be targeting an MAAE cohort size of 10 to 12 students per year. This target is similar to the cohort size in the existing MS program in ACE.

Teaching Capacity

MAAE program students would be taking many of the same existing graduate courses offered by the ACE department. For required and elective/field courses, capacity exists for the targeted cohort size. Specifically, the required courses enrollment has averaged 12 (ACE 500) and 20 (ACE 562/564) with capacity for 25 (ACE 500) and 35 (ACE 562/564) in their current classroom locations. For elective courses, sufficient capacity also exists, and having the additional students in each MAAE cohort will actually help to justify more regular offerings of these courses, benefiting both the MAAE students as well as existing ACE MS and PhD program students.

Increasing cohort sizes and enrollment levels for the required courses in the current MS and proposed MAAE is also desirable from a pedagogical perspective. The students in our graduate programs work closely together both inside and outside of the class room, creating a support network to assist students in successfully completing the requirements of the programs. Additional students will bring a more diverse set of backgrounds and experiences, enriching the graduate experience for the entire group.

Advising

Students will be assigned an academic advisor who is a member of the ACE faculty specializing in the student's stated area of interest. MAAE students' course plan for their specialization will be approved by their academic advisor and the Director of Graduate Studies. Academic advisors will serve as the advisor for the professional or research internship experience, completed using the existing ACE 592 Graduate Internship Experience or ACE 591 Independent Study rubrics. Since MAAE students will not write a thesis, no research advisor will be needed.

BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:

The MAAE degree would be a self-supporting program. All students in the degree program would pay tuition. Note, the ACE department has requested a tuition differential of \$1,000 per semester (\$2,000 per academic year) for this program. This is similar to the current differential paid by ACE undergraduates (\$1,630 per academic year), and the same as a comparable

program offered on campus (e.g., the MSPE degree program offered by ECON). This is also reflective of the additional faculty advising and staff resources that will be allocated to the students in this program, which will be similar to existing ACE undergraduate program students.

The proposed curriculum can be fully serviced with existing ACE courses which have capacity for increased enrollment. No new combined program specific courses are being proposed at this time.

Courses currently offered by ACE are sufficient to satisfy proposed program requirements, and capacity in these courses exists to accommodate the additional students this program offering is anticipated to generate. Thus, no new courses or additional sections of existing courses would be needed at this time, thus the impact on faculty teaching loads is expected to be minimal. Faculty will be providing advising services associated with the internship requirement for students in the MAAE program. We are requesting a tuition differential to reflect these additional advising services.

The proposed MAAE degree programs provide students with the opportunity to obtain a non-thesis master's degree. The graduate-level training in economic theory and applications will provide students with the knowledge and skills to help them advance more quickly into careers in the food and agribusiness industry. With the combined BS/MAAE program, students will receive this graduate training in addition to their bachelor's degree in a shorter time and with greater focus on specific skill development in microeconomic theory and quantitative methods.

The program is highly consistent with the University's mission of enhancing the lives of citizens in Illinois, across the nation, and around the world through our leadership in learning, discovery, engagement and economic development. It touches on nearly all of the campus's strategic focus areas, including data science, food security, globalization, public engagement, social and behavioral sciences, energy and sustainability, and undergraduate education.

4) Please provide an analysis of the market demand for this degree program. What market indicators are driving this proposal? What type of employment outlook should these graduates expect? What resources will be provided to assist students with job placement?

The MAAE degree program will tap unmet demand for graduate level training and technical skills in applied economics/agribusiness among students who wish to differentiate themselves from similar types of non-thesis Masters programs.

Evidence about potential student demand for this program comes from a survey of ACE undergraduates conducted in April/May 2017, which generated 150 usable responses (23% response rate). Over 60% of respondents indicated that they were "somewhat" or "very likely" to earn either a Masters or MBA degree, with a similar number indicating that they would be "very" or "extremely interested" in the possibility of earning a 4+1 BS/Masters from the Department of ACE. When asked whether the possibility of earning a BS/Masters in 5 years would have made ACE a more attractive major, 46% responded "Yes, it would probably have made ACE look more attractive," and an additional 32.0% responded "Absolutely yes, it would definitely have made ACE a more attractive major."

Similar demand from the employer side has been provided via feedback from the ACE departmental advisory committee over the past 5 years. This advisory committee is made up of professionals working in the food and agribusiness sectors. Recent comments from committee members include:

- "Industry people need masters level qualifications and training to advance in their careers."
- "People in product manager roles in companies such as Kraft, Hershey's, Kellogg's need to know more about ag econ & not just management need to understand commodity price swings"
- "Smaller companies in the food space are often run by food scientists who need more business training"

Our current Master of Science program (which requires a thesis) typically admits students who do not have econ/ag econ undergraduate backgrounds and/or students who have been out of school and in the workforce for a number of years. Specifically, the MS cohort we admitted for fall 18 includes students with political science and math backgrounds as well as an international student with a business degree who has been working for a large bank for a number of years. We assess their capabilities based on their application material, a "math camp" we hold for students in August prior to the beginning of the semester, and a placement test at the end of that camp. Based on all of those things, we recommend in some cases that students brush up on math (usually calculus) and/or intermediate (undergrad) microeconomics, if necessary, to make sure they are prepared for our coursework. This, and our criteria for admissions, would not change for students admitted to the new MAAE.

Finally, there are a number of examples of peer programs in agricultural and applied economics which are already offering similar types of programs. These include Purdue (Professional MS in International Agribusiness and Dual MS-MBA programs), Oklahoma State (Master of Agriculture), and Kansas State (Master of Agribusiness).

The proposed MAAE program will be self-supported by student tuition. Graduate College and Board of Trustees tuition and fee waivers will not be made available.

Master of Agricultural and Applied Economics

The MAAE degree is a course-based program that provides students with training in economic theory along with the quantitative skills needed to pursue careers as analysts and managers in industry, government, and related organizations. Available course offerings cover a broad range of potential specialization areas within agricultural and applied economics to suit student interests. Course plans for specialization must be approved by the student's academic advisor and the Director of Graduate Studies.

Students must earn a 3.0 (A = 4.0) GPA for a minimum of 32 graduate hours of credit.

The MAAE program includes a combined BS/MAAE option for ACE undergraduates. Combined program students must meet all requirements for their BS degree in ACE, and take an additional 26 hours of graduate credit to earn the MAAE degree. Six hours of upper-level electives will count jointly for both degrees. As a combined program, students will receive both degrees at the completion of both programs.

Justification

1. The proposed program to offer a Master of Agricultural and Applied Economics (MAAE) degree in the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics (ACE) creates more flexibility for students seeking graduate training in this area. The proposed program replaces the existing MS program's thesis requirement with additional advanced coursework in quantitative methods and the student's desired area of specialization, and a professional or research internship experience. The combined BS/MAAE options allows current ACE undergraduate students to pursue graduate study and earn both a BS and Master degree in fewer semesters than doing both programs separately.

Students pursuing the MAAE degree will be required to complete this additional coursework in the same or fewer semesters than existing MS program students, and therefore not have the time to devote to any type of graduate assistantship duties. Therefore, ACE is requesting self-supporting status for the MAAE degree program.

- a) Self-supporting classification will allow the ACE department to offer graduate training at the Masters level in agricultural and applied economics without the need for additional financial resources to support those degree program students. This may limit the pool of applicants to the program to those who can afford the associated costs.
- b) The request for self-supporting classification will not negatively impact academic quality of the proposed or existing graduate programs. Rather, the MAAE degree program will create a larger number of graduate students in ACE. This will help to justify more regular offerings of graduate courses, enriching the experience of students in the ACE graduate programs. This can only be achieved with self-supporting status, as it will avoid stretching already limited resources for the funding of graduate students in the existing MS and PhD programs.
- Request for self-supporting status implies that MAAE program students will be required to pay
 the associated tuition and fees. This will make the program less affordable for students
 compared with a traditional, waiver-generating program. No financial aid, from departmental
 sources, will be made available to applicants.
- 3. The self-supporting classification of the program, along with the implications for students, will be made available on all application and program promotion materials. A statement will also be provided in offer letters of admission to applicants.

I believe the information below addresses your requests. Please let me know if you need anything more, or have additional questions.

- 1. All MAAE program students are assigned a faculty member as an advisor/mentor, similar to our current system for undergraduates (we have a professional academic advising team and the Director of Graduate Studies (DGS) that would provide academic advising/course planning services, etc).
- 2. If the student chooses to fulfill the internship requirement using a research internship, it would be advised by the student's faculty advisor/mentor and credit would be earned under ACE 591 (graduate independent study). For the independent study, students will be required to demonstrate evidence of scholarly effort by completing a written report on a topic proposed by the student and approved by the faculty advisor and the Director of Graduate Studies. Incorporation of quantitative analysis in the work is strongly encouraged.
- 3. For students who choose to satisfy their internship requirement with a professional internship, our advising team could assist, along with the faculty advisor and effort from the student, in helping match with organizations (likely targets would be "local" companies in the research park, Farm Credit Illinois in Mahomet, as well as the multitude of less-local agribusinesses with which current ACE students find internships, etc.). In those cases, the student would receive credit for this under ACE 592 GIE (our designated graduate internship credit rubric). Similar to how ACE undergraduate students earn internship credit, MAAE program students would be expected to provide a written report outlining their internship experience and at least one specific project upon which they worked during the internship.

For students pursuing the MAAE degree via the combined BS/MAAE path, we'd expect students to complete the internship requirement during the summer between years 4 and 5, or the summer following year 5. For students pursuing the MAAE degree from an undergraduate program outside of ACE, internship requirement would be satisfied the summer following year 1 in the program.

Marty,

In our correspondence below from last year, I mentioned new course offerings and curriculum changes that would impact Econ. Specifically, those are:

- 1. Offering a new ACE 300 (Intermediate Applied Micro) which, for ACE majors, would replace the ECON 302 requirement. In earlier correspondence, we agreed that any student taking a minor in ECON would still be required to take ECON 302.
- 2. Offering two new courses ACE 262 and ACE 264 (Appl Stat Mthds & Data Anlytcs 1 and 2) each 3hr classes, which, jointly, would replace the existing ACE 261 (Applied Stat Methods 4hr) requirement for most ACE majors. For students with concentrations in Ag. Accounting and Finance in Agribusiness (about 20% of ACE majors) these new courses would replace the ECON 202/203 requirement.

In spring and fall 2019, these courses were offered with a seminar course number (ACE 398). We would now like to obtain approval for permanent course numbers.
