MINUTES

I. CALL TO ORDER & WELCOME

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Senate was called to order at 3:10 pm with Chancellor Robert Jones presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

Chancellor Jones thanked the Senate and Senate Executive Committee (SEC) for their participation in shared governance over the past academic year and summer. Jones looks forward to working with the Senate through shared governance again this academic year. Jones congratulated all those newly elected senators and thanked those returning for another academic year.

Chancellor Jones turned the chairmanship of the meeting over to Senate Executive Committee Chair Rob Kar.

II. 2019-2020 SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHAIR'S REMARKS

Professor Rob Kar (LAW), a faculty senator and Chair of the SEC, introduced himself and noted that most of this meeting will be dedicated to voting on our committee members for next year.

It is important for senators to understand that the Senate is one branch of a larger institution. Our executive branch would be the Offices of the Provost, Chancellor and President. Similar to the government, the Senate has certain areas of statutory responsibility. The will of the Senate on areas of academic policy will pretty much be final. There are other areas such as budget and personnel where the Senate advises the administration on related issues and the administration has the ultimate power to decide the outcome. The Senate also serves as a voice on major campus concerns. Kar noted that if interested, the *University of Illinois Statutes* are available online. Kar felt that was important to distinguish formal powers that the Senate has under the *Statutes* from informal relationships of trust. Senators should also note that even with formal powers, it often requires additional input or approval by other members of the University and System.

Kar mentioned that there is an Unofficial Guide to Responsibilities of being a Senator on the Senate website that is helpful for new senators and a good reminder for continuing senators.

III. BASIC PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

Friedman introduced himself as one of three parliamentarians; Jeffrey Stein and Brian Gaines also serve as parliamentarians when needed. Friedman reviewed basic

parliamentary procedure and directed senators to the quick guide available on the Senate website.

IV. PROPOSALS

On behalf of the Senate Committee on Committees (CC), Chair Span presented Robin Kar as the nominee for SEC Chair. There were no floor nominations and nominations were declared closed.

05/04/20-02 Through the online voting system, Poll Everywhere, Kar was declared as the 2020-2021 SEC Chair with 140 in favor, 1 opposed, and 9 abstentions.

05/04/20-03 CC.21.03* Election of the Senate Executive Committee (SEC) Vice-Chair

On behalf of CC, Chair Span presented John Dallesasse as the nominee for SEC Vice-Chair. There were no floor nominations and nominations were declared closed.

05/04/20-04 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, Dallesasse was declared as the 2020-2021 SEC Vice-Chair with 153 in favor, 0 opposed, and 10 abstentions.

MINUTES

I. CALL TO ORDER

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Senate was called to order at 3:10 pm with Senate Executive Committee Chair Rob Kar presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

II. SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHAIR'S REMARKS

Professor Rob Kar (LAW), a faculty senator and Chair of the Senate Executive Committee (SEC), thanked everyone for their contributions this year and for the dedication to participating in shared governance.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

08/10/20-01

Without objection, the minutes of the July 13, 2020 meeting were approved as distributed.

IV. PUBLIC COMMENT

Musa Muhammad (graduate student) spoke against holding any in-person instruction in the fall.

V. CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS

Andreas Cangellaris, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Provost gave remarks in the Chancellor's absence. Provost Cangellaris thanked senators for meeting one more time before the fall semester begins. Cangellaris also thanked SEC Chair Rob Kar and SEC Vice-Chair John Dallesasse along with all SEC members for their commitment and effort in responding to time-sensitive issues over the summer related to COVID-19.

All responses to COVID-19 have been made with the safety and well-being of all members of the campus and broader community in mind. Illinois is working with State and local officials' guidance, CDC (Center for Disease Control and Prevention) recommended practices, and the Governor's Restore Illinois plan. Rapid saliva testing, modeling, and contact tracing developed by Illinois researchers are being used to mitigate the virus. We have not allowed urgency to bypass broad consultation across campus and across other universities. The Senate has remained informed through the SEC. Chancellor Jones and/or Provost Cangellaris attended almost all of the numerous SEC and Senate meetings over the summer. Often, additional senior leadership subject matter experts and COVID working team leaders joined the SEC and Senate meetings.

Provost Cangellaris expressed excitement over the opportunity to have some in-person instruction safely this fall. Again, local and state officials have collaborated with the University to safely return to the hybrid in-person instruction. The COVID-19 website

has been updated and is the best place to find information about what our campus is doing in response to the virus. <https://covid19.illinois.edu/>

The chance to come back together again in some way is very important. Remaining together over the semester requires a commitment from all of us. The modeling from data is critical for planning this fall. We stress the importance of testing at scale, expedient tracing, and effective isolation and quarantine protocols for getting the pandemic under control. Testing at scale is made possible by the rapid saliva testing that was developed here at Illinois. We are working to offer this innovative saliva test with rapid turnaround time to not only the greater Urbana-Champaign community, but also to the state and globally. We are working with the Champaign-Urbana Public Health District (CUPHD) on fast and effective contact tracing.

We do not have all the answers, but we are working hard to mitigate the pandemic until an effective medical solution, such as vaccine, can be developed. We can all do our part by wearing face coverings, washing hands, practicing social distancing, avoiding crowded congregations in indoor spaces, following testing protocols, being responsive to information provided by CUPHD and healthcare providers following testing, and most important, being patient, understanding, and kind. Thank you to everyone doing your part.

VI. QUESTIONS FOR THE CHANCELLOR

Faculty senator Belmont (LAS) asked about the recent News-Gazette article what led to the decision to test twice a week. Cangellaris replied that the COVID-19 briefing on modeling gives a very detailed rationale that led to the decision to require testing twice a week. This briefing should be online soon. The modeling took into consideration many factors coming together. The most important thing is to practice all of the safety measures together, including face coverings, social distancing, hand washing, rapid saliva testing twice a week, and following up with CUPHD if infected, to mitigate the spread of the virus.

Faculty senator Tolliver (LAS) asked what will happen to the testing sites that are outdoor tents when the weather turns cold; will there be additional indoor testing sites? Brian Brauer reported that heating units are available for the outdoor tents that house the testing sites.

Faculty senator Michael (BUS) asked about the decision to not hold classes on the first Tuesday in November. Cangellaris noted that this is the first time the State of Illinois has established Election Day, the first Tuesday in November, as a State holiday. The revision to the Academic Calendar will be a proposal from the Senate Committee on Educational Policy (EP).

Faculty senator Paik (LAS) inquired about the privacy concerns around the Safer Illinois app requiring location data for the exposure notifications to work. Does reopening

safely depend on a critical mass of users downloading and using this app? Cangellaris asked Paik to wait for the COVID Briefing where Bill Sullivan discusses the app and privacy concerns. Use of the app is not mandatory. The University has been working diligently with CUPHD to make sure they have enough contact tracers so they can support our campus population in addition to the contact tracers they have for the broader Urbana-Champaign community. There are alternatives to the app.

In response to a follow-up question, Cangellaris stated that contact tracing is most effective when CUPHD can contact any individual that was within eight feet for 15 minutes or more of a person that tested positive. This data is very useful because a person might not realize they were within eight feet for more than 15 minutes of an unknown individual that tested positive.

VII. PROPOSALS

08/10/20-02 RS.20.07* Resolution Concerning the University's Protection of and Accountability for Campus and Community Health

Faculty senator Bruce Rosenstock introduced and moved approval of resolution RS.20.07. The motion was seconded, and discussion followed.

Several faculty senators spoke against the resolution for reasons including loss of revenue, increased liability to the University, an increase in the already large budget shortfall, the importance of the on campus educational experience, and that a large amount of effort and expertise has gone into the return to in-person instruction.

Several other faculty senators spoke in favor of the resolution for reasons including that profit should not be put before people, the University should be liable for death and illness when related to in-person instruction, tuition reduction would incentivize students to stay at home, and students will find it difficult to comply with safety guidelines which will increase the risk of spreading the virus.

08/10/20-03 Tolliver made a motion to close debate. The motion was seconded and approved without objection.

08/10/20-04 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, resolution RS.20.07 failed with 37 in favor, 69 opposed, and 5 abstentions.

08/10/20-05 Faculty senator Jenkins (FAA) made a motion to extend the meeting until 6:00 pm. The motion was seconded.

08/10/20-06 By show of virtual hands, the motion to extend the meeting until 6:00 pm was approved with 68 in favor, 6 opposed, and 6 abstentions. A quorum was still present although the vote total did not equal 100 or more.

08/10/20-07 EQ.20.04* Resolution on University Response to Racism

On behalf of the Senate Committee on Equal Opportunity and Inclusion, Chair Pionke introduced and moved approval of resolution EQ.20.04. Pionke noted that the Senate Committee on University Student Life (SL) and the SEC are co-sponsors of this resolution. Discussion followed.

Alam (LAW), faculty senator and SL Chair, spoke in support of the resolution and reiterated that this resolution also supports the Call to Action recently issued by the Vice Chancellor for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

08/10/20-08 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, resolution EQ.20.04 was approved with 88 in favor, 3 opposed, and 3 abstentions. A quorum was still present although the vote total did not equal 100 or more.

VIII. TITLE IX REGULATION SUMMER IMPLEMENTATION –SENATE INPUT

Danielle Morrison, Title IX Coordinator

Nizam Arain, Associate Vice Chancellor for Compliance

Arain's role is new to campus and he is responsible for the Office of Access and Equity (OAE). One of OAE's functions is to investigate allegations of sexual misconduct against faculty and staff. Morrison and Arain both report to the Vice Chancellor for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, Sean Garrick. Morrison and Arain collaborate with each other and the Office of Student Conflict Resolution (OSCR) which handles investigations of student allegations.

Morrison reported that the new Title IX regulations were issued May 6 and are in effect and enforceable as of August 14. There is a significant list of new requirements including the adoption of new policies and processes. A sexual misconduct policy was created to balance the new requirements with state laws along with other federal law and in addition to our own campus values and commitment to providing a safe and welcoming environment. Included in those required changes were definitions for Title IX sexual harassment and an end of life hearing component with cross examination using advisors for all student and employee cases that fall within Title IX.

After the significant work of the Faculty Sexual Misconduct Committee, there was a desire to adopt their broader definition of unwelcome sexual, sex, or gender-based misconduct. There will be one sexual misconduct policy, but there will be two tracks. One track for Title IX and one for other prohibited sexual misconduct with accompanying process documents both from the OAE when it is an employee respondent and OSCR when it is a student respondent.

Sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking will count under Title IX as well as our other prohibited sexual misconduct depending on whether it falls within a Title IX jurisdiction. Title IX limited it to incidents that occur within the United States and are tied to the educational program or activity, but the University of Illinois policy has a broader jurisdiction.

There is also a definition of sexual harassment that is consistent with Title VII. The Title IX definition required that we switch from a severe or pervasive standard to severe and pervasive to define sexual harassment. Under the broader category of prohibited sexual misconduct, there is a sexual exploitation policy and an unwelcome sex or gender-based conduct.

Arain discussed some of the procedural changes. The new regulations require a hearing for students and employees to determine the question of whether that individual violated our sexual misconduct policy. The process OAE conducts will yield a finding of responsibility or not. The sanctioning process unfolds from that and is not in the exclusive purview of OAE. In cases involving tenured faculty where dismissal is being sought by the University, the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure (AF) will continue to own the responsibility for making that determination. That is separate from the underlying finding of whether sexual misconduct took place. For other sanctions, current processes will continue to be used.

In response to a question, Arain stated that the mandate of his office is to go beyond compliance and look at the wholistic effect of practices on all students and employees. The Office of University Counsel is consulted, but they do not necessarily have every answer or can resolve every dilemma.

The OAE hearing process will involve a three-person hearing panel with members chosen from a pool of trained employees across campus with a robust process for vetting for conflicts of interest. OSCR also has a process to address conflicts of interest.

IX. SAFER IN ILLINOIS APP PRESENTATION

Bill Sullivan; Professor of Landscape Architecture and member of the SHIELD: Target, Test, Tell COVID-19 Team

Sullivan discussed the Safer in Illinois app that was built on the Rokwire platform. The app can be used to report symptoms, automatically receive test results from McKinley, and exposure notifications. A privacy first approach has been taken with the app. Users can select the level of privacy with which they are comfortable. Once the app is downloaded, the user is asked for consent to participate in exposure notifications and consent to have test results from McKinley sent to the app. If the user opts into exposure notifications, the next screen states you must turn on location services. Location services must be turned on to use the low-energy Bluetooth signal. Location data is not collected, nor geo-location data. No location data is stored, and no location

data leaves a person's phone from this app. Sullivan went step-by-step through an example of how the exposure notification process works.

Sullivan responded to a question about student access to smartphones stating that of faculty, staff, and students, the group least likely to have a smartphone is staff. Chief Information Officer Greg Gulick's proposal was recently approved to fund the purchase of 3,400 smartphones to loan out to people for the entire academic year who do not have phones or whose phones are not up to date enough to run the app. Over 1,000 of the phones have arrived and the remaining 2,400 will arrive soon. Most of those phones will be loaned to staff members who will be working on campus.

Sullivan also noted that the app was reviewed by individuals outside of the group that created the app. The NIST 171 report is being reviewed. (NIST 171 is a codification of the requirements that any non-Federal computer system must follow to store, process, or transmit Controlled Unclassified Information (CUI) or provide security protection for such systems.) University Legal Counsel has hired outside counsel to review the app. Regulations like HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act), FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act), COPPA (Children's Online Privacy Protection Rule), CCPA (California Consumer Privacy Act), and PIPA (Personal Information Protection Act) have all been considered during the review process.

In response to privacy and data collection concerns Sullivan responded that the privacy statement has been updated since the Illinois app has been completely separated from anything COVID related and the Safer in Illinois app. There is almost no data that is stored in the cloud. The Bluetooth tokens are only held for 15 days. McKinley has a record of people's test results in their secure system.

Rokmetro is an entity outside of the University. The University has no financial relationship with Rokmetro. There is an agree between the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research and Innovation because Rokmetro is part of the Research Park.

Sullivan answered additional questions about the app and app notifications. The frequency of notifications will be reduced with the update to the app. Also, once the presentation is made to the State of Illinois for possible use of the app state-wide, Sullivan is hopeful that the State of Illinois will assist discussions with Google and Apple to use their technology that is built into the operating systems that will lengthen the battery life and produce fewer notifications.

Sullivan also noted that the app code will be open and available on August 15.

X. WELLNESS SUPPORT ASSOCIATES PRESENTATION

Brian Brauer; COVID-19 Executive Steering Committee Member; Associate Director, Fire Service Institute

Brauer was tasked with putting together a program that will ensure the people entering our buildings are in compliance with their testing and wearing a face covering. If you have best in class testing, you have to have a compliance mechanism or that best in class testing goes to waste.

The Wellness Support Associates (WSAs) are extra help hourly employees that are hired from our community. WSAs will be at the doors to buildings that have classrooms. They may not be at every building every day. Some days there will be roving teams and other days they will be at specific buildings. All individuals that have access to the saliva testing will be expected to be in compliance in order to enter a building. The options for building entry are showing your building access status through the Safer in Illinois app, the electronic boarding pass, paper boarding pass, or UIN look-up.

This process is not a perfect system. Some people will enter the building without their app or boarding pass being checked. WSAs are not police or security officers. If someone is out of compliance with testing requirements or face covering requirements, it is a disciplinary matter. The Office of Student Affairs will handle students and Illinois Human Resources will handle employees.

There are also student Wellness Ambassadors. These are students that help will peer education, information sharing, and distributing of supplies.

The Senate indicated that some type of compliance mechanism was needed and the WSA program was developed to provide a compliance mechanism. Students living in the area are required to test twice a week, not just students attending classes in-person. If a student is out of compliance, they will be reported to the Office of Student Conflict Resolution (OSCR). The WSA positions are no-contact positions so there should be no physical contact between the WSAs and the person whose building status is being checked.

An Unofficial Guide to
Responsibilities of Being a Senator

The Senate is the duly elected representative group of faculty, students, and academic professionals on campus. It brings these groups together under the umbrella of shared governance and responsibility for maintaining open lines of communication between these constituencies and the campus administration. The work of the Senate helps shape key policies, processes, and decisions of importance to our campus, community, state, nation, and world.

The Senate and its committees are the central locus for the work of shared governance at the campus level. The Senate has special authority over legislative matters relating to academic policies affecting this campus or the University of Illinois System as a whole.¹ Still, most Senate actions require approval from other actors within the university and system prior to implementation. Even when Senate input is not required, many non-academic policy matters can benefit from consultation and coordination with the Senate. The Senate is, accordingly, most effective when it maintains healthy and productive relationships with other actors within the university and system and can play an active and trusted role when addressing key policy questions. That is what shared governance entails.

Without your responsible participation, the Senate cannot be effective at meeting its goals.² Here are ten key areas of responsibility that are critical for your effectiveness as a senator.

- 1. Attend Meetings Regularly.** As your unit's elected representative to the Senate, you are responsible for keeping in regular contact with your unit about Senate business and helping the Senate act on its agenda in each session. Many Senate actions require a quorum. Losing quorum can require the Senate to postpone time-sensitive matters and may require scheduling additional Senate meetings during the term. You are therefore expected to attend Senate meetings regularly and to plan to remain for the full length

of each meeting (which is regularly scheduled to last until 5:15 pm but may sometimes end earlier).

If you have a regularly scheduled conflict with Senate meetings or must regularly leave early, it is best to resign your seat and let your unit know so that it can promptly elect another representative who will be available to help conduct Senate business. If you must miss an occasional meeting or leave early on occasion, notify the Senate Clerk, Jenny Roether (senate@illinois.edu), prior to your absence so that the Senate can prepare to manage quorum.³

- 2. Be Prepared to Discuss and Vote.** Prior to each Senate meeting, you should review the materials on the agenda, especially those on the Action Agenda. These materials will be distributed in the week prior to the meeting. You should be ready to vote on any action items and participate in any discussions or motions relating to them. As a senator, you have the right to speak candidly for or against any item being considered, to make motions to amend from the floor, and to vote your conscience. Individual votes are taken publicly and become part of the Senate record.

You should also familiarize yourself with the [University of Illinois Statutes](#), the [General Rules Concerning University Organization and Procedure](#), the [Senate Constitution](#), [Senate Bylaws](#), and [Senate Standing Rules](#). The former two documents are system-wide documents that constitute the Senate, describe its statutory powers, responsibilities, and relations to other offices, and set forth the procedures by which the Senate operates. The latter documents concern internal rules of the Urbana Senate. Due to jurisdictional considerations, Senate actions and policies are only valid to the extent that they are consistent with these governing documents. Some of the most important and enduring actions the Senate can take involve proposed modifications to these governing documents. (Think of amendments to the U.S. Constitution.)

- 3. Try to Address Complex Issues in Advance.** If you have questions or concerns about an action item that might be addressed prior to a Senate meeting, you should consider contacting the sponsor (usually a committee chair or senator) before the Senate meeting. Although it is not uncommon for the Senate to vote for some amendments on proposals from the floor, it is usually inefficient to try to wordsmith complex documents before the full Senate without sufficient advance thought and preparation. Sometimes concerns can be addressed by suggesting revisions or amendments in advance and by obtaining a sponsor's agreement, which can greatly facilitate an amendment process proposed on the Senate floor.

³ Because your colleagues in your academic unit deserve to be represented in the Senate, if you miss two consecutive meetings without notifying the Senate Clerk in advance, it will be presumed that you have resigned from the Senate ([Senate Bylaws A.12](#)).

- 4. Learn How to Make Your Voice Effective.** As a senator, you may bring any issue of concern to the Senate Executive Committee or to a Senate committee that is charged with a particular issue. You may also propose action items to be placed directly on the Senate Agenda. When considering whether to pursue that latter option, it is wise to consult with the Senate Executive Committee, whose members may have advice that can help you produce proposals that will yield a productive Senate debate and vote. Most action items on the agenda are drafted and sponsored by a Senate committee, and it will often be worthwhile to address your concerns to the committee that has information and expertise on that particular issue. The members of the Senate Executive Committee may also know of related campus efforts or committee proceedings that are relevant to your concerns. They may be able to suggest particular stakeholders that would be worth consulting before bringing your item forward.

Given the number of stakeholders that are typically interested in Senate actions, unvetted proposals are usually not the most effective way of producing a desired outcome. The full Senate will typically take action items much more seriously if they have been vetted or even sponsored by a Senate committee or the Senate Executive Committee.

- 5. Volunteer for Committees to Ensure Your Voice Has Impact.** You should consider volunteering for Senate committees. Almost all of the Senate's most important work begins in committees, and committees are where the most extensive and detailed attention can be given to complex matters. Committees typically have special institutional information and experience related to their subject matters. Your contributions are likely to have a greater impact if you work on a committee that is charged with subject matters of interest to you than if you only raise or debate proposals from the Senate floor. When considering insufficiently vetted proposals from individual senators, the Senate Executive Committee or the Senate as a whole will, in fact, often refer the item to a relevant committee before bringing the item back to the full Senate floor.
- 6. Think Broadly, Even While Representing Your Unit.** The Senate is a representative democracy, not a direct democracy. As a member of a representative body, you should become informed about the issues, talk with colleagues both inside and outside of your unit, and in the end follow your conscience in judging what actions are best for your unit, the university, and the system. While you are elected to be an informed representative of your unit, you are not required to submit items for a local referendum.
- 7. Communicate Regularly with Your Unit.** Regardless of how you vote, you should keep your unit informed about actions the Senate is considering or taking that are especially relevant to your unit. Posting e-mail summaries of such actions and events after Senate meetings is one way to do that. Regular reports at your unit's faculty meetings or to your dean or department head can also help keep your unit informed. Keeping open lines of communication can help ensure that you are capable of representing any views or

concerns that are especially relevant to your unit consistent with your considered judgment. If you come from a unit with multiple senators, you might also consider meeting from time to time to discuss common issues and concerns and how best to raise them with the Senate.

- 8. Discuss and Debate Responsibly.** You should strive to express your opinions during Senate meetings and to your colleagues in reasoned, non-confrontational ways that respect the integrity of the Senate and your administrative colleagues and the value of their time and points of view. Remember that senators are all volunteers, serving to advance the good of the whole as they see it, just as you are. The Senate often serves as the public face of shared governance for the campus, and Senate meetings offer primary contact points between the Senate's constituencies and the central administration. As a voice for shared governance that operates within a larger institutional context, the Senate is most effective when it maintains productive relationships among its constituencies and with other actors at the campus and system-wide levels.

At the beginning of each Senate meeting, the Chancellor or the Chancellor's designee will typically provide remarks relevant to the state of the campus or current events. These remarks will be followed by a regular question and answer session. These are opportunities for you to learn about ongoing campus efforts, raise any questions or concerns, and help foster healthy and productive relationships with the administration.

- 9. Consider Your Audience.** You should bear in mind that decisions made by the Senate on this campus can affect not only our own faculty, academic professionals, students, and staff, but larger trends in higher education at the system-wide level, across state, throughout the nation, and even around the world. Senate meetings are open to the media and to the public. The tone and content of Senate deliberations is one measure of the health of a campus community.

- 10. Feel Free to Be a Strong Voice for Budget Transparency, Shared Governance, and Academic Freedom.** Though the Senate is only one part of a larger institutional system, it plays a distinctive role. Consistent with the Senate's unique role within the campus and system, you should always feel free to encourage budget transparency, principles of shared governance, and academic freedom at all levels of campus governance.

Common Parliamentary Procedures for the Urbana-Champaign Senate

Introduction of business:

By an individual senator or group of senators (Pre-filed Resolution listed on the Senate agenda):

“I move the adoption of resolution RS.20.00” (substitute the assigned resolution number). A second is required.

By a committee (an item listed on the Senate agenda):

“On behalf of the Xxx Committee, I move the adoption of XX.20.00” (substitute the committee name and the assigned business number). No second is required.

Business not on the Senate agenda (New Business):

“I move to admit the following item as New Business” (*briefly* describe the proposed business). A second is required. If this motion is approved by the Senate, the item is effectively added to the meeting agenda. One can then move to adopt the item. A second is required. Debate may then take place on the item, but, per the Open Meetings Act, no final vote can be taken at this meeting. However, motions such as amendments or referral to committee can be made and voted on. Unless postponed or referred to a committee, the item will be placed on the agenda of the next meeting.

To change a motion:

To edit the text of the motion:

“I move to amend the motion by changing xx to yy on line ##” (insert the desired text to be changed, and indicate the line number if the original text is numbered).

To substitute an entirely new text for the original:

“I move to substitute the following for the motion” (state the substitute motion).

It is most helpful if the text of the amendment is made available to the Clerk in writing or by email for display on the screen.

In either case, a second is required. Debate must then be confined to the wisdom of the amendment; general discussion of the main motion must await the outcome of the vote on the amendment.

There is no such thing as a “friendly amendment” which is automatically adopted if the maker of the original motion is agreeable. Use the motion to amend.

Disposition of business:

To refer to a committee:

“I move to refer this matter to the Xxx Committee” (substitute the committee name). One can add, “with instructions to” do whatever.

Or: “I move to refer this matter to a committee selected by the Senate Executive Committee”. Instructions can be added.

A second is required. Either of these motions can be amended as to the choice of committee and/or the instructions to the committee.

To postpone the matter:

“I move to postpone this matter indefinitely.” If adopted, this effectively defeats the original main motion. A second is required.

Or: “I move to postpone the matter” to a specific future meeting or for a specific period of time. A second is required.

To lay on the table:

The motion to lay on the table is *not* appropriate for this purpose. Use one of the motions to postpone.

To terminate discussion:

To terminate discussion of the current motion to amend or to refer to committee:

“I move to close debate on the current motion.”

To terminate discussion of the main motion as well as all pending subsidiary motions (such as to amend or to refer to committee):

“I move to close debate on the current motion and on the main motion.”

In either case, a second is required, and a 2/3 vote is necessary to close debate.

The motion to “call the previous question” is equivalent wording; it means exactly the same thing as the motion to “close debate.”

So referral gets voted on first; if it loses, then amendment; then the main motion. The main motion has the highest number, as it is always the last to be voted on.

SP.20.06 Revision to the *Bylaws*, Part D.1 – Senate Executive Committee

BACKGROUND

Responding to the Report of the Eighth Senate Review Commission (XSR.19.01), Senate Executive Committee (SEC) examined its charge and composition as provided in the *Bylaws*, Part D.1. In addition, the Review Commission asked SEC to “determine additional eligibility criteria and duties for the positions of the SEC Chair and Vice-Chair” (XSR.19.01, Recommendation #5). The proposed revisions thus address issues of SEC membership, the duties and eligibility of the SEC Chair and Vice-Chair, and vacancies in the Chair and Vice-Chair positions.

Currently, the responsibilities of the SEC Chair and Vice-Chair are briefly identified in the *Bylaws*, D.1.d. This proposal strikes that provision and proposes a new section, D.1.b, which better itemizes the specific duties of the Chair and Vice-Chair, including the Chair’s responsibility to liaise with administrative offices and work with the various bodies of the Senate, as well as specifying the Vice-Chair’s role in coordinating committee annual reports.

At its July 13, 2020 meeting, the Senate considered a version of this proposal that would have restricted the eligibility for the SEC Chair to faculty or academic professional senators who have served at least one year on the SEC (at any time). That proposal also would have restricted eligibility for the Vice-Chair position to senators (of any type) who have served at least one year as a senator or on a Senate committee at any time. These restrictions, proposed by SEC, attempted to ensure that those elected Chair or Vice-Chair bring experience with the Senate and its work, while also not being overly restrictive.

At the July 13 meeting, the Senate voted to amend the proposal to make the restrictions on the Vice-Chair match those proposed for the Chair position. The Senate also voted to return the proposal to SP for revision, including removing language regarding various types of vacancies in these positions that would no longer be necessary.

This proposed set of changes still includes clarifying language regarding the Council of Academic Professionals and specifies a non-voting *ex officio* position for the Chancellor or the Chancellor’s designee.

RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends the approval of the following revisions to the *Bylaws*. Text to be deleted is ~~struck through~~ and text

to be added is underlined. Adoption of amendments to the *Bylaws* requires a two-thirds vote of the Senate.

SP.20.22 Revision to the *Bylaws*, Part D.14 – Committee on Information Technology

BACKGROUND

Responding to the Report of the Eighth Senate Review Commission (XSR.19.01), the Senate Committee on Information Technology (IT) examined its charge and composition as provided by the *Bylaws*, Part D.14.

Based on the Commission’s input and IT’s discussions, the committee believes it would be appropriate to include a representative from the Director of the National Center for Supercomputing Applications (NCSA), as well as a representative of the Dean of Libraries.

NCSA has played a global role in research computing, and it has always played a role at the University in helping researchers with matters such as high performance computing, high throughput computing, and visualization. In the last several years, the University Library has substantially increased its support of research with services such as database consulting, data management planning, and digital humanities consulting.

In recent years, a representative from the Center for Innovation in Teaching & Learning was added and IT wishes to see research technology support represented with the addition of NCSA and the University Library representatives as *ex officio* members.

RECOMMENDATION

RS.21.02 Resolution on the Adoption of a New Mascot and Endorsement of the Proposed and Student-Supported Kingfisher as a Possible Mascot

WHEREAS, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has demonstrated its leadership as a world class academic and research institution through its groundbreaking advances in COVID-19 testing and prevention, and can continue to commit to its social responsibility by recognizing now as the appropriate time to make positive change for its community; and,

WHEREAS, the University’s strategic plan for the next 150 years states: “We will be leaders in advancing diversity and equity that will contribute to creating an institution committed to excellence in discovery, teaching, and research, and a climate where all can achieve their highest aspirations in a safe and welcoming environment”¹; and,

WHEREAS, mascots serve as a unifying symbol of school spirit for many aspects of the University’s mission and our University has not had an official mascot² since 2007, which has impeded the development of a fulfilling University experience and hindered the creation and maintenance of traditions that promote enduring bonds with the institution; and,

WHEREAS, this resolution does not seek to change the “Fighting Illini” moniker; and,

WHEREAS, the addition of a mascot will not detract from the existing traditions, but rather augment and guide the creation of new traditions for both current and future students (Appendix B); and,

WHEREAS, many academic institutions faced with the decision to replace offensive mascots with a new mascot often did so³, with notable successes with subsequent student-created, inclusive traditions⁴; and,

WHEREAS, researchers comparing University of Illinois to similar universities noted institutions which “communicated clear institutional signals by replacing the mascot with an alternative”

experienced greater success in community inclusion initiatives, and would generate more positive results for prospective students researching college campuses⁵; and,

WHEREAS, a campus survey in 2011 revealed that 85% of 11,440 student respondents were in favor of some form of mascot change⁶ and both the Illinois Student Government (ISG) and the Academic Senate recommended the exploration of a new mascot in 2016⁷; and,

WHEREAS, the Critical Conversations on Native Imagery Advisory Committee reaffirmed this recommendation in 2018 and urged a clear plan of next steps towards moving forward⁸; and,

WHEREAS, while the University has officially disavowed use of the prior mascot, the absence of a replacement has permitted unofficial channels to continue to use and profit from the officially retired Chief Illiniwek imagery^{9,10}; and,

WHEREAS, the continued use of Native American stereotypes in Illinois athletics and student sections detracts¹¹ from the University's ability to create a culture and climate that is welcoming to Native American students, staff, faculty, and community members, as well as undermining recent efforts by the University of Illinois to combat systemic racism; and,

WHEREAS, the American Psychological Association has compiled research that shows the negative effects of cultural appropriation¹² of American Indian imagery on not just indigenous students but all students¹³ in that these mascots are "psychologically detrimental Native American students", "associated with negative stereotypes of Native Americans", and "undermine intergroup relations by increasing negative stereotyping of Native Americans"¹⁴; and,

WHEREAS, respect for the views of the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma should be of central concern to this land grant university as it is the only federally recognized tribe consisting of the descendants of the original Illinois Indians, Confederation, or Tribe of Native Americans, who once lived on the land now occupied by the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign¹⁵; and,

WHEREAS, recent national events have raised issues of race and systemic racism to the forefront of the national consciousness about symbolism in both sports and higher education, thus creating a climate where many institutions are making concerted efforts—including efforts to completely replace former mascots with alternatives—to advance beyond imagery that can be harmful among their traditions^{16,17}; and,

WHEREAS, the Chancellor’s Critical Conversations Report on Native Imagery section “Moving Forward - Major” emphasizes that “[r]epeatedly, stakeholders stated that in order to bring closure the University should introduce a mascot or develop new traditions”¹⁸; and,

WHEREAS, in March of 2020, a majority of students voting (4,222 of 7,819) voted yes to a student referendum question asking “Should the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign adopt the Belted Kingfisher, an orange-and-blue bird native to Illinois, as the mascot for the University?”¹⁹ thus identifying the first widely-supported candidate for a new mascot among students on campus; and,

WHEREAS, a new mascot idea, the belted kingfisher, is gaining widespread grassroots support and its adoption would resolve many of the issues aforementioned; and,

WHEREAS, belted kingfishers are native, predatory birds of Illinois, which have not yet been used as a mascot by any major American business, notable sports team, or university in America—thus offering a possible mascot that would have strong brand recognition with no chance of confusion with any collegiate competitor; and,

WHEREAS, the Kingfisher that is naturally true to the “Orange and Blue” (Appendix A)—thus perfectly resonating with other branding and symbolism already associated with cherished Illinois traditions; and,

THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED, that without expressing disapproval of alternatives that may gain widespread support, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senate endorses the adoption of the Kingfisher as a new mascot for the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senate strongly urges the Chancellor and all appropriate Administrative Officials to immediately commission a plan for the implementation of a new mascot for the University this academic year; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senate requests any and all committees, commissions, task forces, working groups, etc. working on any issues related to University symbols, mascots, traditions, student life, athletics, and alumni outreach consider the adoption of and design implementation plans for a new mascot as it relates to their purview, and to consider the Kingfisher as a possible mascot; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the University administration works to actively include the student voice as represented by the Illinois Student Government on all committees, commissions, task forces, working groups, etc. regarding campus culture, the creation of new traditions, and school spirit; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senate requests periodic updates from relevant administrative bodies, starting at the November 2020 Senate Executive Committee meeting, on the status of the implementation of a mascot; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senate acknowledges this measure to be more than thirteen years overdue.

APPENDIX B: NEW TRADITIONS

ISG Kingfisher Taskforce: New Traditions Report

In this report, the University of Illinois Student Government Mascot Task-Force reviews anticipated new school traditions and opportunities for student and alumni involvement. While methods of student engagement are rarely predictable and will often grow organically from change, we foresee several possibilities for both courtside and community participation. In addition to considering our own university's growth, we analyze the successes of similar universities and colleges who were faced with replacing their mascot.

Incorporating a new Mascot into Student Life

A mascot is more than just a representative of its University's sports teams; it is a Swiss-army knife for public relations, student interactions and recruitment events.

New Traditions Opportunities

New student section traditions are a vital part of integrating a new mascot into our community. For example, as kingfishers are diving birds²⁰, a student could do a simple, dive-bombing hand motion that ends with a "splash" noise or explosion of hands when our team scores a touchdown or a free-throw.

New Merchandising

As a unique and highly-specialized species of bird, belted kingfishers feature distinct traits that will distinguish them from the more “commonplace” songbird, eagle and hawk mascots. Most notably, the bird has a prominent crest, perfect for new game-day “kingfisher crest” hats. These hats can be foam or knitted, an example of which is shown below:

In addition to this, rather than student section sports towels, students can have long, narrow orange banners, or “belts”, (imitating the bird’s own orange belt), or smaller ones that can be worn as a headband.

As a spearfishing bird, the kingfisher has a long, pointed beak. This feature is not unlike the shape of a kazoo; an instrument that is lightweight and easily mass-produced. Noise-makers, such as grey and black (or orange and blue) “kingfisher kazooos” could be used at (permitting) university events and parades.

As these instruments are inexpensive, they could make for great visitor items to be included in the orange bookstore bags handed out for tours. As no other academic institution uses this specific animal, all “kingfisher” traditions would be unique to the University of Illinois.

Student-created kingfisher merchandise and artwork—shared on Facebook, Twitter and other social media forums—showcases the excitement in the future of this mascot. RSOs, such as the Illinois Badminton sports club and the UIUC Geology club, have already begun to incorporate the kingfisher into their logos. We expect more traditions and items to be invented with time.

Student-Inclusion Initiatives for Design and Name

With the support of relevant University Administration, the ISG Kingfisher Taskforce wishes to utilize the creativity of



our community through competitions for the bird's name and official design. This process can include submissions from students, faculty, alumni, and community members. We intend to have several rounds of selection and approval, involving a committee of alumni, professors, administration, athletic departmental staff, and other university staff. The exact plan for voting timelines will be decided when the Senate decides to move forward with this mascot. We have looked towards other Universities faced with comparable circumstances for mascot design competition structures and will present these as possible options to administration should this resolution pass.

Other student-inclusion initiatives have been scheduled by the ISG Kingfisher taskforce to better hear student and student athlete voices on the mascot. This list includes Q&A sessions for students, a presentation to the Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) in November, and various online opportunities for questions through social media platforms.

Mascot Changes with Other Institutions

While adopting a new mascot will be a definite first for *our* University, it is hardly a first in the world of sports. Other academic institutions, having been in similar situations to ours, experienced great success with newly-adopted mascots. Miami University, which went by the name "the Redskins" up until 1997, [successfully](#) switched to a new mascot, a red tailed hawk. Eastern Michigan University switched from the EMU Hurons to the EMU Eagles in 1991, adopting a new mascot, [Swoop the Eagle](#). Indiana State University had used mascot Chief Quabachi up until 1989. Six years later, college administration invested into a new mascot, [Sycamore Sam](#) (a blue and white fox-like creature) who still serves as a positive community liaison and their college representative to this day. Success stories like these can be seen on college courtsides across the country.

While some colleges ultimately decided to change the team's name in addition to adding a new mascot, this mascot proposal is NOT intended to serve as a team name change. Rather, it is a singular yet critical step in the right direction of creating new, inclusive traditions for students and our entire community.

EP.21.002 Report of Administrative Approvals through August 31, 2020

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on August 31, 2020. Additional information for each approval is attached.

A. Undergraduate Programs

- 1) **Agricultural & Consumer Economics: Agri-Accounting, BS** – Revise the Agri-accounting Concentration-Required courses of which students take a total of 29 hours to *remove* ACE 231, Food and Agribusiness Management (3 hours) or BADM 310, Mgmt and Organizational Beh (3 hours) and *add* ACE 346, Tax Policy and Financial Planning (3 hours). ACE 231 or BADM 310 are no longer prerequisites for ACCY 304, Accounting Control Systems (3 hours), which is a required course for students in the Agri-accounting concentration. ACE 346 is a required course for students in this program of study who wish to be considered for admission to the Gies College of Business' Master of Accounting Science program, and it is approved by the Illinois Board of Examiners as meeting the "Tax" requirement to sit for the CPA exam. The proposed revision does not change the total number of hours required for the concentration or for the program of study.

- 2) **Agricultural & Consumer Economics: Public Policy and Law, BS** – Revise the Public Policy and Law Concentration-Required courses of which students take a total of 21 hours to *remove* PS 220, Intro to Public Policy (3 hours) and *add* ACE 203, Introduction to Public Policy and Law (3 hours). PS 220 surveys the policy-making process but lacks the focus on agriculture, food, and natural resources in a manner that aligns with classes throughout this program of study. ACE 203 is tailored to specifically cover public policy in a manner that does align. The proposed revision does not change the total number of hours required for the concentration or for the program of study.

B. Graduate Programs

- 1) **In concurrence with the 2019-2020 Senate Educational Policy Committee Chair, the following programs were edited in the Program of Study Academic Catalog listing effective May 28, 2020 in the 2020-2021 Academic Catalog. The revisions are considered editorial because they are changes in the rubric of courses listed only; there is no content change in the courses themselves nor to the requirements which these courses comprise in the following programs.**
 - Courses changed - The foundational courses lists were updated with the current rubric, EPOL, revising it from EOL for these courses: EPOL 401, History of American Education (2-4 hours); EPOL 402, Asian American Education (4 hours); EPOL 403, Historical and Social Barriers (4 hours); EPOL 405, School and Society (4 hours); EPOL 406, Professional Ethics in Education (4 hours);

- 2) **Spatial and Quantitative Methods in Natural Resources and Environment Sciences Minor – UG** -- in the list of Mathematical Modeling courses from which students are to select 3-4 hours, add NRES 401, Watershed Hydrology (3 hours); NRES 402, Ecohydrology and Water Management (3 hours); and NRES 403, Watersheds and Water Quality (3 hours). In the list of Spatial Analysis courses from which students are to select 3-5 hours, add CPSC 444, Introduction to Spatial Analytics (4 hours); GEOG 460, Aerial Photo Analysis (3 hours); and GEOG 476, Applied GIS to Environ Studies (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the minor.
- 3) **Natural Resource Conservation Minor – UG** -- in the minor-required courses, add NRES 219, Applied Ecology (3 hours) as an alternative option for NRES 287, Environment and Society (3 hours). In the list of General Electives from which students are required to take 12 hours, at least 6 hours at the 400-level, *remove* NRES 109, Global Environmental Issues (3 hours); NRES 425, Natural Resources Law & Policy (3 hours); and NRES 426, Renewable Energy Policy (3 hours). *Add* to this list NRES 302, Dendrology (4 hours); NRES 362, Ecology of Invasive Species (3 hours); NRES 402, Ecohydrology and Water Management (3 hours); NRES 418, Wetland Ecology & Management (3 hours); NRES 423, Politics of International Conservation and Development (3 hours); NRES 428, Valuing Nature (3 hours); NRES 485, Stream Ecosystem Management (4 hours); and NRES 487, Soil Chemistry (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the minor.
- 4) **Urban Studies & Planning: Sustainability, BA** – in the Sustainability concentration’s list of courses from which students are required to take 6-8 hours, add UP 246, International Environmental Planning and Governance (3 hours); UP 406, Urban Ecology (4 hours); UP 434, Pedestrian and Bicycle Planning (3 hours); and UP 486, Planning with Climate Change (4 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or for the degree.

- 5) **Urban Studies & Planning: Policy & Planning, BA** – in the Policy & Planning concentration’s list of courses from which students are to take 6-8 hours, add UP 431, Travel Behavior Analysis (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or for the degree.

- 6) **Urban Studies & Planning: Global Cities, BA** – in the Global Studies concentration’s list of courses from which students take 6-8 hours, add UP 246, International Environmental Planning and Governance (3 hours) and UP 486, Planning with Climate Change (4 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or for the degree.

- 7) **Urban Studies & Planning: Social Justice, BA** – in the Social Justice concentration’s list of courses from which students take 6-8 hours, add UP 479, Community Engagement in Planning (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or for the degree.

SC.21.06 Report on the September 10, 2020 Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois System in Urbana

Chairman Don Edwards called the meeting to order and began with a performance of the state song, "Illinois," performed by Caroline McKinzie, a major in the Lyric Theatre program.

President Tim Killeen introduced guests and observers. He discussed the U of I System's responses to the COVID pandemic. Enrollments are up, a testament to our quality and to the efforts put in place to protect students, faculty, and staff. The saliva testing and Shield program, developed by "brilliant" faculty at Urbana, are key to these efforts, which many universities have been unable to do. He also announced new system-side effort focused on student mental and emotional health.

Chancellor Robert Jones provided a welcome and an update from Urbana. He reviewed safety activities being implemented in the campus. He commended faculty and staff for their extraordinary efforts to make a safe reopening possible; and students for taking responsibility for themselves and for others in complying with the new rules. While dealing with the virus is a central concern, there are many other aspects of the college experience at Urbana that are thriving. A large part of the enrollment growth is due to expanded online programs. The freshman class has an increased number of first-in-family students. Campus philanthropy is up, topping \$300 million for the third straight year. We are well on the way to reaching our campus fundraising goal of \$2.25 billion.

VP Jay Walsh presented more information on the Shield program ("testing, target, and tell"). This program is also being scaled up to a state-wide model ("Shield Illinois"), and even beyond the borders of the state ("Shield T3"), which is being adopted by other states, large manufacturing organizations, other universities, and the military. We don't do marketing – people are coming to us.

Professor Magic Wade, chair of the University Senates Conference, who provided a summary of the USC year-end report, and future goals. Productive dialogue between faculty and administration has never been more important than in the present circumstances. USC met with Pres Killeen and VP Wilson every two weeks during the summer. Plans for the upcoming year include police training and reform, and racial justice as a permanent initiative, on a par with the level of effort that has been put into COVID. Board chairman Edwards expressed the strong support from the Board for these initiatives, and for shared governance more generally.

The four Board Committee reports provided background to various items on the action agenda for today.

Public comments were presented, for five minutes each. Joe Iosbaker spoke about institutional racism at UIC, affecting disproportionate sickness and death from COVID-19 among certain groups. Kathleen Jensen also talked about the disproportionate effect of COVID-19 in the UIC area and threatened a strike of over 5300 workers.

The following action items were approved (items affected Urbana highlighted):

01. Resolution to Honor COVID-19 Response

RESOLUTION TO HONOR COVID-19 RESPONSE

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is immensely proud of the heroic efforts by our dedicated leadership, faculty, and staff to safeguard not only our three university communities but the people of our state and nation during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The U of I System has been at the forefront of this historic health crisis from the very beginning. Weeks before the virus was widely known in the U.S. and while there were only a handful of confirmed cases in Illinois, the U of I System and its three universities had already created teams that brought together administrative leaders and our world-class experts to monitor the outbreak and map our response.

Since then, the U of I System has fulfilled its land-grant mission with unparalleled distinction and further cemented its standing as a global leader in scholarship and innovation that is focused squarely on the public good.

It has been a true team effort, supported by faculty, staff, students, and alumni across the U of I System and by donors, friends, elected officials, and many other stakeholders across the spectrum.

The lifesaving work includes pioneering new saliva-based testing and surveillance developed by researchers in Urbana-Champaign that has attracted national and international attention since it was launched this summer.

The groundbreaking SHIELD program produces rapid results at costs that allow large-scale testing. That combination is a key to curbing the virus, allowing widespread surveillance with isolation early enough to limit spread of the infection, particularly among people with asymptomatic cases.

Led by Urbana-Champaign chemistry researchers Martin Burke and Paul Hergenrother, the university's brilliant SHIELD team has added to the U of I System's legacy of world-changing innovation and given our nation an important new weapon in the battle against COVID-19.

There have been countless other contributions by our three, best-in-class universities, including:

- From UIC, Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs Dr. Robert Barish was asked by President Killeen to lead the University of Illinois System's COVID-19 Planning and Response Team. Additionally, Chief of Infectious Disease Dr. Richard Novak, Associate Vice Chancellor for Population Health Sciences Dr. Jerry Krishnan, and others have been leading seven clinical trials to test several medications and biological therapies that might lessen the impact of COVID-19 infection.
- Also, at UIC and under the direction of Dr. Novak, UI Health has been selected as the only Chicago site for an important national Phase 3 clinical trial of a potential vaccine against COVID-19.
- UIUC faculty, led by physics professor Nigel Goldenfeld, played a key role in epidemiological models cited by Governor J. B. Pritzker as a factor in his decision to invoke statewide stay-at-home orders.

These scientists have continued to provide up-to-date research to guide the state's prevention efforts.

- At UI Health, our dedicated health-care teams have been battling COVID-19 from the start, working around the clock to provide lifesaving treatments and comfort for both patients and their loved ones.
- At UIUC, engineering professor William King led a research team that produced a prototype emergency ventilator to help fill a surge of demand for respiratory care as a result of the virus.
- Also, at UIUC, the College of Veterinary Medicine Diagnostic Lab, led by Professor Tim Fan, has processed tens of thousands of COVID-19 samples, providing rapid turnaround time for results.
- UI Health also has been at the forefront of providing community-based care especially in Chicago's West and South sides, including setting up food pantries, delivering more than 7,000 mask and hand sanitizer kits to neighborhoods, and providing infirmary care for more than 200 individuals experiencing homelessness.
- UIS, at the state's request, shared its expertise as a pioneer in online education to help colleges and K-12 schools across Illinois transition to virtual learning when the virus sent students home to study last spring.
- Also, at the state's request, our SHIELD Illinois, led by Gies College of Business Associate Dean for Strategic Innovation professor Ron Watkins, helped to coordinate efforts to expand saliva-based SHIELD testing across the entire state of Illinois.
- Many other faculty and staff, too numerous to name, across the UI System have worked diligently and gone above and beyond normal expectations in implementing new initiatives to ensure the safety and continued success of the University of Illinois students, faculty, and staff.

The Board of Trustees hereby recognizes and commends the devoted faculty and staff who have helped guide these crucial initiatives and so many others as our universities rose up on behalf of the citizens of our state and nation. For providing invaluable advice and expertise these past few months, a special thanks goes to members of our three university senates and to those on the University Senates Conference. These partnerships demonstrate the strength of our shared governance model during times of crucial decision making.

The meeting adjourned at 9:56 am.
