Program Description and Justification

Justification for proposal change:

We are proposing a major revision of the HDFS BS curriculum to better align with our student learning outcomes, reflect the changing needs and interests of students, reflect the changing composition of our faculty, and create flexibility for individualized course plans. Specifically, we are requesting the following changes (including both major and minor changes):

Gen Ed Options

1. Replace ACE 261 with ACE 262 in the list of options for Quantitative Reasoning I because ACE plans to phase out ACE 261 in the next year.

Core Requirements

1. Revise the title of HDFS 101 for clarity (note: the proposed new title "opportunities and careers in HDFS" appears in some places in the catalogue and major information but not others).

2. Remove HDFS 220 because this course fits better in our Diversity Options (described below).

3. Remove ACE 161 because all of our students do not need this content and those who do can choose it as an elective. This change gives students more flexibility.

4. Require a choice of one child/adolescent development course among three options (HDFS 301, 305, 405) and one relationships/family course among two options (HDFS 225, 425). Because we are removing concentrations, this new requirement ensures students have at least one substantive course in each area.

Applied Options

6. Remove HDFS 261. This course is no longer offered.

7. Revise the title for HDFS 295 (which offers non-research related options, e.g., applied teaching or program development opportunities) to avoid confusion with HDFS 294 (research internship).

8. Add HDFS 461 and LEAD 260 to Applied Options. These new options add opportunities for students interested in program development and leadership roles. Also add HDFS 396, which is a research thesis credit opportunity for James Scholar honors students.

Diversity Options

9. Increase the required Diversity Options hours from 3 to 6 hours. This change reflects the increasing importance in HDFS and beyond to acquire breadth and depth of knowledge related to diverse individuals, families, and communities.

10. Add HDFS 220, HDFS 420, and HDFS 424 to Diversity Options. This change adds flexibility and expands the range of options to include global families, socioeconomic status and poverty, and Black families (a primary focus of HDFS 424).

11. Remove AAS 341. This course is no longer offered.

Individualized Plan

12. Remove concentrations. Dividing our curriculum into Child and Adolescent Development and Family Studies concentrations no longer reflects the state of our field or the kinds of careers our students pursue (e.g., health professions). Instead of prescribed concentrations, students will have the flexibility to develop an individualized plan based on career interests and in consultation with the HDFS academic advisor. Students will choose from a list of HDFS courses and cannot "double dip." In other words, courses taken toward the individualized plan must be unique from those selected to meet Core Requirements, Applied Options, and Diversity Options. The HDFS degree audit will be programmed to ensure courses selected to count toward the individualized plan will not double-count for other major requirements.

A degree audit would count courses as meeting both requirements (which they don't) so we wanted to know how the process for each student would be monitored with the list.

Brianna Gregg (in ACES Office of Academic Programs) indicated that the DARS report can be set up to control for courses to only count in one area, even though the course is listed as an option in two places. Do we need to do something to plan ahead for this? Or do I need to add this language to the proposal?
