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# University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Senate Monday, March 8, 2021 Zoom Webinar Minutes

# I. CALL TO ORDER

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Senate was called to order at 3:10 pm with Senate Executive Committee (SEC) Chair Rob Kar (LAW) presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

#### II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

- 03/08/21-01 Without objection, the minutes of the February 8, 2021 meetings were approved as distributed.

# V. SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHAIR'S REMARKS

Chair Kar thanked everyone for supporting the first wellness day for students and encouraged continued compassion from faculty for students. Kar reiterated the importance of continuing to follow the COVID guidance from public health officials.

#### VI. CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS

Chancellor Robert Jones thanked everyone for their continued efforts during the pandemic. As a University, we have demonstrated that we know how to take action during a pandemic. The University received Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) from the FDA (US Food and Drug Administration) for expanding use of the rapid saliva test. The EUA provides an opportunity to extend this innovative testing to other parts of the state, the country, and the world. Great pride is taken when discoveries made at Illinois can positively affect the local communities and further. Jones is proud of how the University community has responded to this pandemic.

The COVID positivity rates have been very low for the last several weeks. There are lower trends across the state as well, but we must remain vigilant with testing protocols and safety measures to continue keeping positivity rates low. The COVID-19 Dashboard has been updated and hopefully more user friendly.

Strategic plans for fall 2021 are underway. If trends continue in the current direction, there will hopefully be more face-to-face instruction for fall 2021.

Kevin Pitts, Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education, will be stepping out of this Vice Provost role to move into a different role at the University as the Chief Research Officer at Fermilab National Accelerator Laboratory.

Provost Cangellaris announced a couple of weeks ago additional funding for the Targets of Opportunity Program (TOP). This will allow hiring 15 new faculty members through TOP between now and 2023. The recruitment piece has always been difficult, but there have been some efforts lately to actively retain some of the best and brightest, and diverse faculty members.

#### VII. QUESTIONS

Faculty senator Cameron (LAS) asked about large lab courses being delivered in-person or virtually and the assumption that student would be vaccinated by the start of the fall semester. Jones responded that there are plans underway for the fall semester but must still wait for further guidance from public health officials. Jones hopes as many people get vaccinated as possible. Cangellaris added that underway plans make some assumptions, but also must be flexible to change depending on the positivity rates in the fall and if Phase 5 of the Restore Illinois Plan is achieved. Right now, plans are being made on the assumption that classrooms will be at 50% capacity with an upward limit of 200 students. Cangellaris hopes to maximize in-person instruction but there will still be some virtual instruction.

Faculty senator Cisneros (LAS) asked about updates on when and what capacity the rapid saliva test will be offered to the broader community. Jones reported that more information on expanding testing will be announced next week or the week after. This includes offering rapid saliva testing to employee family members. The delay in offering testing services has been on the backend data side.

Faculty senator Gothe (AHS) asked about vaccinations for in-person researchers and staff. Provost Cangellaris reported that the University is working with public health officials to make vaccines available to this population. Any new information regarding vaccinations will be distributed as the information becomes available.

# UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS URBANA-CHAMPAIGN SENATE PRE-FILED RESOLUTION (Final; Action)

#### RS.21.03 Resolution Regarding the Proposed Library Renovations

WHEREAS, in late 2018 the library introduced a proposal "focused on the humanities, arts, social and behavioral sciences" to (1) renovate the Main Library by demolishing the dilapidated old east stacks and rearranging the floor plan, (2) reconfigure the Undergraduate Library as a Special Collections facility, and (3) relocate undergraduate resources and services to the Main Library;

WHEREAS, although we acknowledge with admiration and gratitude the commitment and effort that the library administration and staff have put into attempting to meet the needs of faculty and students by undertaking these renovations, and we applaud the library's efforts to solicit faculty and student input, concerns nonetheless have arisen regarding this ambitious plan;

WHEREAS, many faculty and students concur with the need to renovate the Main Library, concerns remain about the proposed reconfiguration of the Undergraduate Library as a Special Collections facility, including (1) The loss to undergraduates of their special community and their home away from home in a building specifically designed for their needs; and (2) A danger to our most precious library resources if they are stored in a sub-basement with known drainage issues;

WHEREAS, funding exigencies, exacerbated by the covid crisis, have resulted in the drastic cutting back of the original full-scale plan (estimated at around \$260 million) to include only the bare bones first phase of the reconfiguration of the Undergraduate Library (estimated at \$50 million);

WHEREAS, because the timelines for renovating the Main Library and completing the reconfiguration of the Undergraduate Library are uncertain, having been postponed to 5 or more years in the future, the resulting lack of additional space from the Main Library renovation means that when the undergraduates and their services are removed from the Undergraduate Library they will need to be squeezed into inadequate, much smaller spaces in the Main Library;

WHEREAS, because the covid crisis will have effects on how library services are most effectively delivered to faculty and students, it seems that additional planning ought to be done before finalizing a supremely expensive project designed in the context of the pre-covid era;

WHEREAS, many faculty and students feel that although the library solicited and received input regarding the conversion of the Undergraduate Library, this input was not acted upon, and by the time the drastic cut back in the plan was announced, the opportunity for further input had passed;

WHEREAS, there is a continuing perception that, despite several requests to do so, no serious consideration has been given to other options for gaining additional space for Special Collections, such as expansion within stack range 6 or the construction of an addition to the west stacks;

WHEREAS, the University administration has often expressed its commitment to funding a plan that meets the needs of faculty, students, and the library, but has yet to craft a firm plan to do so;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Faculty Senate Library Committee name a committee including library staff and concerned faculty and student stakeholders to meet during the next six months so that faculty, students, library staff, and the university administration can work together (1) to prioritize the needs and desires of undergraduates, (2) to consider other options for increasing Special Collections space, (3) to consider how covid will affect the delivery of library services, and (4) to help craft a financial plan in which the university ensures that the needs of all stakeholders will be met by making a formal commitment to provide the funding necessary to complete all phases of the library renovation project within the next five years.

The Senate Committee on the Library (SCL) has voted No on Senate Resolution RS.21.03, *Resolution Regarding the Proposed Library Renovations*.

We acknowledge committee members Ralph Mathisen, James Brennan, and the authors of the Humanities Faculty Resolution for their desire to ensure the success of the Library Renovation Project. We appreciate the significant amount of time that the Humanities faculty has spent on crafting this resolution, and we understand their concern about funding for the project's completion. However, the campus has indicated its dedication and support by making the Library Renovation Project a top capital priority.

The Senate Library Committee has monitored the development of this plan since its inception. Throughout 2018, 2019, and in spring 2020, we met with John Wilkin, Dean of Libraries; members of the Provost-appointed Library Consultation Working Group (LCWG), including David Chasco, past Director of the School of Architecture and chair of LCWG; members of the University Library Working Groups dedicated to this project; and students and faculty from departments across the campus.

We have reviewed specifications for the staged renovation of the Main and Undergraduate Libraries. We received updates about student and faculty perspectives from the town halls, salons, and various meetings that were sponsored to gather input from campus units. We adjourned the 2019-2020 session satisfied with the knowledge that a myriad of stakeholders and architects had thoroughly reviewed plans for the Library Renovation Project, and that it was comprehensive, sound, and ready to deploy.

The members of the current Library Committee have met to discuss the concerns of the Humanities faculty, and we appreciate their perspectives and advocacy in pursuit of a successful project. This resolution claims that its authors' wishes have not been heard—they have. Unfortunately what they want is not possible given the age and structure of the library buildings. Know that it is challenging to understand and appreciate a colleague's point of view while still voting not to support it.

The investment and planning for the Library Renovation Project has been too thorough and inclusive to abandon in pursuit of a new plan. Throughout the past three years, architectural firms have assessed the buildings' structures and created a practical and innovative design that will transform the Main and Undergraduate Libraries into spaces that can sustain the collections and support the research, scholarly, and community needs of the entire campus for decades to come. It is time to accept their wisdom and expertise and create a library for our future.

Dear University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Senators,

We urge you to vote No on Senate Resolution RS.21.03, *Resolution Regarding the Proposed Library Renovations*, asking to postpone the construction to support the Library's rare, archival and special collections.

The objections of the authors are primarily the following:

- 1. "The loss to undergraduates of their special community and their home away from home in a building specifically designed for their needs";
- 2. "A danger to our most precious library resources if they are stored in a sub-basement with known drainage issues";
- 3. And concerns that because the next phase, construction on the Main Library, "has been postponed to an unspecified time 5-10 years in the future, the resulting lack of availability of additional space ... means that after the undergraduates and their services are removed from the Undergraduate Library they will need to be squeezed into inadequate, much smaller spaces in the Main Library."

A staged process has been part of our planning from the outset in 2017, and is a necessary strategy with regard to funding. If the decades-long delays to the Library's construction plans have taught us anything, it is that hundreds of millions of dollars of funding cannot be mustered to address the construction as a single project. This first phase, creating a home for our rare and archival collections in the Undergraduate Library building, is nearly entirely funded and will establish a solid foundation for the Main Library phase, which the University has embraced as its highest capital priority. Our planning has ensured that we will meet the needs of undergraduates through the reallocation of equivalent programming space in the Main Library during this first phase, and that larger and better spaces will be created in the second phase.

The resolution fails to acknowledge the substantial work done to address these and similar concerns. Specifically:

- 1. The interests of undergraduate students are being addressed initially through the restructuring of several Main Library spaces to make them better-suited for group and quiet study, as well as moving the Media Commons to the Main Library. The underground construction of the UGL was driven by concerns about the Morrow Plots, and is less conducive to student needs than the planned subsequent Main Library phase of the project, which will provide improved spaces that also better integrate undergraduate library services.
- 2. Concerns regarding the drainage vulnerability of the Undergraduate Library are unfounded. The original construction of the UGL foundation was designed to guard against precisely the kinds of threats described in the resolution. In its 50 years, we have not encountered flooding problems, and the first job of the contracted architectural and engineering firm is to ensure that we address any potential threats. The current vault for the Rare Book and Manuscript Library, three floors above ground level, has encountered flooding and moisture problems from failures in nearby plumbing, reminding us that any location has vulnerabilities that must be addressed. We note, as well, that underground construction for rare and archival collections has been adopted for major institutions such as Cornell University and the University of Virginia.
- 3. While the demolition of the oldest stacks ranges and their replacement by a new 100,000 building is currently unfunded, the campus has ranked this next phase of construction as its highest capital priority. The University has recognized the imperative of replacing these older stack ranges because of the fire and environmental threat they pose to our important collections. Progress with this first phase will allow the University and the Library to work to secure funding to begin that next phase of work.

We note that the concerns expressed by the authors in several of the clauses are entirely inconsistent with the facts of this effort. The authors note that while the Library "has solicited and received student input regarding the conversion of the Undergraduate Library, this input has not [been] acted upon." In fact, through 3 campus-wide town halls, 7 group discussions with campus faculty and graduate students, 3 meetings of the Senate Committee on the Library (which includes student representatives), one presentation to the Senate of the Urbana-Champaign Campus; 5 meetings with college or departmental executive committees, 2 meetings with departmental faculty, 2 meetings with the Humanities Council, one meeting with Illinois Student Government, and 7 recorded quarterly updates, input was received and that input shaped the current decisions. Those efforts played a significant part in shaping the recommendations from the Library Consultation Working Group (LCWG), a group of faculty members from many disciplines, including Classics, History and English. The final report of the LCWG endorsed the current strategy after careful consideration of that input and consideration of reports by architects and engineers.

The authors note that "no serious consideration has been given to other options for gaining additional space for Special Collections, such as expansion within stack range 6 or the construction of an addition to the west stacks." These and other options were considered and rejected because devoting more space in the sixth stack range would limit the size of the accessible general collection, a priority widely endorsed by faculty, and because new construction to the west of the current Library building would have added significantly more cost, thus jeopardizing all phases of the proposed project.

Since 2017, substantial work has been done to reach the current conclusion. Nearly all of the necessary funding has been secured, and a contract with architects, engineers and preservation consultants has been signed to enable this work to go forward. Postponing that work will almost certainly cause the Library's building project to fail. Most of the funding for the first phase cannot be used for other purposes and will be forfeit. A further delay of decades on a project that is long overdue poses great and certain risks to the Library's outstanding collections. We ask you to vote No on Resolution RS.21.03 so that efforts to advance the Library's future needs can continue.

#### A. Undergraduate Programs

- Human Geography Concentration, BALAS in Geography & Geographic Information Science in the list of 200- to 400-level Geography and Geographic Information Science courses of which students are to choose 25-27 hours, add GEOG 254, American People, Places, & Environments (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required.
- 2) Geography & Geographic Information Science Minor in the list of human geography courses from which students are to select 3 hours, add GEOG 254, American People, Places, & Environments (3 hours). There is no change to total hours required.
- 3) Information Systems, BS revise the "select from" list to require 9 rather than 6 hours of IS Major Electives, removing BADM 355, Enterprise Software Management (3 hours), and adding BADM 356, Data Science and Analytics (3 hours), BADM 357, Digital Making Seminar (3 hours), and BADM 395, Senior Research II, Sections BDI, ISM, ID, and IOP (3 hours each section). Rather than having students select four courses, 12-14 hours, of IS Program Electives, require three courses, 9 hours, and add BADM 323, Marketing Communications (3 hours), BADM 326, Pricing Strategy (3 hours), BADM 329, New Product Development (3 hours), BDAM 382, International Marketing (3 hours), and BADM 395, Senior Research II, Sections BDI, ISM, ID, and IOP (3 hours each section; each section can only be applied to either the IS Major Electives or the IS Program Electives list, but not both) and remove BADM 380, International Business (3 hours); BADM 445, Small Business Consulting (3 hours), and BADM 446, Entrepreneurship: New Venture Creation (3 hours). There is no change to total hours required.
- 4) Strategic Business Development & Entrepreneurship, BS revise the Skill-Building Elective Choices form which students are to select 17-19 hours to add BADM 377, Project Management (3 hours) and BADM 331, Making Things (3 hours) and to remove BADM 395, Senior Research II (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required.

#### B. Graduate Programs

1) Applied Statistics Concentration, MS in Statistics – update the Regression requirement to allow students to select from STAT 425, Statistical Modeling I (4 hours) or STAT 527, Advanced Regression Analysis (4 hours); remove the 0-4 hour requirement of STAT 427, Statistical Consulting (or experience in applied statistics) or STAT 593, Internship, as all students admitted to the program automatically meet this by virtue of their PhD programs; revise the elective STAT course requirement from 4 hours to 8 hours and expand the list of courses from which students may choose; update the minimum GPA

requirement to 2.75 to match other Statistics MS programs. There is no change in the total hours required.

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on April 5, 2021. Additional information for each approval is attached.

#### A. Undergraduate Programs

- 1) Bioengineering, BS remove the technical GPA requirement for graduation, which the department indicates only infrequently has not been met, often causes confusion for students about this requirement vs. the campus' 2.00 minimum GPA requirement, and because the Dept. of Bioengineering does not utilize a technical GPA forgiveness policy whereas other undergraduate engineering majors do. The department felt it is inconsistent to have a tech GPA requirement and not allow forgiveness, and given the infrequency with which the tech GPA is not met, they are requesting simply removing this graduation requirement and following the campus' 2.00 GPA requirement. Also requested at this time is an update of the listing of Track Electives. Students are required to complete one track by successful completion of 15 hours of courses. In the list of Biomechanics electives, remove NPRE 498, Special Topics (Advanced Risk Analysis – 3 hours). In the Cell and Tissue Engineering Track, remove BIOE 424, which is no longer offered. In the Therapeutics Engineering Track, remove BIOE 424 and BIOE 477, both of which are no longer offered, and add MSE 457, Polymer Chemistry (3 or 4 hours). In the Computational and Systems Biology Track, remove BIOE 424, which is no longer offered, and CS 398, Special Topics (Deep Learning – 3 hours), and add BIOE 498, Special Topics (Systems Biology – 3 hours); CS 446, Machine Learning (3 or 4 hours); CS 498, Special Topics (Intro to Deep Learning – 3 hours); ECE 498, Special Topics in ECE (Deep Learning in Hardware – 3 hours); NPRE 461, Probabilistic Risk Assessment (3 or 4 hours). In the Imaging and Sensing Track, remove BIOE 477, which is no longer offered, and NPRE 498, Special Topics (Advanced Risk Analysis – 3 hours), and add ECE 365, Data Science and Engineering (3 hours); NPRE 461, Probabilistic Risk Assessment (3 hours); and the following sections of BIOE 498, Special Topics, which are all 3 hours: Experimental Design in Automation, Immunoengineering, Preclinical Molecular Imaging, Quantitative Pharmacology, Regulatory Safety Issues in Bioengineering, Surgical Techniques, Systems Biology, and Technologies for Cancer Diagnosis and Therapy. All departments and the Grainger College of Engineering are supportive of these changes in listings. Finally, a footnote will be added to all courses listed as available to fulfill more than one Track indicating students select one track to complete, and the course can only be applied in the specific track area where the course is listed. There is no change to the total hours required.
- 2) Dance, BA in the list of Technique/Physical Practice courses from which students are to select 18 total hours, add DANC 256, Choreographic Laboratory Intermediate (1 to 2 hours) and DANC 456, Choreographic Laboratory Advanced (1 to 2 hours). In the list of Creative Processes/Performance and Production courses from which students are to select 11 total hours, including two Improvisation

courses, add DANCE 465, Screendance (3 hours) to that list of Improvisation courses. There is no change to the total hours required.

- 3) Dance, BFA -- in the list of Technique/Physical Practice courses from which students are to select 32 total hours, add DANC 256, Choreographic Laboratory Intermediate (1 to 2 hours) and DANC 456, Choreographic Laboratory Advanced (1 to 2 hours). In the list of Creative Processes/Performance and Production courses from which students are to select 17-20 total hours, including three Advanced Creative Process Courses, add DANCE 465, Screendance (3 hours) to that list of Advanced Creative Process courses. There is no change to the total hours required.
- 4) General Studio Art Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA add a heading explaining the concentration requirements within the degree table which explains the exclusion of courses taken in the first-year curriculum at the top for clarity of requirements. Update the references to "foundations credits," changing this wording to "First-year curriculum." Remove notes within the Program of Study table about prerequisites for ARTS 354, 351, 456, and 457 as these were redundant; students can click on the course to view prerequisites. Add footnotes about repeatability to indicate for courses that are repeatable how each is allowed to be repeated to meet total degree hours in that category for this specific concentration. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.
- 5) Painting Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA add a heading explaining the concentration requirements within the degree table which explains the exclusion of courses taken in the first-year curriculum at the top for clarity of requirements. Update the references to "foundations credits," changing this wording to "First-year curriculum." Remove notes within the Program of Study table about prerequisites for ARTS 354, 351, 456, and 457 as these were redundant; students can click on the course to view prerequisites. Add footnotes about repeatability to indicate for courses that are repeatable how each is allowed to be repeated to meet total degree hours in that category for this specific concentration. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.
- 6) Photography Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA add a footnote on ARTS 365, 405, 443, 444, 454, 455, 456, and 457 indicating repeatability is 6 hours maximum for all. Add notation in parenthesis to ARTS 299, Spec Topics in Studio Art (3 hours) that it may be repeated up to a maximum of 12 hours total if topics vary. Add notation in parenthesis on ARTS 399, Internship in Studio Arts (3 hours) that it may be completed twice to a maximum of 4 hours total, with advisor consent). Add notation in parenthesis on ARTS 499, Special Topics in Studio Art (0 to 3 hours) that it may be repeated to a maximum of 9 hours total if topics vary. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.
- 7) Printmaking Concentration in the Studio Art BASA delete the footnote about ARTS 205, Introduction to Printmaking (3 hours), adding this language in parenthesis within the course listing. Clarify in parenthesis in the listing of ARTS 405, Special Topics in Printmaking (3 hours) that it may be repeated up to a maximum of 12 hours. In the list of courses from which students are to choose one, add in parenthesis that ARTS 405, Special Topics in Printmaking (3 hours) can be repeated for the requirement. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.
- 8) Printmaking Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA Add a heading at the top of the Program of Study table explaining the concentration requirements within the table, including the exclusion of courses taken in the first-year curriculum. Remove from the list of section titles an indication that all courses were 3 credit hours, as this is incorrect; not all are 3-hour courses. Change all references to "foundation credit" to "First-year curriculum." Add notations about ARTS 210 and 244 being in the first-year curriculum. Remove notes in parenthesis about prerequisites for ARTS 34, 351, 456, and 457 as this was redundant; students can click on the course to view prerequisites. Updated repeatability statements for ARTS 443, 444, 454, 455, 456, and 457, which did say "may repeat once/twice" when repeatability is 6 hours maximum for all; included this information as a footnote in the table for how each course is

allowed to be repeated to meet total degree hours in that category for that specific concentration. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.

- **9)** Sculpture Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA Add a heading explaining the concentration requirements and exclusion of courses taken in the first-year curriculum at the top of the degree table. Remove from the list of section titles an indication that all courses were 3 credit hours as this is incorrect; not all are 3-hour courses. Change all references to "foundation credit" to "first-year curriculum." Add notations about ARTS 210 and 280 being in the first-year curriculum. Remove notes in parenthesis about prerequisites for ARTS 310, 454, 455, and 456 as this was redundant; student can click on the course to view prerequisites. Standardize and clarify the descriptions of ARTS 299, 399, and 499. Updated repeatability statements for ARTS 405, 443, 444, 454, 455, 456, and 457 which did say "may repeat once/twice" when repeatability is 6 hours maximum for all; included this information as a footnote in the table for how each course is allowed to be repeated to meet total degree hours in that category for that specific concentration. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration or the degree.
- **10)** New Media Concentration in the Studio Art BFASA -- Add a heading explaining the concentration requirements and exclusion of courses taken in the first-year curriculum at the top of the degree table. #### A. Undergraduate Programs

- 1) Computer Engineering, BS update the list of required Foundational Mathematics and Science courses to remove CHEM 102, General Chemistry I (3 hours), CHEM 103, General Chemistry Lab I (1 hour), and MATH 286, Intro to Differential Eq plus (4 hours) and add MATH 257, Linear Algebra with Computational Applications (3) or MATH 416, Abstract Linear Algebra (3 hours) and MATH 285, Intro Differential Equations (3 hours). Total hours of Foundational Mathematics and Sciences decreases from 31 to 29 hours. Technical Electives required increase from 27 to 29 hours, and the following courses are added as options from which students can choose to fulfill these 29 hours of Technical Electives: CHEM 102, General Chemistry I (3 hours), CHEM 103, General Chemistry Lab (1 hour), ATMS 201, General Physical Meteorology (3 hours), CPSC 265, Genetic Engineering Lab (3 hours), and PSYC 204, Intro to Brain and Cognition (3 hours). MATH 415, Applied Liner Algebra (3 or 4 hours) is removed from the list of Technical Electives. These changes better calibrate requirements for this program with the Computer Science program and is in alignment with ABET accreditation requirements. There is no change in total hours required.
- 2) Electrical Engineering, BS update the list of required Foundational Mathematics and Science courses to remove MATH 286, Intro to Differential Eq plus (4 hours) and add MATH 257, Linear Algebra with Computational Applications (3) or MATH 416, Abstract Linear Algebra (3 hours) and MATH 285, Intro Differential Equations (3 hours). Total hours of Foundational Mathematics and Sciences decreases from 31 to 29 hours. Technical Electives required increase from 27 to 29 hours, and the following courses are added as options from which students can choose to fulfill these 29 hours of Technical Electives: CHEM 102, General Chemistry I (3 hours), CHEM 103, General Chemistry Lab (1 hour), ATMS 201, General Physical Meteorology (3 hours), CPSC 265, Genetic Engineering Lab (3 hours), and PSYC 204, Intro to Brain and Cognition (3 hours). MATH 415, Applied Liner Algebra (3 or 4 hours) is removed from the list of Technical Electives. These changes better calibrate requirements for this program with the Computer Science program and is in alignment with ABET accreditation requirements. There is no change in total hours required.

#### B. Graduate Programs

 Business Analytics, MS – in the list of Analytics Electives, from which students are required to take 20-24 hours, *remove* BADM 502, Communicating with Data and Decision Making (2 hours), and BADM 543, Technology Strategy (2 or 4 hours) and *add* BADM 550, Business Practicum (0-4 hours). Change the range of General Graduate Electives such that students are to select 0 to 4 hours rather than 0 to 8 hours to meet the minimum required 36 hours. There is no change in total hours required.

- 2) Corporate Governance & International Business Concentration add the MS Management program to a list of programs eligible to pursue this concentration. There are no revisions to the concentration itself and no change in hours required for the concentration or the MS Management degree program.
- 3) Information Technology & Control Concentration remove BADM 556, Electronic Commerce (4 hours) as a concentration-required course. Add BADM 562, Social Media Strategy (4 hours) to the list of courses from which students are to select to reach the minimum of 12 required for the concentration. There is no change to total hours required.
- 4) Supply Chain Management Concentration revise the list of courses from which students are to select to reach the minimum of 12 required for the concentration to *remove* BADM 560, Planning and Control Systems (4 hours); BADM 590, Seminar in Business Admin, Section OM (0 to 4 hours); and BADM 590, Seminar in Business Admin, Section SS (0 to 4 hours) and *add* BADM 564, Business Process Improvement (4 hours); BADM 565, Strategic Sourcing (4 hours); and BADM 575, Supply Chain Analytics (4 hours). There is no change to total hours required.
- 5) Business Data Analytics Concentration revise the requirements to specifically require BADM 554, Enterprise Database Management (4 hours); FIN 510, Big Data Analytics in Finance for Predictive and Causal Analysis (4 hours); and BDI 513, Data Storytelling (4 hours). Remove the choose-from list from which students selected 12 hours from BADM 554 (now specifically required), BADM 557, Business Intelligence (4 hours); BADM 562, Social Media Strategy (4 hours); BADM 571, Digital Business & IT Strategy (4 hours); BADM 573, Decision Analytics (4 hours); and BADM 577, Predictive Data Analytics (4 hours). Remove the note that course substitutions may be approved by the Department of Business Administration. There is no change to total hours required.
