Changes by section:

-Foundation: 1 credit hour decrease in unit orientation course (change from 3 to 2 hours for section).

-Physical Practice: No change in credit hours for category=18. Reconfiguration of courses (i.e. instead of separate courses for Ballet I, Ballet II, Jazz I, etc. one course per class year is proposed with varying types of dance as sections to allow for unit strategy in emphasizing diversity and inclusivity).

-Creative Process/Performance and Production: This section was previously 11 hours and is now broken into three separate sections (Creative Practice: 6 hours; Performance: 2 hours; and Production 2 hours) for a total of 10 hours. DANC 259 currently in CIM queue to increase credit hours, hence the red box which will go away once approved.

-Context: Section was previously 18 hours total and now is 19 hours total.

-Senior Capstone Project: This section was renamed 'Synthesis' and increased from 3 to 5 credit hours.

-Focused Electives: no changes, still 15 hours

SUMMARY OF CHANGES: Use of umbrella courses to allow for varied offerings of types of dance, restructuring of curriculum requirements, and a total of one credit hour increase in total number of Dance course credit hours (54 plus 15 hours of focused electives=69, previously was 68).

Program Justification

#### Why are these changes necessary?

The dance curriculum at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign was designed over 50 years ago and was built on a conservatory model. Historically, conservatory models have been biased toward Ballet and Modern and were not concerned about providing context for the forms being studied. These models typically prioritize a 'onesize fits all' standard which no longer is valid in a contemporary culture that emphasizes diversity, equity, and inclusion, and is not reflective of the department's course offerings and faculty expertise and research directions.

The Re-Imagining Ad Hoc Committee advocates for a new curriculum that better reflects our academic context as a leading Land Grant Research One, Public University, a designation that requires us to prioritize inclusivity for all. We champion the support of a wide spectrum of dance research which will open possibilities for continued growth that follows and influences contemporary perspectives. To that end we seek to revise our curriculum:

- To reflect a more global culture through a balanced exposure to a range of aesthetics.
- To better reflect the new mission statement of the Department of Dance.
- To be current and progressive both in terms of inclusivity issues and educational methods.
- To better reflect our current faculty research and expertise.
- To continue to attract and retain diverse, motivated, high-quality students
- To ensure expansion of ideas regarding dance/the body/choreography for the next generations.

• To develop a manageable schedule of classes and production that supports good mental and physical health for faculty, staff and students.

- To create the possibility for more synergy with other disciplines.
- To better align with recommendations offered by a recent external evaluation.
- To create a more efficient delivery of course content that addresses faculty work load.

Regular assessment reports based upon student surveys, as well as larger efforts such as the National Association of Schools of Dance assessment review, last completed in 2017, and Provost's Academic Review, last completed in 2021, are reviewed and analyzed, and changes/updates are implemented.

The BA curriculum in dance is designed to provide an integrated and individualized approach to undergraduate studies of dance. The degree is designed for students who want to explore interdisciplinary approaches to art-making, and/or simultaneously pursue a minor or major in another discipline. Students will study core areas in Dance: Foundations, Physical Practice, Creative Practice, Performance Production, Context, and Synthesis. Students will identify at least one other key area of interest such as Psychology, Kinesiology, Theater Studies, Music, Anthropology, Business, Art & Design, Environment, Film, Gender Studies, Cultural Studies, etc., and will choose a Major, Minor or Focused Electives in this area of study under consultation with an advisor. Under the mentorship of a faculty member, students will propose a research project to the undergraduate committee for approval. This research will culminate in a BA Senior Thesis, evidencing a synthesis of their studies within dance and another area of study.

<u>Currently, students pursuing a Dance degree at the University of Illinois must first be</u> <u>admitted to the BFA in Dance (audition required).</u> <u>Once admitted, those desiring an</u> <u>interdisciplinary education may choose to apply for admittance into the BA in Dance,</u> <u>rather than continuing in the BFA.</u> <u>The faculty will be evaluating whether to open the</u> <u>BA to be declared upon entry into the dance program for students entering in 2023–24.</u>

Specific Program requirement areas are as follows:

<u>2 credits in Foundations, 18 credits in Physical Practice, 6 credits in Creative Practice, 2</u> <u>credits in Performance, 2 credits in Production, 19 credits in Context, 5 credits in</u> <u>Synthesis, and 15 credits in Focused Electives.</u>

We have been successful in attracting a diverse student population (50 percent URM) and expect the new curriculum will further align with these students' interests and maintain our high retention rates.
