A. Graduate Programs

- 1) MA in South Asian and Middle Eastern Studies replace the final thesis requirement with an MA exam in alignment with the degree requirements of other MA humanities programs on campus. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 2) MANSC in Animal Sciences in the list of required courses, add ANSC 499, Seminar (1-4 hours) as an "or" option from which students can choose from ANSC 440, Applied Statistical Methods I (4 hours); ANSC 445, Statistical Methods (4 hours); ANSC 448, Math Modeling in Life Sciences (3-4 hours); ANSC 449, Biological Modeling (3-4 hours). An added footnote on this requirement indicates students may select an equivalent course with departmental approval and that students enrolling in ANSC 499 must enroll in the "Intro to Data Analytics" section. Revise the hours of 400- or 500-level ANSC course electives from a range of 18-19 to 18-20. There is no change to the total hours required for the program.

B. Undergraduate Programs

1) BS in Community Health – in the list of supporting electives for the BS in Community Health, update the Communications, Promotions, Public Relations & Leadership list to remove AGCM 320, Public Information Campaigns (3 hours). From the Social and Behavioral Factors list, remove GEOG/GGIS 210, Social & Environmental Issues (3 hours) and GEOG/GGIS 438, Geography of Health Care (3 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.

Program Justification

Why are these changes necessary?

An MA exam and oral defense is consistent with the requirements of other comparable programs and will demonstrate the student's knowledge across their courses of study.

Streamlining and clarifying the MA requirements has been something that the CSAMES Executive Committee has been discussing for a couple of years at least. When I became director in January, I wanted for us to move forward with this proposal so that students would have a clear idea about the requirements, given that the option of writing a thesis or taking exams was not only creating confusion, but also leading to hesitation and loss of time and energy on the part of so students.

This year's Executive Committee took up the matter again and agreed to eliminate the thesis option and to spell out a more detailed structure for the MA exams. This revision brings our MA in line with other programs in the humanities and social sciences, many of which do not require a thesis. We do not believe that the elimination of the thesis option will negatively impact students' prospects.

M.A. Exam Requirement

All CSAMES M.A. students must take a written and an oral M.A. exam at the completion of their studies. Usually, this means that the student will take exams during the spring semester of the second year in the program. The written and oral exams, taken one to two weeks apart, must be completed by April 10 for May graduation.

The Exam Committee

After consulting with the DGS, the student is responsible for assembling a committee of three faculty members, each from a different discipline. Normally, these are professors with whom the student has taken graduate seminars. The DGS serves as the Chair of the committee.

The Reading List

The exam is based on a list of 30 books, divided into three sections of 10 books each. In the fall of the second year, the student works with each examiner to compile a reading list consisting of 10 books. A number of closely related scholarly articles can substitute for a book, depending on the field. The entire reading list must be approved by the DGS before the end of the fall semester.

Before the Exam

Early in the spring semester of the second year, the student must submit to CSAMES's Office Support Associate a "Request to Schedule an M.A. Exam" form, which can be found linked to CSAMES's M.A. program website.

The Written Exam

The written portion of the MA exam is a take-home exam with 24 hours to complete. The student will receive 6 questions (2 from each committee member). The student must complete 1 question from each committee member for a total of 3 questions. The average length of the completed exam should be 15 pages (5 pages per answer). The essays should be double-spaced, in Times New Roman font size 12 or equivalent. Do not include footnotes or a bibliography. When citing sources, include only the authors' last name and page number in parenthesis, like this:

The entire committee reads and comments on every exam. Each answer is evaluated (high pass, pass, low pass, fail) by each committee member. In the event of a significant discrepancy in the evaluation of a given answer, the opinion that carries the most weight is that of the author of the question, or the expert in that discipline.

The Oral Exam

The one-hour oral exam allows the committee to meet with the student to discuss performance on the written exam and the student's future plans. The student may be asked to clarify or to elaborate on what they have written on the exam.

On Campus and Online - 2 program types. Students can receive the entire program either on campus or online. Students can choose to take courses in either modality.

Describe the use of this delivery method:

Both, the face-to-face and the online deliveries of the MANSC program encompass two types of credit hour offerings, traditional courses and seminars and mentored research studies. The face-to-face program is heavily centered on in-person, face-to-face classes and seminars series, and in-person face-to-face interactions with the faculty mentor who advises the student on the research studies project (ANSC 593). Some courses include online sections or are offered completely online, and some seminars can accommodate for remote students.

Students in the online MANSC program will register for online classes and seminars, or offerings that have dual delivery method (e.g. ANSC 422, ANSC 424, ANSC 440, ANSC 444, ANSC 445, ANSC 542, ANSC 525, ANSC 590, ANSC 591). The online course offerings are delivered through Compass 2G (Blackboard). Faculty advising of students in the online MANSC program on ANSC 593 research studies and seminars will use the Zoom platform for virtual face-to-face meetings.

The proposed revisions to the MANSC graduation requirements do not impact the admission requirements. Applications to the MANSC program require baccalaureate degree transcripts, GPA >=3, resume, personal statement, Graduate Record Examination (GRE) general test scores, and three letters of recommendation. One letter of recommendation must be provided by an Animal Sciences faculty member committed to advise the student on a particular independent studies project. A departmental committee will evaluate the applications and recommend admissions.

The proposed revisions to the MANSC graduation requirements do not impact the academic functions. The Community Health Program at the University of Illinois prepares students in the ever changing world of health care and health behavior as practitioners and offers three concentrations at the undergraduate level: Health Education & Promotion, Health Planning & Administration, and Rehabilitation Studies. All curricula are built on a foundation of general education courses which emphasize communication skills and critical thinking. The Professional Core courses are designed to help students develop skills in planning, implementation, and evaluation in the context of health services and programs. Students must complete an internship during their senior year in a setting related to the degree and their interests. Recent internship sites have included the Carle and OSF hospitals, Promise Healthcare, Champaign Urbana Public Health District, American Heart Association, and the American Red Cross Association.
