MINUTES

**I. CALL TO ORDER**

A regular meeting of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Senate was called to order at 3:10 pm with Senate Executive Committee (SEC) Chair Rob Kar (LAW) presiding and Professor Emeritus H. George Friedman, Jr. serving as Parliamentarian.

**II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**IV. PUBLIC COMMENT**

**V. SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHAIR'S REMARKS**

Chair Kar expressed concern for those suffering from the attack on Ukraine. Provost Cangellaris will speak more on this topic. However, anyone needing support or access to resources should contact the Vice Provost for International Affairs and Global Strategies, Reitumetse Mabokela.

Kar noted that Josh Whitman, the Director of Athletics will provide information about the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics (DIA) during his presentation. Athletics is an important part of the institution which interacts with the academic missions of the University in various ways.

Today's agenda also includes an item to revise the *Bylaws* for the Senate Committee on Educational Policy (EP). This item, SP.20.05, has taken several years to develop and results from collaborative efforts to develop a more effective method to handle EP proposals. The revision seeks to address several issues in one document so it may not fully satisfy every senator and every stakeholder. Kar specifically noted that the Council of Undergraduate Deans was invited to participate in the process. Kar expressed pride in the work that was led by EP Chair Linda Moorhouse and the Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures (SP) Chair, Shawn Gilmore.

**VI. CHANCELLOR’S REMARKS**

Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Provost, Andreas Cangellaris gave remarks in the absence of the Chancellor. Cangellaris expressed sadness and shock in response to Putin’s attack on Ukraine. Illinois International and the Office of Student Affairs have reached out directly to students, faculty, staff, and scholars from Russia and Ukraine that may need support. Information about the crisis was also sent to all study abroad students, and any faculty and staff members that are in Europe. Please look for announcements about upcoming events about the crisis in Ukraine to engage and learn more.

About two weeks ago, the Office of the Chancellor and Office of the Provost received reports of antisemitic and hateful flyers inside plastic bags filled with small rocks that started appearing across campus. These flyers were unacceptable attacks on our Jewish community. A response was issued quickly and strongly to condemn the antisemitic and hateful behavior and make it clear that it is not acceptable. The University of Illinois Police Department (UIPD) is seeking information about the individuals that were distributing the antisemitic messages.

Last week the University community moved into another phase in the COVID-19 pandemic. Positive cases have continued to drop, and the positivity rate is well below 1% on a regular basis. Governor Pritzker removed the mask mandate. The post spring break testing requirement for students is one negative on campus test result. Students have until March 25 to receive one negative test result before access is denied. Travel always increases the risk of transmission of COVID-19. Cangellaris recommended that anyone who chooses to travel during spring break be tested when they return to campus.

the proposed revisions and consulted with the Council of Undergraduate Deans while working with SP on the specific language changes.

**XI. DIVISION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS PRESENTATION**

Josh Whitman, Director of Athletics, introduced himself and presented information on the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics (DIA). Whitman also introduced his colleagues, Deputy Athletic Director Warren Hood, and Chief Operating Office Roger Denny.

DIA's mission is to Unify. Develop. Inspire. Achieve. Whitman gave a broad overview of the history of Illinois' athletics program. The athletics program is about 130 years old. Illinois is the founding member of what is currently called the Big 10 Conference which predates the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association). Illinois was the charter member of the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA.

Current affiliations include the NCAA Division I, Football Bowl Subdivision ("FBS") which is divided, and Illinois is part of the Autonomy 5 ("Power 5"). The Autonomy 5 is further subdivided, and Illinois is a member of the Big 10 Conference.

Sponsored sports include 21 varsity sports with almost 500 student-athletes participating. There are 11 sponsored women's sports and 10 sponsored men's sports.

On the staff side, there are almost 300 full-time staff members. This includes 73 coaches of which 17 are head coaches. There are also over 1,100 part-time staff. DIA is also responsible for over 20 major facilities with an annual budget of approximately \$125 million (8<sup>th</sup> in the Big Ten).

DIA Oversight. Whitman reports directly to Chancellor Jones. DIA works regularly with Michael DeLorenzo (Vice Chancellor for Administration and Operations), the Athletic Board, and the Faculty Athletics Representatives (FAR). The NCAA requires the FAR positions. Currently, Brenda Lindsey and Tiffany White are serving in the FAR positions.

The Athletic Board ensures that DIA is advancing the University's academic and educational objectives, and serves as an advisory body to the Chancellor and Athletic Director in various operational areas.

Academic excellence is very important to DIA. Illinois student-athletes posted a 95% graduation success rate in comparison to the campus rate of 85%. For 23 consecutive semesters, Illinois student-athletes have earned a combined GPA of 3.0 or higher. During the 2020-2021 academic year, all student-athletes recorded a 3.35 GPA which is the highest on record.

Breanna Robinson serves as the Senior Associate Director for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Along with a committee of more than 30 staff and coaches, Robinson works to develop programming and policies to make DEI a priority in the DIA.

Revenue and expenses are highly concentrated. On the revenue side, DIA operates at approximately \$130 million. Media rights, contributions, and ticket sales make-up most of the revenues. Expenses primarily include compensations, facilities, and student aid. DIA receives no operational funding from the State of Illinois, the University of Illinois System, nor the Urbana-Champaign campus. There is a student fee that is mostly used to support Memorial Stadium which is a historic landmark and requires a lot of upkeep.

Whitman explained the facilities financing and debt structures. Every dollar DIA are going to use must be in place before the project can begin. There are some internal loans where debt is held by the University of Illinois System, but most debt is held through bonds which is a third-party system.

Athletic success can touch every corner of our campus including 1) The profile and reputation of the entire University is lifted, 2) More highly qualified people want to become Fighting Illini, 3) The campus feels different, 4) Donated dollars increase – not only to the athletic program, but to the entire University, 5) Advancing diversity and inclusion interests across campus, 6) Champaign-Urbana and the surrounding communities benefit, and 7) Student-athletes' lives are changed.

Faculty senator Riechers (ACES) asked if former basketball or football players had ever been considered for coaching positions. Whitman indicated that he and his staff do discuss former players when a vacancy comes up on the coaching staff. There are several alumni that are part of the DIA staff.

Faculty senator Junge (LAS) inquired about challenges within DIA. Whitman responded that there are several high-level changes that are happening with college athletics. Whitman noted that challenges and issues that DIA faces including name-image-likeness (financial use of athletes' likeness), the NCAA Vs. Alston (Supreme Court, 2021) decision,

student-athlete employment, transfer portal (new open transfer rules), College Football Playoff (CFP) expansion, and conference realignment.

Faculty senator Bosak-Schroeder (LAS) asked how a faculty member becomes an FAR. Whitman noted that the FARs are appointed by the Chancellor and approved by the Board of Trustees. They serve up to two five-year terms.

Faculty senator Dominguez (LAS) questioned why there are so many more male athletes than female athletes. Dominguez asked for data on the difference between the academic success of students in revenue generating sports versus students in non-revenue generating sports. Whitman indicated that Title IX requires that opportunities be offered to female athletes that are substantially proportionate to the rate at which females enroll in the undergraduate population. Football does skew things slightly towards a larger male population. There is a subcommittee of the Athletic Board, the Academic Progress and Eligibility Committee (APEC), that monitors academic progress of all athletes.

Faculty senator Steinrock (FAA) asked what kind of conversations are happening around the indigenous name of the teams and possibly a mascot. Whitman stated that it is his understanding that the name Fighting Illini was in reference to the soldiers and Memorial Stadium, and not tied to an indigenous people.

GP.22.04 Guidelines on Departmental Statements

**BACKGROUND**

The Senate Committee on General University Policy has been discussing the practice of departments, or other university units, issuing statements on a host of campus or public issues, which some might consider “political.” We believe that it is time to develop some clear guidelines for the issuing of such statements – while supporting the right of individual faculty and departments or other units to do so. We ask the Senate to consider and approve these guidelines.

From time to time, events occur, or debates arise, that motivate committed faculty members to want their department to make a public statement on some issue or controversy. The right of faculty as individuals to express such positions is protected by academic freedom. At the same time, however, several states are considering proposals to end tenure or to curtail academic freedom, stemming in part from the impression that universities have become overly “politicized.” The current efforts to limit the teaching of what is misleadingly characterized as “critical race theory” is one example. These challenges make it all the more important that we defend the principle of academic freedom, while also recognizing the need to protect the best interests of the institution.

In an effort to balance both priorities – the protection of both academic freedom and institutional integrity – we propose several guidelines that reduce the risk of departmental or other unit statements on controversial matters being mischaracterized in ways that might harm the unit or the university.

We recommend starting with principles laid out by the American Association of University Professors, which begin with the principle that faculty are entitled to academic freedom, including the right to speak out freely as individuals on matters of public controversy. At the same time, the AAUP’s own standards for [academic freedom](#) say, “Hence they should at all times be accurate, should exercise appropriate restraint, should show respect for the opinions of others, and should make every effort to indicate that they are not speaking for the institution.” This balance recommended by the AAUP forms the basis of our recommended guidelines.

According to the AAUP, individual faculty members clearly have the right to speak freely when they are representing their own views as individuals. But a department (college, school, or other unit) is by definition an institutional entity. Therefore, when a statement is issued on

behalf of a department or other unit, especially when it is posted on a public university web site, it needs to be clear that the statement does not represent the institution or any other unit.

Moreover, a departmental statement risks silencing or misrepresenting the voices of faculty holding a minority view, as well as staff and students who are members of the department but who may not have had an opportunity to express their views on the statement. Even when there appears to be some consensus on the view expressed, departmental discussions of the issue may have unwittingly coerced vulnerable department members, especially but not only junior faculty who may be hesitant to speak against the perceived majority.

The publication of departmental statements on political issues may also risk creating an unwelcome environment for potential students or others who hold contrasting positions or world views, or even discriminating against them. At times, departmental statements may be viewed as hostile toward members of particular groups. Such risks have consequences not only for the department, but for the wider university. While faculty as citizens have the same rights of free speech as anyone, *as faculty* they have responsibilities toward students and others that need to be weighed when supporting such statements.

Finally, certain matters might be perceived by some as “political” while still falling within a unit's academic scope and mission (e.g., “We are committed to protecting the rights of faculty to teach critical race theory” or “In this department, we teach evolution and climate change as established scientific truths”). Similarly, position statements on matters of internal university policy might also be deemed “political,” even though they are protected under academic freedom (e.g., “We take issue with this position by the Board of Trustees” or “We respect the rights of all members of the campus community, regardless of gender identity”). However, statements on issues characterized by the AAUP as “extramural,” which they define as faculty speaking “as citizens” – namely, issues of broader state, national, or international policy – are more explicitly “political” because they are engaging issues beyond the campus. Statements on such extramural matters can be especially controversial and polarizing.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

The Senate Committee on General University Policy recommends the Senate approve the following.

(1) The faculty of the unit should consider carefully whether or not the statement truly does represent the full membership of the unit (including staff and students). In every case, the “we” needs to be identified in relation to who is actually making the decision to put forth the statement, and who is or is not authorized to speak on behalf of others.

Recommendation: Unit bylaws should clearly set out a process to be followed before issuing any such statements as the position of the unit. This process should follow shared governance principles of consultation and participation, and aim to determine the extent to which the statement does represent the position of unit members.

Recommendation: In order to avoid giving any false impression of unanimity, in many cases it would be better to issue a statement with a list of signatories rather than to issue a statement purporting to represent the entire department or unit. For example, the statement might say, “We, the undersigned, believe X, Y, Z. We are speaking as individuals and are not representing or speaking for our department (unit, etc).”

(2) Units should be mindful that any statement on matters of public controversy might be interpreted by some audiences as an official university position. News coverage or other portrayals of a unit’s statement, or when several units post similar statements, may be taken as representative of the wider institution. Moreover, units should carefully consider the potential impact of their statements on current students, who may feel that their views are not represented; and on some prospective students, who might feel that the university would not be a welcoming place for them. For all these reasons, a statement by a unit as such has serious potential consequences that need to be taken into consideration in how it is formulated and expressed.

Recommendation: In order to prevent any misunderstanding, the unit should always add an explicit disclaimer that its statement or position does not represent the university as a whole. For example, “This departmental (or unit) statement should not be taken as an official position of the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.”

(3) It could be detrimental to the well-being of the unit, and of the university as a whole, if units are seen as taking positions gratuitously on a range of state, national, or international policy matters that have no overt relationship with their academic missions. That could easily become a slippery slope, since there are many, many issues (across the political spectrum) about which faculty might have strong opinions. As individuals, they always have a right to express those views; but committing a department or other unit to such positions must meet a higher bar of relevance.

Recommendation: In cases where a unit, as such, is taking a position on what the AAUP calls “extramural” issues it is strongly recommended that such a statement clarify how the position is directly related to the unit’s academic scope and mission.

SP.21.11 Proposed Revisions to the *Constitution*, Article VI, Section 7 and the *Bylaws*, Parts A.1-9, B.1-5, and D.1.c.1 (Presiding Officer)

**BACKGROUND**

Responding to Recommendation #3 of the Report of the Eighth Senate Review Commission (XSR.19.01), both the Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures (SP) and the Senate Committee on General University Policy (GP) discussed who should preside over Senate meetings. Both committees determined that the Senate Executive Committee (SEC) Chair or the Chair's designee should serve as the presiding officer for the business portion of Senate meetings, during which the Senate votes on proposals and receives reports. SP presented this revision to the *Bylaws*, Part A as SP.20.17, which was passed by the Senate at its November 16, 2020 meeting.

The *Bylaws*, Part A.1 currently read:

The Chair of the Senate Executive Committee or the Chair's designee shall preside at Senate meetings. The Chancellor or the Chancellor's designee shall be invited to give remarks and respond to questions from senators, unless the Senate Executive Committee has provided otherwise.

During its deliberations, SP considered an additional possible option for the presiding officer of the Senate: an elected Speaker of the Senate. The Eighth Senate Review Commission noted a Speaker as a potential option; however, SP determined that moving to a Speaker model would require some time and attention to the Senate's governing documents. Further, as was noted during the discussion of SP.20.17, a governance model that included a Speaker of the Senate and a SEC Chair might lead to complications unless well-defined.

SP gathered input on this matter via a Committee of the Whole discussion by the Senate at its April 26, 2021 meeting. Generally, there was a consensus that the Senate would welcome a proposed Speaker position, provided that such a position was well-defined and integrated into the Senate's governing documents. The proposed changes below would establish a Presiding Officer position, modeled after what is at use in the Chicago Senate.

**RECOMMENDATION**

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends the approval of the following revisions to the *Constitution* and the *Bylaws*. The revision to the

*Bylaws* will not become effective until the revision to the *Constitution* is approved by the Board of Trustees. Text to be deleted is ~~struck through~~ and text to be added is underlined. Adoption of amendments to the *Bylaws* requires a two-thirds vote of the Senate.

**REVISION TO THE *CONSTITUTION*, ARTICLE VI, SECTION 7**

1 Section 7. The Presiding Officer of the Senate shall be a member of the Senate electorate, but  
2 not a current senator, and shall be elected as prescribed in the Senate *Bylaws*. The Presiding  
3 Officer of the Senate shall chair all Senate meetings. In the absence of the Presiding Officer of  
4 the Senate from the chair, the Presiding Officer’s designee shall preside. The Presiding Officer’s  
5 designee must meet the same eligibility criteria as the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer of  
6 the Senate may not make or second motions, participate in debate, or vote on any matter,  
7 except in the event of a tie. In this event, the Presiding Officer of the Senate may cast the  
8 deciding vote, even if the Presiding Officer of the Senate is not a voting member of the Senate.

SP.22.04 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Nondiscrimination Statement

**BACKGROUND**

The State of Illinois Human Rights Act (775 ILCS 5/2-103) was amended in 2021 to include “arrest record” as a protected class, effective August 2021:

Sec. 2-103. Arrest record.

(A) Unless otherwise authorized by law, it is a civil rights violation for any employer, employment agency or labor organization to inquire into or to use an arrest record, as defined under subsection (B-5) of Section 1-103, as a basis to refuse to hire, to segregate, or to act with respect to recruitment, hiring, promotion, renewal of employment, selection for training or apprenticeship, discharge, discipline, tenure or terms, privileges or conditions of employment. This Section does not prohibit a State agency, unit of local government or school district, or private organization from requesting or utilizing sealed felony conviction information obtained from the Illinois State Police under the provisions of Section 3 of the Criminal Identification Act or under other State or federal laws or regulations that require criminal background checks in evaluating the qualifications and character of an employee or a prospective employee.

(B) The prohibition against the use of an arrest record, as defined under paragraph (1) of subsection (B-5) of Section 1-103, contained in this Act shall not be construed to prohibit an employer, employment agency, or labor organization from obtaining or using other information which indicates that a person actually engaged in the conduct for which he or she was arrested.

This proposed revision to the *Statutes* would include “arrest record” in the Nondiscrimination Statement, aligning them with state law.

**RECOMMENDATION**

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Nondiscrimination Statement.

SC.22.11 Report on the March 17, 2022 Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois System in Urbana

Chairman Don Edwards called the meeting to order and began with a virtual violin performance of the state song, "Illinois," performed by Noah Kublank.

President Tim Killeen introduced guests and observers. He discussed that we have made progress with Covid-19 through the hard work of our faculty and staff. President Killeen discussed during the listening tour across Illinois, citizens voiced needs and that there is a role for a public university system in closing the equity gaps. President Killeen noted there are many initiatives to support access to higher education including "Access 2030" with a goal to increase URM student graduates by 50% build on on-going efforts. Each university will create its own plan: readiness, retention, and graduation/success. Innovative online and distance education efforts in both our rural and urban areas of the state will provide opportunities for those who lack access. The President highlighted the INN digital ecosystem initiative in Cairo, IL as an example of an underdeveloped community. Also, in Illinois there are disparities in access to health care across the state which can be impacted by the new health diagnostic services provided to two neighborhoods near Midway Airport. President Killeen also discussed investing with a mission-aligned strategy.

Chancellor Robert Jones provided a welcome and an update from Urbana. We are in a new normal that we learn to live with Covid and any new variants, but we know better than to tempt fate, so we are continuing to monitor the virus. Chancellor Jones shared some campus highlights including 14 new faculty elected to the AAAS, and 3 faculty to the National Academy of Engineering. Chancellor Jones reviewed the commission of a portrait of Albert Lee and celebration of his impact to black students at Illinois. Chancellor Jones reviewed that the most Illini Success report was released and found 75% of graduates who have found a first destination did so in the state of Illinois. Chancellor Jones shared appreciation of President Killeen for sharing the results of his five-year review and thanked his staff for working together as a team to bring a bold vision to the university.

Chair Edwards presented the Award the Board of Trustees' Distinguished Service Medallion to Dedra Moody Williams.

Professor Fisher, USC, shared a presentation entitled "Online & Hybrid Education: What have we learned?" to improve student satisfaction of online learning. Professor Fisher highlighted that the system has engaged in online innovation since the 1990's.

The four Board Committee reports provided background to various items on the action agenda for today.

Public comments were presented, for five minutes each. One graduate student speaker discussed creation of limits for Department Chair remarks about situations where someone breaks the law. Proposed a compliance officer that professors or other employees could contact if there is a claim of impropriety.

14. Establish the Bachelor of Science in Food Science, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Urbana
15. Establish the Bachelor of Science in Hospitality Management, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Urbana
16. Establish the Bachelor of Science in Nutrition and Health, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Urbana
27. Eliminate the Bachelor of Science in Food Science and Human Nutrition, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Urbana

28. Eliminate the Master of Science in Plant Biotechnology, Professional Science Master's Concentration, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences and the Graduate College, Urbana

President Killeen closed with final comments and reflection of the violence and disregard for human life in Ukraine and campus leaders are reaching out to those affected by the violence.

Chair Edwards shared words from President Killeen about the war in Ukraine previously shared with the university stakeholders and asked that the Board reflect on the impact to students from Ukraine, Russia and countries surrounding Ukraine taking in refugees from the war. Chair Edwards noted the Men's Basketball team earned the first Big Ten season Championship since 2005 and play in the NCAA tournament tomorrow.

The meeting adjourned at 11:21 am.
