The prior requirement of 10 credit hours of MSE courses could be fulfilled by 6 hours of seminar credits (which are also required), plus one 4 credit hour graduate course in MSE. The new requirement (18 credit hours of MSE courses) better reflects that this masters degree is in Materials Science and Engineering; students will be able to fulfill the new requirement with 6 hours of seminar credits and three 4 credit hour graduate courses in MSE.

Student learning is assessed based mainly on their course grades, GPA, annual graduate student reviews, and placement upon graduation based on exit surveys. Program Justification

Why are these changes necessary?

The Minor launched in the fall of 2020 with tracks in 1) Law & Politics, 2) Law & Cultures, and 3) Law & the Economics of Food Security and Sustainability. The Minor designated courses for each of the three tracks. The minor is interdisciplinary, and the designated courses are not only offered by the College of Law, but by different units in LAS and ACES.

Even with a minimum GPA requirement, the minor has been popular; we are now maintaining enrollment of about 150 students.

We continue to identify additional courses that would be appropriate for students to complete in the two most popular tracks, Law & Politics and Law & Cultures. This proposal seeks formal permission to add these courses.

Adding the designated courses will give students the flexibility to select courses that are of particular interest as they move forward to complete the minor. It will also add options for students who may need or wish to complete the minor in a shorter timeframe. We have the permission of all units and instructors for the classes we seek to add.

The Legal Studies minor, administered by the College of Law, is designed to provide students with a better understanding of how the law operates in a variety of contexts and develop critical thinking skills. The minor requires 18 hours of credit, with nine hours of core courses taught by College of Law professors and affiliated faculty, and an additional nine hours in one of three tracks: 1) Law & Politics; 2) Law & Cultures; or 3) Law & Economics of Food Security and Sustainability.

6 credit hours must be in 300- or 400- level courses. Other qualifying 300- or 400level courses may be approved in consultation with the minor advisor. Students must have completed 30 credit hours prior to application, have Academic Good Standing status, and have a cumulative 3.25 GPA or higher.

Depending on the goals of the minor, there might be other philosophy courses that would be reasonable to add, such as logic (if one goal is to improve legal reasoning), philosophy of science (if you're thinking about e.g. patent & tech law or environmental law), the moral theory courses, and even metaphysics (since questions of what is a person, what is a mental state, and what is causation are all prominent in metaphysics and matter in the law).

There is definitely room for more students in bioethics. I can't speak to the other courses. Incidentally: If we had more faculty (especially of the right sort), it would be really neat to offer more advanced courses in bioethics, including specifically about the overlap between legal and philosophical issues in bioethics, and in other areas of special legal concern, such as environmental ethics / justice / law; race & gender; technology; etc.

Dear Karin,

The College of Fine and Applied Arts supports a modification to the Informatics Minor which limits Art & Design majors in their election of Informatics Minor electives. We acknowledge that the Office of the Provost requires at least six hours of advanced course credit be distinct from credit earned for another major or minor. As the degree audit system is unable to accurately track this policy, Art & Design majors who are seeking Informatics Minors are inaccurately tracking their degree requirements in their individual degree audits.

As such, we support the development of different requirements as the Informatics Minor has done with ECE, CS, IS/IT majors and CS minors. Effective for the 2022-2023 academic catalog year, students completing a major in the School of Art & Design and a minor in Informatics must complete three upper-level Informatics-related courses outside of the ARTD or ARTS curricula.

Students in the 2021-2022 and earlier catalog years may pursue a minor modification form to address this deficiency in the degree audit system.
