MINUTES

I. ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FACULTY

Senate Executive Committee (SEC) Chair Rob Kar (LAW) called the Annual Meeting of the Faculty to order at 3:10 pm.

WELCOME

Rob Kar, Senate Executive Committee Chair, noted that many people have made positive comments on the quality of the current state of shared governance.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

University of Illinois System President Timothy Killeen gave the following remarks. The System was able to successfully finish an academic year during a pandemic. Everyone must remain diligent in COVID-19 mitigation to remain as safe as possible.

Enrollment is at 94,750 across the System which is an all-time record. Enrollment has exceeded the strategic plan. Killeen is extremely proud of the excellence, scale, and commitment at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Over the last year many colleagues have received a number of awards. One award granted to the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign was the APLU (Association of Public and Land-grant Universities) inaugural Research Response to a Community in Crisis Award for the COVID SHIELD testing response. SHIELD testing and technology is being provided to every school across the state through a partnership with Governor Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Public Health. Testing has also been deployed to major companies in the state and outside the state to Kentucky, Maine, California, and New Zealand.

Modernization and refurbishment of the campus is underway. A system wide initiative began in the summer of 2018 to complete 500 capital projects valued at over \$4 billion over ten years. So far about 140 projects have been completed across the three universities. On the Urbana-Champaign campus, several ribbon cuttings have been held including the Siebel Center for Design and the Campus Instructional Facility. The state continues to grow the Illinois Innovation Network (IIN) and Discovery Partners Institute (DPI).

President Killeen reported on his state tour that will become an annual trip. The University has work to do in the state. Many young people are feeling left behind and do not see themselves in a 21st century economy in both rural and urban areas, and there are issues of violence in urban areas. The role of a public

comprehensive, research-intensive, land-grant university is pivotally important as we generate human welfare into the future. In the deep southern part of the state has very fertile soil and can grow many things, but people there have food and health insecurities.

The University has done well and is doing well, but there is still work to do. Fundraising efforts have yielded \$400 million in cash donations and approximately \$450 million in new business. This is the second time in the 85 years of The Foundation that both categories have reached over \$400 million. Fundraising is one year ahead of where the goal was set.

The budget the Board of Trustees recently approved provides \$7.18 billion for the System. Killeen is working with the state to garner additional support. This budget continues to prioritize access and affordability. Tuition was frozen again this year. System wide \$448 million dollars is set aside for scholarships and financial aid.

Thank you for all that you have done and continue to do. A post-pandemic University is on the horizon.

CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS

Chancellor Robert Jones thanked everyone that has committed to being part of the Senate and continue to participate in shared governance. COVID-19 has reminded everyone how important collaboration through shared governance is to our University.

Jones highlighted several events that have continued to move this University forward. The Carle Illinois College of Medicine is the first engineering based medical school in the world. The College of Medicine is in its fourth year. The accreditation visits to achieve full accreditation and the first graduating class of MD's is coming up this year. These individuals will go out and continue to innovate the medical field.

Jones is proud of the outstanding research that is being done to address food insecurity issues. The USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) sent someone to visit the University to review the world class research that has unlocked the genetic secrets of photosynthesis and crop production.

The University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign is a member of the Chicago Quantum Exchange (CQE) which will become the epicenter for quantum research. The University of Illinois has also returned to being one of the top institutions receiving support from the National Science Foundation (NSF).

The newly renamed Humanities Research Institute (HRI) has been awarded a \$5 million grant from the Andrew Mellon Foundation to lead a consortium of sixteen institutes to explore the contributions of humanities to the workplace.

Jones expressed excitement about Illini Hall as the new Digital Science Center. The Call to Action Research Program was initiated a year ago in response to the death of George Floyd and other injustices in society. Twenty-two projects are being funded and will soon be announced. The University has exceeded the \$2.2 billion fundraising goal. This is this largest goal in the history of the University and was achieved almost a year ahead of schedule. Jones highlighted several ribbon cuttings and a groundbreaking; a transformational experience for faculty and students for generations to come.

OPEN DISCUSSION

Student senator Kelo (FAA) asked about funding for the cultural houses. Chancellor Jones replied that it is about finding the right opportunities to finance these critically important assets and in a strategic way. Strategically and thoughtfully go about finding the resources that would not only allow investment in the programs, but the facilities that house these important programs.

Faculty senator Roseman (LAS) asked if the Illinois System is planning to expand their presence into the Quad Cities. President Killeen noted that he has visited the Quad Cities a few times. Deere has a strong presence in the Quad Cities. Killeen noted that he has been in contact with colleagues at Deere to determine how to optimize a relationship with this digitally prominent and astute company. There have been conversations with other stakeholders about the existing and future role of the University of Illinois. Killeen has been in contact with Western University about how the University of Illinois can help them through the Illinois Innovation Network (IIN) that is spreading across the state.

Student senator Davidson (LAS) asked about black student enrollment and retention. President Killen noted that an annual recruitment event was just held in Chicago, the SSA (Salute to Academic Achievement) event. This event is focused on recruiting Illinois' most talented students in underrepresented minority groups. The students are attending the SSA event are predominately black. The financial piece is often the reason those that are recruited do not enroll. Therefore, affordability and accessibility are very important. There have been small gains, but there is more work to do. Chancellor Jones noted that this year, more offers of admissions were made to black and brown students than ever before, but unfortunately, the yield rate was not where we wanted it. When interviews were conducted, it comes back to the financial issues that President Killen spoke about. COVID-19 has had a disparate impact on black and brown

communities. The Illinois Commitment has had a positive impact on black and brown communities by offering four years of tuition and fees to Illinois residents whose families makes \$67,100 or less per year. The Illinois Scholars Program is a bridge program for historically underserved students.

10/18/21-11 Stephanie Sanders-Smith (EDUC) nominated herself from the floor to fill the faculty vacancy on the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure (AF). There were no additional nominations from the floor and nominations were declared closed.

10/18/21-12 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, proposal CC.22.13 was approved as amended with 100 in favor, 2 opposed, and 4 abstentions.

10/18/21-13 SP.19.15* Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article IV, Section 1 – The Department, Section 2 – Department Organized with a Chair, Section 3 – Department Organized with a Head, and Section 4 – Change of Departmental Organization

On behalf of the Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures (SP), Chair Gilmore introduced SP.19.15 for a first reading. Gilmore noted that a large portion of this proposal focuses on reorganization of Section 2 and Section 3 to make it easier to compare a department chair versus a department head. There is also new language included that clarifies how the internal structures should be constrained. Gilmore added a reminder on the approval process of proposed revisions to the *Statutes*. A short discussion followed. Chair Gilmore indicated he would share today's feedback with SP.

10/18/21-14 SP.20.23* Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article I, Section 5 – Chancellors and Vice Presidents, Article II, Section 3a(1) – Faculty Role in Governance, and Article III, Section 1 – The University

On behalf of SP, Chair Gilmore introduced SP.20.23 for a first reading. Gilmore noted this proposal adds language to clarify advice surrounding reviews of administrators. A short discussion followed.

10/18/21-15 SP.21.09* Revision to the *Bylaws*, Part F.5 (Evaluation of the Chancellor)

On behalf of SP, Chair Gilmore introduced and moved approval of SP.21.09. This proposal is in response to the recent revisions to the *Statutes* that added a formal review of the Chancellor in addition to the annual review process.

10/18/21-16 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, proposal SP.21.09 was approved with 116 in favor, 0 opposed, and 9 abstentions. The required two-thirds vote of the senators present and voting was reached.

10/18/21-17 RS.21.01* Resolution to Review Policies on Classroom Contact Tracing

Faculty senator Rosenstock (LAS) introduced and moved approval of RS.21.01. The motion was seconded, and a robust discussion followed.

Chair Kar relinquished chairing the meeting to Vice-Chair Dallesasse to participate in discussion of the resolution.

10/18/21-18 Faculty senator made a motion through the Zoom chat feature to end debate. The motion was seconded, and a vote was immediately taken.

10/18/21-19 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, the motion to end debate was approved with 90 in favor, 18 opposed, and 2 abstentions. The required two-thirds vote of the senators present and voting was reached.

10/18/21-20 Through the online voting system Poll Everywhere, resolution RS.21.01 failed with 25 in favor, 77 opposed, and 7 abstentions.

SP.19.15 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article IV, Section 1 – The Department, Section 2 – Department Organized with a Chair, Section 3 – Department Organized with a Head, and Section 4 – Change of Departmental Administrative Organization

BACKGROUND

Currently, *Statutes* Article IV (Departments), Sections 1 (The Department), 2 (Department Organized with a Chair), 3 (Department Organized with a Head), and 4 (Change of Departmental Administrative Organization), especially Sections 2 and 3, are unclear, incoherent, not parallel, and generally confusing. Proposed revisions put current items, all of which have been retained or revised, in a more logical, consistent, and coherent order, and strengthens shared governance in academic and research matters that directly affect faculty.

The department is the primary unit of education and administration (*Statutes*, Article IV, Section 1a). A proposed change in Section 1a would provide an additional opportunity for faculty participation. Specifically, any academic appointment in a department would be made with the prior advice of the faculty.

A department may be organized administratively either with a chair or with a head (Section 1c). Current *Statutes* provide for the annual appointment of a chair (Section 2a) and for the appointment of a head (Section 3a) without specified term, but do not provide a consultative process for the initial appointment of a chair or head.

Proposed changes to Sections 2 and 3, therefore, would provide an opportunity to strengthen shared governance and promote diverse representation. Specifically, proposed changes in the initial appointment of a chair (Section 2) or head (Section 3) would require the dean to seek advice of a committee selected by the faculty of the department. These changes align with the current procedure for the initial appointment of a chancellor/vice president, in which a committee is selected by the senate to advise the president (*Statutes*, Article I, Section 5). Similar to that procedure, and to the recently senate-approved proposal regarding the initial appointments of a dean, director, and campus librarian (SP.19.14), this proposal does not specify the composition of the advisory committee or the advisory process. Instead, it provides an opportunity for faculty from the department to participate in the search carried out by the dean, which typically involves other interested parties.

Other proposed changes to Sections 2 and 3 would provide transparency to avoid potential conflicts of interest. Specifically, a) the chair or head of the department would continue to be

an *ex officio* member of the departmental executive or advisory committee, but not chair that committee; rather, the chair of the committee would be chosen by and from elected members (Sections 2 and 3); b) the executive committee would advise on the annual appointment of the chair (Section 2); c) the performance of the head would be reviewed annually, while still being evaluated formally at least once every five years (Section 3).

A proposed change to Section 4 would provide another opportunity for faculty to vote on a change of the administrative organization of the department. Specifically, the revision would add the initial appointment of a department chair or head to the circumstances in which the administrative organization of the department may be changed from a chair to a head or from a head to a chair.

RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Article IV, Section 1, Section 2, Section 3, and Section 4.

4 administration. It is established for the purpose of ~~carrying on~~ conducting programs of
5 instruction, research, and public service in a particular field of knowledge. The staff of a
6 department includes ~~persons~~ individuals of all ranks who, upon the recommendation of its chair
7 or head or chair, are appointed or assigned to it. The faculty of a department shall be as
8 specified in Article II, Section 3a of these *Statutes*. ~~All~~ Any appointments ~~which that carry carries~~
9 academic rank, ~~title~~, or tenure indicative ~~in any way~~ of departmental association shall be made
10 ~~only~~ with the ~~concurrence~~ prior advice of the ~~department(s) concerned~~ faculty.
- 11 b. The department has the fullest measure of autonomy consistent with the maintenance of

13 relations with other divisions of the university. ~~Should~~ If a dispute arises between the
14 department and another unit of the university concerning the proper limits of this autonomy,
15 then the department may appeal for a ruling directly to the dean and the executive committee
16 of the college and, when the chancellor/vice president considers it proper, to the

17 chancellor/vice president, who shall make a decision after appropriate consultation with
18 interested parties.

19 c. A department may be organized either with a chair or with a head. A reorganization of the
20 administration ~~structure~~ of a department from a chair to a head, or a head to a chair, may be
21 accomplished only by Section 4 of this Article.

24 a. The chair shall be appointed annually by the Board of Trustees on recommendation ~~of~~ by the
25 chancellor/vice president, with the concurrence of the president, after confidential
26 consultations with the dean of the college, ~~and with~~ the executive committee of the
27 department, and the faculty of the department concerned. Prior to the initial appointment of a
28 department chair, a committee that is selected by the faculty of the department, according to
29 its bylaws, shall advise the dean on the appointment. The performance of the chair shall be

SP.20.23 Proposed Revisions to the *Statutes*, Article I, Section 5 – Chancellors and Vice Presidents, Article II, Section 3a(1) – Faculty Role in Governance, and Article III, Section 1g – The University

BACKGROUND

Articles II and III of the *Statutes* specify that the faculty of the university includes those administrators who are in the direct line of responsibility for academic affairs, specifically directors, deans, provost (vice chancellor for academic affairs), chancellor/vice president, and president. Department chairs and heads are not specified in this direct line of responsibility in II.3, though their duties in Article IV indicate such responsibilities. Proposed revisions specify department chairs and heads as being in the direct line of responsibility for academic affairs.

The *Statutes* also specify that at least once every five years there shall be evaluations of the department chair (Article IV, Section 2a), the department head (Article IV, Section 3a), the dean of a college (Article III, Section 3b), and the campus librarian (Article VI, Paragraph e). The *Statutes* do not currently provide for regular evaluations of the vice chancellor for academic affairs and provost and only recently (ST-77, approved by the Board of Trustees in November 2020) provide for a “formal review” of the chancellor/vice president.

The following proposed revisions to the *Statutes* would establish clearer language, addressing both matters, establishing and clarifying the senate’s role in the advice and review process of appointing and retaining chancellors, vice chancellors, and provosts. Evaluation of an administrator, especially one who is in the direct line of responsibility for academic affairs, is essential for the good of an organization, giving members of the organization an opportunity to voice their suggestions and recommendations. The proposed policy changes are not directed at any individuals currently in these affected positions. SP recommends, therefore, that a performance evaluation be implemented at least once every five years *after* the next initial appointment of the vice chancellor for academic affairs and provost or the chancellor/vice president, unless the incumbent vice chancellor or chancellor agrees otherwise. We further recommend that each university develop general procedures to guide it in its implementation of the evaluation.

RECOMMENDATION

The Senate Committee on University Statutes and Senate Procedures recommends approval of the following revisions to the *Statutes*, Article I, Section 5; Article II, Section 3a(1); and Article III, Section 1g. Text to be deleted is ~~struck through~~ and text to be added is underlined.

4 be a vice president of the system (chancellor/vice president). The chancellor/vice president,
5 under the direction of the president, shall serve as the chief executive officer for the university.
6 The chancellor/vice president shall perform such duties as may be delegated and assigned by
7 the president and ~~may be~~ are consistent with the *Statutes* of the University of Illinois System,
8 *The General Rules*, and actions of the Board of Trustees. As system officers, the chancellors/vice

10 officers to advance the well-being of the entire system as well as their own individual

The *Bylaws*, Part D.11 state the following duty for the Senate Committee on Faculty and Academic Staff Benefits (FB):

The Committee shall investigate and regularly report to the Senate on the adequacy and other attributes of the University's provisions for salaries, retirement benefits, sabbatical leaves, other leaves, hospitalization and medical insurance, life insurance, other insurance, investment and savings plans, travel reimbursement, housing benefits, educational benefits, recreational benefits, and other perquisites, benefits and conditions of faculty and academic staff employment.

FB would like to call attention to two items that may be of interest to Senators. We are requesting that members of the Senate share this information with faculty and staff in their units.

1. **Money Purchase Factor** – Employees near retirement should be aware that the Money Purchase Factor will change effective July 2, 2022. This affects individuals who first became participants before July 1, 2005 for whom the Money Purchase calculation will provide the higher retirement annuity. For them, the change will result in an estimated 2% to 4% reduction in monthly benefit payments if they retire on or after July 2, 2022.

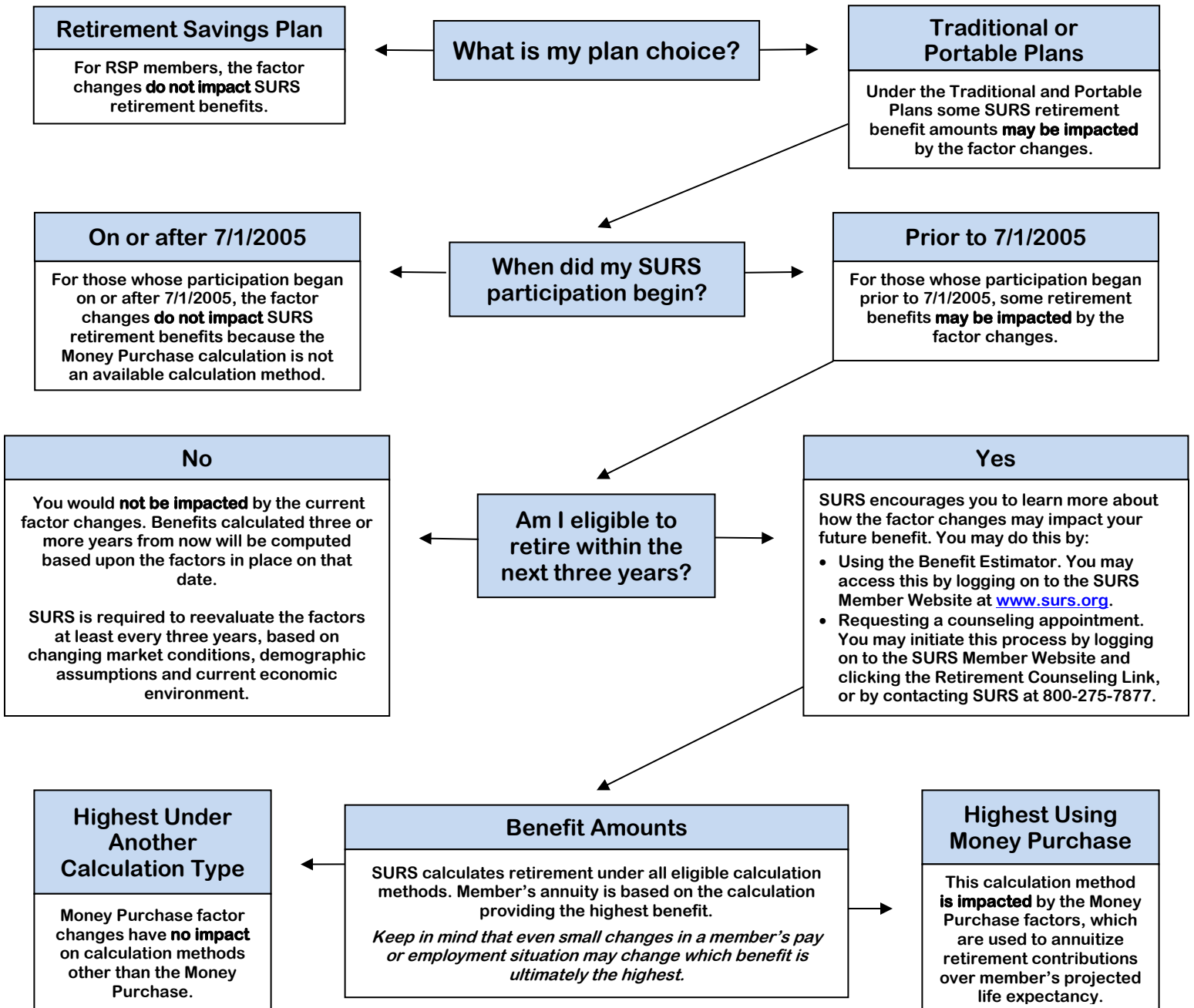

EP.22.010 Instructor and Course Evaluation System (ICES) for 2021-2022

BACKGROUND

On February 22, 2010, the Senate discussed ICES as a Committee of the Whole, pointing out pros and cons of online versus in-person/hard-copy administration. At that meeting, it was noted “there was no timeline about a decision to codify ICES Online as a campus policy” (https://www.senate.illinois.edu/100222_m.pdf).

EP.20.161, Partial List of Challenges Arising From COVID-19 (https://www.senate.illinois.edu/20200427senate/EP20161_FINAL.pdf), discusses some of these same pros and cons about the administration of ICES online in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. EP.20.161 was presented to the full Senate as a report item at the April 27, 2020 meeting.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Center for Innovation in Teaching and Learning (CITL) successfully moved all student ICES evaluations fully online. Three major advantages of the online system emerged during this time: Students are able to provide more detailed responses to the open-ended questions; instructors are able to review reports summarizing student feedback weeks earlier compared to the paper-based system; and the reports from the online evaluations are easily available to instructors at any time in a digital format.

RECOMMENDATION

The Center for Innovation in Teaching and Learning (CITL) and the Provost’s office recommend continued administration of ICES online in the Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 semesters and in courses offered in the Winter 2021-22 and Summer 2022 sessions. Realizing some hybrid courses will continue throughout 2021-2022 academic year, it is important to be inclusive of all courses, to include students who cannot be on campus, and to ensure data compatibility. Online administration of student evaluations fulfills this need. Online administration would also be in alignment with the recent recommendations from the Report of the Provost’s Task Force on Assessing Teaching Effectiveness for a future student rating system.

While some faculty may have concerns about response rate differences between the online mode of student evaluation administration compared to the in-person administration mode, these differences can be mitigated if instructors dedicate class time to filling out electronic ICES forms, as was practice with the paper ICES forms in previous pre-pandemic semesters.

In addition to the recommendation above to continue ICES online, the Senate Educational Policy Committee is asked to address previous concerns as noted in the background of this proposal, plus provide feedback on best practices for online administration in future semesters. Such feedback would include engagement with Senate members and discussion of how best to implement the recommendations on student course and instructor evaluations in the Teaching Effectiveness Task Force report, consulting with members of that Task Force as appropriate. This feedback is to be submitted as a report to the full Senate by the end of the Spring 2022 semester.

EP.22.036 Report of Administrative Approvals through October 25, 2021

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on October 25, 2021. Additional information for each approval is attached.

A. Graduate Programs

- 1) **MS in Computer Science** – incorporate internship opportunities for students in the program, allowing students to select CS 591, Advanced Seminar (0-4 hours) or comparable work experience in CS; ENG 572, Professional Practicum (1-8 hours); or elective course (subject to Other Requirements and Conditions) for 0-4 hours. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 2) **Piano Pedagogy concentration in the MMUS in Music** – reflect the updated rubric and course number of the required Advanced Piano course, which was revised from MUS 480 to MUSC 401 (4 hours). Clarify that MUS 557, Piano Literature, a 4-hour course, is to be repeated twice for a total of 8 hours. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.

B. Undergraduate Programs

- 1) **Leadership Studies Minor** – as part of the required courses for the minor, allow students to choose between one of two capstone-style courses, LEAD 460, Critical Approaches to Leading (3 hours) or LEAD 480, Collaborative Learning (3 hours). In the list of electives from which students are to select 2 courses, add LEAD 480 as an option with the note that it cannot be used as an elective if it is also taken as the choice within the requirements. Remove from the list of electives AGCM 430, Comm in Env Social Movements (3 hours); ENG 315, Learning in Community (3 hours); and ENG 598, Special Topics – Applied Project Management (1 to 4 hours). Add a restriction that students within the Organizational Community Leadership concentration of the BS in Agricultural Leadership and Environmental Communications major cannot also be awarded this minor because of the amount of overlap between the two programs. There is no change to the total hours required for the minor.
- 2) **BS in Metropolitan Food & Environmental Systems** – revise the listed Quantitative Reasoning II requirement for the major from ACE 261, Applied Statistical Methods (4 hours) or CPSC 241, Intro to Applied Statistics (3 hours), to ACE 262, Applied Statistical Methods and Data Analytics I (3 hours) or CPSC 241. Move ACES 101, Contemporary Issues in ACES (2 hours) from the “Required Introductory Courses” section to a new section titled “ACES Prescribed.” In the core Curriculum Technology I list from which students are to choose one course, replace CPSC 226, Introduction to Weed Science (3 hours) with CPSC 212, Introduction to Plant Protection (4 hours). There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 3) **Minor in Mathematics** – in the lists of courses from which students are to choose a total of five courses (15 hours), add MATH 257, Linear Algebra with Computational Applications (3 hours), to the Algebra list;

create a list titled “Fundamentals” under which MATH 347, Fundamental Mathematics (3 hours), is the sole course, and in the Probability and Statistics list, clarify that in the “or” option where students choose STAT 410, Statistics and Probability II (3 hours), or STAT 420, Methods of Applied Statistics (3 hours) that students may use one of these courses but not both toward the minor, by listing this in parentheses in the table rather than with a footnote. There is no change to the total hours required for the minor.

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on November 8, 2021. Additional information for each approval is attached.

A. Undergraduate Programs

- 1) **BA in Urban Studies & Planning** – in the list of Foundation Courses, update the rubric to reflect that which is currently used by the Department of Geography and Geographic Science, changing GEOG 101 to GGIS 101, Global Development & Environment (3 hours) and GEOG 104 to GGIS 104, Social and Cultural Geography (3 hours). In the Urban Studies & Planning Core, add UP 211, Local Planning, Gov't and Law (3 hours) as a specifically required course. Add the total hours to the Urban Studies & Planning Core table and the Capstone table. There is no change to the total hours required for the degree.
- 2) **Sustainability Concentration in the BA in Urban Studies & Planning** – move UP 136, Urban Sustainability (3 hours) from the list of courses from which students are to select 6-8 hours to a concentration-required course. Move UP 205, Ecology & Environmental Sustainability (3 hours) from a concentration-required course to the list of courses from which students are to select 6-8 hours. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration.

B. Graduate Programs

- 1) **Joint BS in Animal Sciences and MANSC in Animal Sciences** – in the list of required courses, add ANSC 499, Seminar (1-4 hours) as an “or” option from which students can choose from ANSC 440, Applied Statistical Methods I (4 hours); ANSC 445, Statistical Methods (4 hours); ANSC 448, Math Modeling in Life Sciences (3-4 hours); ANSC 449, Biological Modeling (3-4 hours). An added footnote on this requirement indicates students may select an equivalent course with departmental approval and that students enrolling in ANSC 499 must enroll in the “Intro to Data Analytics” section. Revise the hours of 400- or 500-level ANSC course electives from a range of 18-19 to 18-20. There is no change to the total hours required for the MANSC portion of the program or for the joint program as a whole.
- 2) **Concentration in Data Analytics in Finance** – 1) update the required course for the concentration from FIN 510, Big Data Analytics in Finance (4 hours), to reflect the renumber/retitle of that course, which is now FIN 550, Big Data Analytics in Finance for Predictive and Causal Analysis (4 hours); 2) in the list of courses from which students are to choose two, update FIN 537, Financial Risk Management (4 hours) to reflect the renumber of the course, which is now FIN 567, Financial Risk Management (4 hours); 3) add the MS in Business Analytics as a program to which this concentration may correspond. There is no change to the total hours required for the concentration.

I. ITEMS APPROVED BY SENATE

CO.21.01, Resolution in Support of the Climate Action Plan (iCAP) (11/12)

The first iCAP was developed in 2010, and approved by Interim Chancellor Easter. The 2015 iCAP was signed by Interim Chancellor Wilson and endorsed by the Senate in April of 2016 through a Senate resolution. In 2019, the process began for updating the Illinois Climate Action Plan to create iCAP 2020. This was a significant effort that was supported by hundreds of stakeholders across campus, with broad input from the campus community. On October 20, 2020, Chancellor Jones signed and approved the updated plan. Approved by the Senate on December 7, 2020.

CO.21.02, COVID Issues and Concerns
