The Anthropology, BALAS (key 259) is related to the concentration Anthropology: Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology, BALAS (key 566), the concentration Anthropology: Archaeology, BALAS (key 564), and the concentration Anthropology: Biological Anthropology, BALAS (key 565).

## Program Justification

1. Revised the Program of Study table to include graduation requirements, university requirements, and general education requirements plus the summary general education table.
2. Added the college orientation and professional development course options.
3. Added the names of the three optional concentrations and provided explanatory text for students who don't choose a concentration.
4. Added the heading "Major Core Requirements and Electives."
5. Removed the substitution from the listing of Anthropology Core Courses.
6. Removed course ANTH 271 under the Anthropology Core Courses option.
7. Removed the Thematic Area Courses heading and the list of "Thematic Area" choices and replaced this section with 6 credit hours of ANTH courses at the 200-level and 15 credit hours of ANTH courses at the 300-400 level. The number of credit hours (21) has remained unchanged.
8. Changed the Heading "Additional courses within Anthropology or closely related department that complement the student's thematic area of study" to Additional 300-/400- upper division courses within Anthropology or closely related departments that complement the student's area of study (determined in consultation with the advisor).
9. Added twelve new courses to the Research and Service-Learning Coursework requirement. Updated table to separate course options "ANTH 454 or ANTH 455" (under Archaeology) and "ANTH 444 or ANTH 445" (Biological Anthropology). Changed the name of the Sociocultural/ Linguistic Anthropology theme to the name Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology.
10. Removed the "or ANTH 499-Research Methods in Linguistic Anthropology section" in parenthesis after ANTH 411.
11. Under Senior Capstone Project requirement, dropped the Research and/or Field School option and removed associated courses ANTH 444 & ANTH 445, and ANTH 454 & 455. These courses have been moved to options under Research and Service-Learning Coursework.

With these revisions, the number of total minimum concentration hours has not changed.

1. To abide by campus requirements and the campus general education template to improve transparency and accessibility.
2. To abide by campus requirements.
3. To abide by campus requirements.
4. To better organize the Program of Study and highlight the major core requirements and electives.
5. To decrease complexity in students choosing core course options.
6. ANTH 271 was deactivated effective Spring 2021.
7. The Thematic Area listing has been removed as it will avoid constant updating of course offerings depending on faculty availability. The 21-hour requirement remains so the total credit hours required for graduation is unchanged.
8. Terminology of “thematic area of study” is being removed from the program and adding the additional 9 hours of upper-division courses allows for us to reach the required 40 hours of advanced coursework in our degree.
9. To increase student flexibility and clarify which courses could be used to fulfill this requirement. Specifically, for the Research and Service-Learning Requirement:
  - In Archaeology, added ANTH 450, ANTH 452, ANTH 455, ANTH 456, and ANTH 477.
  - In Biological Anthropology, added ANTH 346, ANTH 347, ANTH 407, ANTH 441/ANSC 441, ANTH 445, and ANTH 447.
  - In Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology, added ANTH 471.Name change made to be consistent with the concentration named "Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology."
10. The Topics in Anthropology course, ANTH 499, has not yet been developed for these revisions.
11. We are streamlining the Senior Capstone Requirement to include a narrower selection of courses and options.

In discussion with the Ed Pol Committee Chair, we were asked to include an explanation of the core coursework. Anthropology is historically a four-field discipline (archaeology, sociocultural, linguistic, and biological anthropology) that all fall under the 'anthropology' umbrella. As such,

we require our students to take core courses in three out of the four subdisciplines. In the anthropology major, they can select from any of the four subdisciplines. However, in each of the concentrations, we specify 1-2 of the core courses they are required to take, and have a choice of the remaining core course(s).

The decision for revisions was made after a meeting of the Director of Undergraduate Studies, Department Head, and Undergraduate Advisor in the Anthropology Department. The revisions provide students more flexibility with additional course offerings that satisfy the degree requirements.
