- 1. Revised the Program of Study table to include graduation requirements, university requirements, and the general education requirements plus summary general education table.
- 2. Added the college orientation and professional development course options.
- 3. Added the heading "Major Core Requirements and Electives".
- 4. Under the Anthropology Core Courses requirement, students now required to complete both ANTH 230 and ANTH 270 (3 hours each), and the remaining core course can be chosen from a list of four courses for a total of 9 hours of core course material.
- 5. Removed course ANTH 271 under the Anthropology Core Courses requirement.
- 6. Category heading changed from Socio-cultural and Linguistic Anthropology Courses to Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology Courses.
- 7. The information from the 9 hours of additional socio-cultural and linguistics courses was changed to the new concentration name Sociocultural & Linguistics and upper division courses specified. The requirement is now for 9 hours of "Additional 300-/400-upper division Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology courses or courses in related fields that complement the student's Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology focus.
- 8. Under the Sociocultural & Linguistic Anthropology Courses category, introduced subheading category titles (Regions of the World List 1, Regions of the World List 2, and Theoretical or Topical Areas), added clarifying language in category titles in terms of number of courses required in each, and listed/added specific courses under each. Three additional sociocultural and linguistics anthropology courses or courses in related fields (9 hours) are chosen in consultation with the department advisor. The number of credit hours in these two sections (30) has not changed.
- 9. Removed Research Methods in Linguistic Anthropology ANTH 499 from the Research and Service Learning Coursework.
- 10. Course ANTH 471 was added as a choice under the Research and Service-Learning Coursework category (3 credit hours).

- 1. To abide by campus requirements and the campus general education template to improve transparency and accessibility.
- 2. To abide by campus requirements.
- 3. To better organize the Program of Study and highlight the major core requirements and electives.
- 4. Core courses were added as required instead of optional to provide foundational information for students in this sub-discipline. ANTH 230 (Sociocultural Anthropology) offers an in-depth introduction to sociocultural anthropology, and ANTH 270 (Language in Culture) focuses on linguistic anthropology.
- 5. ANTH 271 was deactivated effective Spring 2021.
- 6. Changed category heading title to match the program title.
- 7. The total of 9 hours remains the same, but the concentration title changed, and the related fields was simplified to "related fields that complement". The addition of 300-/400- level courses was to meet the 40 hours of advanced coursework for the degree.
- 8. Subheading category titles were identified, clarifying requirement language added, and courses listed under each were identified for clarity and ease of choosing approved courses.

Regions of the World List 1 (1 course) - ANTH 106, ANTH 108, ANTH 112, ANTH 160, ANTH 165, and ANTH 182.

Regions of the World List 2 (2 courses) - ANTH 221, ANTH 259, ANTH 261, ANTH 262, ANTH 263, ANTH 268, ANTH 272, ANTH 285, ANTH 287, ANTH 288.

Theoretical or Topical Areas (4 courses) - ANTH 350, ANTH 351, ANTH 352, ANTH 353, ANTH 363, ANTH 364, ANTH 372, ANTH 374, ANTH 375, ANTH 379, ANTH 402, ANTH 403, and ANTH 405.

These three areas add up to 21 credit hours, the same as previously.

- 9. The Topics in Anthropology course, ANTH 499, has not yet been developed for these revisions.
- 10. The additional Research and Service-Learning course that was added (ANTH 471) will provide greater flexibility for students completing this concentration.

The decision for revisions was made after a meeting of the Director of Undergraduate Studies, Department Head and Undergraduate Advisor in the Anthropology Department. The revisions provide students more flexibility with additional course offerings that satisfy the degree requirements.
