

Dear Nora,

As a follow-up to our recent phone conversation I am writing regarding the Department's desire to make some relatively minor changes in our M.S.P.H. in Community Health degree program as outlined below.

Periodically the Department of Community Health reviews all of its undergraduate and graduate programs. Recently, as a result of a recommendation by the Department Curriculum Committee, the Department faculty at its regular monthly meeting unanimously approved several changes in its M.S.P.H. in Community Health degree program. As the Chair of the Department Curriculum Committee the Department Head, Dr. Janet Reis, asked me to follow-up with you. Based on our earlier conversation I am requesting your opinion about a proposed revision in our M.S.P.H. in Community Health degree. The Department would like permission to implement the proposed changes in the next academic year. A copy of our existing degree program with proposed deletions and a copy of our proposed degree program with changes highlighted is enclosed.

It should be emphasized the degree name and number of units will remain the same. Moreover, as indicated in the accompanying pages, the course work will remains very similar. The Department believes the changes are modest. The proposed changes will result in the degree reflecting more accurately what it really is (both currently and proposed) in both its title and course work - a broad based profession degree program in Community Health rather than a specialization in community health education. It reflects the multi-disciplinary composition of its faculty and would be attractive to a broader student audience including those desiring an off campus distance education program. It also reflects the merger of the Department of Community Health and the Rehabilitation program. All content courses in the old program would still be included with CHLTH 401 becoming an elective and the CHLTH 493 or courses in a specialized

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area would be an option to the thesis requirement. Since the M.S.P.H. is considered a terminal degree in the field the inclusion of CHLTH 493 or additional course work seems appropriate. Of course students wishing to do a thesis could do so. The additional choice of electives reflects the inclusion of the merger with Rehabilitation. This provides additional opportunities for our students. We believe the proposed changes will better position our students in the workplace while providing an opportunity for those wishing to further their education.

We appreciate your addressing this request and moving it forward as necessary.

Proposed M.S.P.H. in Community Health

The Master of Science in Public Health degree requires a minimum of 12 units of graduate credit with at least 3 units at the 400 level in Community Health. For admission, students must be adequately prepared in undergraduate coursework in biological and social sciences and mathematics. Students must take an additional unit of coursework in statistics (EDPSY 390 Elements of Educational Statistics, or equivalent) if they did not complete courses through regression and correlation with a grade of B or better in their undergraduate study; and an additional unit of coursework in data analysis (CHLTH 321 Health Data Analysis, or equivalent), if they did not complete such a course with a grade of B or better in their undergraduate study. Students must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 (A=4.0) during the master's program.

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Proposed Changes to M.S.P.H. in Community Health Specialization in Community Health Education

The Master of Science in Public Health degree, with emphasis in community health education, requires a minimum of 12 units of graduate credit with at least 3 units at the 400 level two of which must be in Community Health. For admission, students must be adequately prepared in undergraduate coursework in biological and social sciences and mathematics. Students must take an additional unit of coursework in statistics (EDPSY 390 Elements of Educational Statistics, or equivalent) if they did not complete courses through regression and correlation with a grade of B or better in their undergraduate study; and an additional unit of coursework in data analysis (CHLTH 321 Health Data Analysis, or equivalent), if they did not complete such a course with a grade of B or better in their undergraduate study. Students must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 (A=4.0) during the master's program.
