BRIEF DESCRIPTION:

The proposed curriculum in Sculpture will update a pedagogy that has been in place since the 1970s. The new curriculum eliminates outdated subject matter, consolidates several courses, concentrates and intensifies the studio experience, and comingles upper-level major courses in Sculpture and Painting (ARTS 350 and 351 Intermediate Studio I and II; and ARTS 450 and 451 Advanced Studio I and II) to allow students to participate in a more integrated, collaborative studio practice.

JUSTIFICATION:

The revised curriculum responds to the needs of contemporary art practice and expands student exposure to a variety of media, disciplines, technologies, intellectual traditions, and collaborative opportunities. The revisions are needed to improve the quality and timeliness as well as the efficiency of course delivery.

BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:

There will be no additional staff or dollars needed as a result of this change in the Sculpture curriculum.

b. The new curriculum will allow a greater efficiency of human resource utilization by exposing students to both Sculpture and Painting faculty in the upper-level studio courses.

c. Course enrollments in other departments outside or programs within the School of Art + Design will not be affected.

d. Changes should necessitate no additional facilities or equipment. Going forward as the art world evoles, changes in technologies, materials, and processes may dictate new facilities needs.

GUIDELINES FOR UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION:

a. Reading, Listening, Writing, Speaking, Quantitative and Qualitative Thinking, Etc. | The revised curriculum retains its former schedule of General Education Requirements, among which writing and quantitative reasoning components are explicitly included. In addition the Painting curriculum will continue to require ARTS 392 Current Art Issues Seminar.

b. Broad Exposure to World Cultures | Again, the revised curriculum retains the University's set of General Education requirements, which include Cultural Studies. Further, art making, by definition,

explores art as an expression of contemporary culture.

c. Generalized Professional Scope | The Sculpture curriculum requires a significant number of hours in both art historical studies and in lateral development of a broad range of studio experiences, set among General Education courses outside the College of Fine and Applied Arts. The degree requirements conform to the standards established by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD), the School's accreditation agency.

The curriculum requires 122 credit hours and provides a broad and solid foundation in the fundamental disciplines of drawing, design, and painting, including traditional and contemporary concepts. The student is encouraged to experience a wide range of materials, techniques, methods, and styles.

Foreign Language Requirement

Students entering the University of Illinois as freshmen in Fall 2000 or later must complete the foreign language requirement in order to graduate. To satisfy this requirement, students must complete a third-level college foreign language course. This requirement may also be satisfied by three years of the same foreign language in high school. Students entering the University of Illinois without three years of the same foreign language in high school just take a foreign language placement test to determine the courses in which to enroll.
